

# **City-School-Hospital Election Sat.**, May 3

Saturday, May 3, marks election day for Bovina voters in city alderman, school board, and Parmer County Hospital District's board elections. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. City and hospital elections will be at city hall and school board voting is at the school.

Five candidates are seeking the three seats on the board of Aldermen. They are Jeff Steelman, Linda Marshall, Charles Wilkins, Don Bandy, and Kevin Hughes. None of the incumbents are seeking re-election.

In the hospital board race, incumbents Danny Kendrick and Wendell Gresham are the only candidates on the ballot.

For the Bovina ISD board of trustees election, four candidates are on the slate, Adam Perez, Bryan Thurmond, Joe Steelman, and Rickey Jamerson. There are two openings on the board. Steelman and Jamerson are incumbents.

Cumulative voting will be in place for the school board race. Each voter may cast two votes for one candidate or one each for two candidates.

How do you deal with waiters who wait until you have a mouthful of food to ask if you would like anything else? Why does it always seem to embarrass my dinner companions when I hold my water glass up in the air to signal a slowpoke waiter who has not filled up my glass?

Most folks in my generation got a heavy dose of manners when we were growing up: Sit up straight, don't slouch. Close your mouth when you chew. Don't leave the table until you ask if you may be excused. Say "Please" and "Thank You." Don't interrupt when someone else is talking. If you borrow something, return it. Etc.

Manners in the 90s are more like. . . . Leaving your shopping cart in the middle of the parking lot is rude. When you come out of a movie, don't explain the ending to those who are waiting in line for the next showing. The person who empties the ice cube tray should be the one who

fills it up. Don't finish other people's sentences for them. Attention, young people! Please throw away your chewing gum on graduation night. You don't know how unintelligent you look when walking down the aisle in your cap and gown with jaws bobbing up and down in time to "Pomp and Circumstance." It tends to make the audience wonder if you've learned anything at all in those 12 years.

At the Chamber meeting April 28 only two students had signed up for the party. The Chamber had already reserved the facilities for \$230, which is non-refundable.


Chamber members had also collected door prizes from local merchants to be given to the students. Prizes ranged from a microwave to \$50 savings bonds and free oil changes.

# **Moisture Is Blessing**, **Area Farmers Say**

Local opinions vary on the eventual effect of the snow and cold temperature on area wheat crops. There is one unanimous opinion, however. Parmer County received a much needed and healthy amount of moisture in April.

Bovina's official weather keeper Maggie Moore, said that Bovina received 7.21 inches of moisture in April, with 3.08 inches last week.

Snowfall in Bovina was approximately 4 inches, while reports from the Rhea Community say that 12 inches fell in the area.

Year-to-date rainfall totaled 7.29 in Bovina according to Moore.


With the 3-4 inches of moisture, plus snow and freezing temperatures, area farmers are conservative in their assessment of this year's wheat crop. "It is too early for most farmers to tell", according to Harry Johnson, manager at Sherley Grain. Johnson said he expected the wheat harvest to be a little later than usual this year as pollination was likely slowed because of the cold.

Land seems to be still too wet for anxious planters. Johnson said that most farmers are predicting they might be able to get into the fields this weekend.

Soybeans Are Alternative As Area Crop

In 1997, Tom Reynolds of Jefferson's Farm Inc. of Hampton, Virginia plans to contract approximately 2,000 acres for conventionally produced soybeans in the Texas panhandle.

In 1996, Mark Wilkes grew 60 acres organically in Meadow, Texas. The beans were planted during the middle of May on a 40 inch row at 28 pounds of seed stock per acre and harvested at the end of September and the beginning of October.


Of course we only vacuum the open spaces where the machine will reach anyway. You only vacuum under furniture when you move, or once every two years, maybe.

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for May.

Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps, HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B) and Hepatitis B.

The Texas Department of Health is charging fees to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

The vaccinations are available at the WIC Office, 704 Main St. in Friona, on Friday, May 16 from 10 a.m.-12 noon and 1-3:45 p.m. Vaccinations will also be administered at the EMS Office, 109 Third Street in Bovina on Monday, May 12 from 10 a.m.-3 p.m.



The 1990 Texas Census data suggests that 1,968,408 Texans age 18 and over were abused or neglected as children with 660,000 Texans receiving professional counseling as adults due to abuse and neglect.

How does this affect our society? Child abuse is costly for society. Victims of abuse are more likely to require tax-supported medical, legal, penal and social services. Victims of child abuse and your children, "I love you" neglect often fail to become productive members of society, are more likely to be in public assistance programs, have employment difficulties, mental health problems and overuse health care systems. Abused and neglected children have higher rates of mental retardation, higher incidence of suicide, higher incidence of self-destructive behavior, low self esteem and an increased likelihood of becoming physically abusing







determine if the nattos would be a good follow up crop for hailed-out cotton.

"The result was an excellent pod set. This variety is a good catch crop

for cotton," Reynolds said. The producer can contract the beans for a flat price of \$10 per clean bushel or \$3 plus CBOT at the time of delivery. The beans cannot be dirty. The screenings, culls and splits will be sold to the elevator and the proceeds go to the grower.

The harvested soybeans are processed at Muleshoe Pea and Bean.




