

COST AND PRICE

Recent reports are to the effect that the Eleventh Districts cotton acreage for 1924 will be considerably larger and the cost of producing the crop will be considerably higher than that of 1923. The acreage expansion can of course be attributed in a large measure to the price received by the growers for last year's production. That there is also a definite relation between last season's prive level and the current season's production costs is a fact that is perhaps not so generally recognized but one that deserves the closest attention by all who are genuinely interested in the progress and welfare of our leading industry. The situation, therefore, seems to make this an appropriate time to call the attention of our member banks to some of the fundamental factors that enter into the relation between the term "cost" in the broader sense to cover the producers expenditures during the crop-growing

Unlike the merchant or manufacthat costs must always be kept down dity. to an irreducible minimum, the farmer usually relies upon the price received for the previous season's crop as the basis for determining the amount of funds he may safely expend during the current growing season. For example, it will be rewhich our farmers found themselves He must prove by his endeavor that cial elections. ing price was only 8 cents per pound, great. and although the 1915 crop was produced on an 8 cent basis, price the market advanced to 11 cents in the fall and yielded the producers an unexpected return.

Then in 1920 the disastrous cotton history of 1914 repeated itself, when a crop planted while the price was around the 40 cent level was sold on the average at the 15 cent level.

These references to the past would of course serve no useful purpose now if it were true that production costs were no more subject to the producers control than is the price he receives for his product. But no long as the farmer is for to decige (1) the amount of acreage he can successfully cultivate; (2) whether his crops will be produced by himself or by hired labor; (3) diers. No material prosperity, imwhether he will raise his own living at home or obtain it by purchase; and (4) whether he will adopt an econo-(4) whether he will adopt an econo mical or extravagent standard of living .- he cannot escape the realization that his crop production costs are not only well within his power to control, but can actually be pre determined and budgetized.

Since he exercises, therefore, an almost complete control over "costs' but can neither control nor forsee the "price" he will receive, it necessarily follows that the problem of the cotton farmers problems are problems of costs, and not of price.

In summing up the situation I hope that I may without presumption, point out to our member banks that a very definite opportunity and obligation confronts them in the form of their privilege to exercise a reasonable degree of bank supervision over the expenditure of funds loaned for agricultural purposes. That such supervision can serve a most helpful and timely purpose in bringing agricultural industry in this section to a permanently profitable basis has become more clearly apparent than ever before in the light of the conditions under which the farmers are now operating and which may be summarized as follows:

Crop production costs constitute the one definitely determined and controllable factor of crop profits: are inseperably related to the yield per acre; and in the final analysis depend upon the producers methods of operation and methods of living, which in turn are largely right or wrong accordingly to the influence exerted upon them by the banker to whom he looks for credit assistance

and intelligent counsel. In presenting these thoughts to our member banks at this particular time, the beginning of a new crop growing season, we have in mind the fact that if production costs are to be minimized from the very beginning of the season such a program would be far more effective insuring profitable production than to permit costs to take care of themselves, and seek recourse to some arbitrary price-fixing plan in conflict with economic laws in hope of recovering both cost and desired profits upon their products.

While cotton is the only commodity referred to in this discussion (on account of its paramount position in our prospective industries), the same

Aids 200.000 Veterans and Their Families-27,000 Disabled Still in Hospitals.

SPENDS \$5.866.255 IN YEAR

Individual Attention Assured to All Physically Ailing or in Distress.

It should be emphasized that government assistance is necessarily standardized along specified lines affecting them as a whole. The Red Cross service is to the individual man and the solution of his problems. This the Red Cross designates "home service" and interest of the home to these men undergoing physical reconstitution far from their actual home influences.

Year's Expenditures \$5,866,255 In the year ended last June 30 the Red Cross reports \$3,920,000 spent by its Chapters in extending individual attention to the ex-service men and \$1,946,255 spent by National Headquarters of the Red Cross, a total of \$5,866,255 In behalf of the men called to duty in the World War the Red Cross since July 1, 1917, has spent nearly \$164,000,000. Today there are 2,608 Chapters in as many localities carrying on this work, aiding the individual veteran, assisting his family, furnishing creature comforts and

funds to tide over troublesome periods. The strong connecting link between the Red Cross and the United States Veterans' Bureau takes the complications out of difficult cases of claims. The Red Cross in this work requiring personal representation of the ex-service man has acted in appeal cases, insurance matters, personal and family problems, camp and hospital activities, and in cases of death. This service handled nearly 12,000 compensa-

The financial problem of the ex-serve ice man when traveling to and from hospitals is a serious one, and in meeting this constant demand the Red Cross expended \$138,334.17 during the year. We had a week of sports and then then we returned to Culebra for sports and boat races and then we left Culebra for New York. We arrived in New York March the third and all hands were on deck to greet the Statue of Liberty and when we dropped anchor one-third of the crew shoved off on a forty-eight. We stand in New York ten days and red to the Carribean Sea for bat-

tle practice and torpedo practice with about for weeks' battle practice. And finally we returned to Panama City where we had a few days liberty and we found it a pretty mean place. There was plenty of whiskey and beer so the sailors helped them-selves and after a few good libertys in old Panama City we pulled in the mud hook for San Pedro, California. We arrived in San Pedro April 22.

We will go out next week to fire the 16-inch guns. We will be around Seattle, Vancouver, San Francisco and Brownington for the rest of the year, and then we go to Honolulu, H. I., and other foreign countries and then we return to the States. I will ring off for this time.





Two lives of law violators were snuff- FLY AND MOSQUITO ELIMINAed out in a moment. An officer of the law wounded, and was compelled to kill the drunken murderer, or so wound him that his life is despaired

of. And why? Because the law of the land enacted in rigid compliance with constitutional requirements-and which presumably at least, reflects the popular will-was boldly, flagrantly, contemptuously violated.

Next the scene shifts. A vessel carrying 2500 cases of champagne, valued at \$250,000, was captured by prohibition agents off the coast of New York or New Jersey.

Champagne, even before the Volstead act became the law, was an expensive luxury. None, or but few, except the rich who lived high and floated on the crest of the social wave, indulged in drinking it.

The foreign "bootleggers" would not run the risk they did unless they had been assured of a purchaser for every case and bottle of their unlawful cargo and it follows therefore that people of wealth and high social position and claiming the highest respectability were in conspiracy with the bootleggers to violate the law, which is a legal and moral obligation upon every citizen to obey and which every law-abiding, and self-respecting citizen does obey.

This is a broad statement, but it is true in its fullest meaning.

If the violators of law in Chicago and off the Eastern coast and in New York were asked why they defied and violated the law their answer would be that it deprived them of their perpersonal rights.

In other words, they disagree with the law, therefore have the right to violate it. That is bold, undisguised anarchy. Let that principle, if it can properly be so designated, be applied and society will become totally disorganized. There will be no law, and the whole fabric of government by the people will become a direful jest and ghastly tragedy.

The courts long since held that no man had any vested right to either make or sell intoxicating liquor.

The most dangerous diseases that are spread by flies are typhoid fever, infantile dierrhea, tuberculosis and anthrax. Of course, these diseases also are carried through other agen cies, but with each of them, if the fly borne infection could be eliminated, mortality from these diseases would be vastly reduced. > In ten days, each female fly is multiplied by thousands, and the more garbage cans that are left exposed and the less sanitary conditions are, the more flies there will be to carry

A fly does not wash its feet before attacking the butter or the baby's milk. It leaves in its path a collection of germs which may start an epidemic of fever and which may result in many unnecessary deaths. Don't take a chance, it is better to be wise than courageous.

Swat the first fly Destroy all rubbish and don't throw dish water in the yard.

Own a tight garbage can and keep it dry and covered.

Keep your house well screened. Do not buy food where flies are tolerated. Strict cleanliness and immediate




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
