

HALT BIG COTTON WASTE

Mineral Wells, Texas, May 5 .- The individual-retains all natural rights great white staple at the basis of Sothern wealth is the most wastepact, the true function of government fully handled product of any package entering the channels of trade in any country of the world. Harvie Jordan, managing director of the Southern Cotton Association, told the West Texas Chamber of Commerce as its seventh annual conventien here Tuesday.

The plantation bale of today is the theory on which every other as out of date as the norse power gins of a half a century ago, he said, explaining the wastage in handling from the time the cotton leaves the grower until it reaches the warehouse of the spinner.

> Though cotton in America's "gold mine", American cotton growers, through antiquated methods are losing \$150,000,000 a year, Jordan said.

"The plantation bale of today," he said, "is the same type of package as that turned out from the old-fashioned horse power gins of half a century ago. It typifies the days of the tallow candle and stage coach. The bale is only partially covered, thrown about in trash and dirt, and is delivered to the spinners in a disgracefully uneconomic condition.

"There is a fixed charge of 5" per cent of the gross weight of the Texas bale deducted for bagging and ties. No cotton grower ever sold a pound of bagging and ties and never will, under existing conditions. The various fixed charges against cotton tare by mill centers in this country and Europe result in placing the maximum penalty if deduction for tare against the grower.

"There never has been granted car load rate on cotton bales transported by the railroads. The same tariff rate per hundred pounds applies to the haulage of one bale or a thousand. The only concession granted by the railroads to shippers is the cost of recompression to induce a greater tonnage of cot ton bales loaded into cars at large compress points. At the ports the bales are again recompressed to secure higher density to meet the requirements at shipside which en tails additional cost."

Of the amount lost by present methods of handling, Texas suffers \$50,000,000 a year, Jordan said.

The speaker told of the work of his organization in fighting the boll weevil. Finding the ravages of these insects covered 97 per cent of the cotton area of the country, his association started farm demonstration plots throughout the South. The work was started in 1923 with 933 demonstration farms of eight acres each. They were placed in the midst of the boll weevil men-

stration farms were started and 150,000 growers were reached with instructions on combatting the methods have increased 350 per cent in two years, he said.

Jordan urged growing of feed crops along with cotton, pointing out that 63 per cent of Texas farmers fail to produce sufficient feed to meet their needs. He said that while Georgia produced a million bales of cotton in 1924, it required the proceeds of 850,000 bales to pay for the imports of food and dairy products largely consumed in rural districts.

More than 1,000,000 farmers have eft the Cotton Belt States since 1920 for industrial centers because the deflation of that year was followed by losses due to the weevil. No longer ago, before the coming of the summer residents they were found in New England solely or chiefly. The colleges and universities are crowded, but the agricultural schools are dwindling in attendance. It is a depressing picture, and despite all the optimistic interviews of financiers, encouraging magazine articles and in genious index numbers to the contrary, Governor Lowden insists, it is a true one. Before there can be constructive improvement there must be a recognition and brave facing of the serious situation. It is not only "serious;" the ablest farm economists agree that it is almost "desperate." This is due, in their estimate, to

the great disparity between the prices of the things that the farmer has to sell and of those that he has to buy. Sheer necessity, growth of population and its greater demands, will bring about some adjustment in a long period of time; but under such a laissezfaire attitude there will be disastrous consequences, perilous to the people as a whole. The problem is stated concretely in the Governor's Northern Illinois:

"Now, I produce both corn and er part of my corn in the form of silage to my cows. I sell it, therefore, in the form of milk. I receive consid erably less for it than I did a year ago. And so these glowing figures of the increased value of the corn crop, over which the financial writers of the great metropolitan dailies gloat, do not comfort me much. I am indeed puzzled to know what to do. I have been taught that to produce 20 bushels of corn to the acre is a finer achievement than to produce 45. I like to see the milk pail brimming full with sweet, pure milk. But when I see 45 bushels of corn worth more than 60 bushels of corn, and when I see the milk pail but two-thirds full worth more than the brimming pail of another year, I become confused and hardly know what to do."

He cites like experiences of others something is wrong with our methods of marketing when the aggregate money value of a larger crop of a prime necessity is smaller than the value of the smaller crop.

What can be done to lesson disparity referred to and hasten an adjustment before the worst has come? Mr. Lowden's answer is that agriculture must conform to the practices found necessary to the success of other great industries. Organize! Not that farmers are to adopt a corporate form of organization and operate farms through corporate management. It would be a menace to our social structure if farmers were "to surrender their individualism in this way." But organize for the marketing of products "at a price which will enable them to live and go on producing." Co-operative marketing



AVOID MISTAKE IN HOPPER POISONING

Mistake No. 1 has already been made in poisoning grasshoppers in

The poison bran mash as recommended by A. and M. College has proven fully effective in killing grasshoppers. Last year failures were reported, but investigation in every instance showed some detail of mixing or distributing had been neglected.

April 7th of this year the Extension Service sent out Press Letter Vol. 1. No. 1 on grasshopper control, giving the formula and going into considerable detail. Where a good grade of amyl acetate could be obtained this was advised in place of lemons, being cheaper, more effective, and most easily mixed. Special care was taken to advise "high grade amyl acetate" and to "avoid bronzing liquids." In spite of this, we have already found that bronzing liquid is being sold to the farmers in large quantities for the purpose of killing grasshoppers.

Bronzing liquids contain amyl acetate, but mixed with other materials in such quantities that it often repels the hoppers instead of attracting them. Only a high grade amyl acetate should be used, such as "C. P." or "Techinal No." Avoid anylolock 41, John School Company acetate should be used, such as "C. FORD TO FILL THE

Henry Ford has gone into aviation. The man who popularized the motor car has assigned himself the task of popularizing the flying machine. The manufacturer who produc doing a big and extensive business. at Spot Cash Grocery. tion methods created one of the worlds greatest industrial organizations expects now to use that same organization for the promotion of air

transport. Henry Ford and his son, Edsel, are undertaking the job together, believnig that the time has come to realize some of the limitless impossibilities of flyng. They purpose to produce metal arcraft that can remain out in all kinds of weather, to reduce the cost of both planes and dirigibles so that they mey be made available for public use. In a sense, they intend to "fliverize" the air.

"There is not a doubt in the world that commercial aviation can be successful," said Henry Ford at Dearborn the other day. "We are going to see that it is made a success."

"As soon as we get into quantity production the planes will be disposed of through the regular sales units of the Ford Motor Company," said Edsel Ford. He has made a special study of the technical aspects of flying and the scientific requirements of aircraft. He speaks the language of the aeronautical engineer. He is a young man, still in his 20's and keen to make his own mark.

The flying "flivver" as it is now envisioned-will carry loads of two three and four persons, or the equivalent in cargo; the cost to the purchaser will not be more than \$3000 at the start with a gradual reduction in price as the design is furthur simplified and Ford production methods are applied.

But the small Ford plane must await the development of the Ford air craft engine. Today experiments are being conducted in the laboratories at Dearborn. Henry Ford and his engineers are developing motors large and small, the large motors to take the place of the present military engines that were brought during the war, such as the Liberty.

Mr. Ford recognizes the fact that the military engines as they exist today, are too heavy and too expensive to run for the work they can do. He expects to bring out lighter engines to do the same work, and small er motor giving more power for their size than existing types. This may take the form of a radical, aircolled engine, or it may be water cooled and in the form of an inverted V. It may be one year and possibly two before a Ford engine sufficiently light and economical for air flivvers will be in the production stage.

The small flying Ford depends on the perfection of such an engine .-
