## Commission Defers Further Action in Highway Change

Messrs. E. C. Edmonds and John King returned Thursday from Austin where they had been to attend a meeting of the Highway Commission with reference to the proposition of diverting the state designation of Highway No. 18 as now established from Stamford and intermediate points through Spur to oth-

er routes. Members of the commission gave the delegates an attentive hearing in protesting the diversion of this route, and after listening to the views presented, apparently gave more favorable consideration to the protests. At any rate, further action in the matter was deferred to a later date, and the assumption is that the old route from Stamford through Spur will be redesignated and re-

cognized by the State Department. It appears that the Commission had concluded that the proposition to divert this route was brought about more as the result of an exist ing competition between Stamford and Haskell than in a real desire to give highway service and recognition to the country and the greatest number of people.

The plan of establishing this highway oringinated in Spur and much labor and money has been expended in completing the higway in giving people along the route direct connection with Fort Worth as well as giving service to transient travel, and now to be deprived of the advantages thus far accomplished would be a real injury if not an injustice, and it is hoped by the people all along the route that the Commission may recognize our just claims to retaining the highway as originally established and designated.

COLD AIR IS USED IN DRILLING IN SCURRY COUNTY

Cisco, Texas, Aug. 16 .- Air, when thought of in connection with the oil industry, usually is thought of in terms of "hot air." But in Scurry County they have a field of wells which produce air of the cold variety. And unlike the proverbial "hot air," this cold air is highly valuable and useful. Enterprising oil men use it to freeze watermelons, cool water, pump oil wells, drill deep wells, pump water, inflate tires and serve as automatic "electric fans" on 'hot days.

It is declared to be the only thing of its kind in the world, and the sight proves quite interesting to the tourists and visitors, as well as to the oil men of the Mitchell-Scurry County fields.

This "air" field is located near the village of Ira on the Moore lease of the Northwest Company. E. I. Thompson is vice president and manager of the company, and W. W. Lechner is field superintendent. When this company struck the air well producing non-inflamable gas, they at first thought the possible helium content would make the find profitable, but analysis showed the gas to be over 93 per cent inert nitrogen and valueless commercially. However, the gas had a rock pressure of 250 pounds, and produced a flow estimated at four to six million feet.

To Lechner occurred the thought that this gas should be made to do some useful work, and he experimented with running into a stream boiler. He discovered that without making a single adjustment the air would run the steam engine perfectly and would provide several times as much power as could be generated with steam.

They first used it as power for pumping, and saw that the pumping failed to lower the pressure appreciably. Then they hitched on another well and pumped both. By securing an ingenuous air head device, they were able to make the Moore No. 1, which produced considerable oil as well as air pump itself, and then they tried the new power for drilling.

By using an old boiler as a reservoir they were able to get enough power to pull a standard rig and they are now drilling away on the Newman No. 1, a deep test, and have power to spare at all times.

In addition to the heavy work they have harnessed this well for a number of other useful duties. A part of the gas is put through an air turbine and with it they generate all eletricity needed for use on the lease. The turbine is an ordinary steam turbine without any

The expansion of the air as it passes through the exhaust pipe abthat ammonia freezes water. The ex haust pipe of this strange engine, instead of being hot as exhaust pipes are supposed to be, is icy cold and covered with frost.

When the drillers desire ice water they fill a baking powedr can with water and place the can in the current of air escaping from the exhaust. Soon the water is frozen and they use it to make ice water. 



American Jews have contributed more than 60 per cent of the\$8,-646,750 that has been spent during the last four years by the Palestine Foundation for the rebuilding of the Holy Land, according to an anrouncement recently made, while the remaining 40 per cent represents funds donated by Jews in fifty-two other countries.

That is, indeed, a wonderful record to be made by those of that race in one country, for those in America represent scarcely more than one-fifth of those in the entire world. Yet this one-fifthcontributed 60 per cent of the total funds for the hehabilitation of their native

land. It is also a tribute to American Jews to know that, of the three principal items of expenditure, the largest was for agricultural coloniza tion, the next largest was for schools, and the third largest was for the promotion of immigration.

With civilization beginning and ending with the plow, as the saying is and with civilization's greatest aid being education, it may safely be predicted that the Jews will soon succeed in their hope of centuries to rebuild their native land.—Dallas Times Herald.



## 784 More Miles of U. S. Hard Roads for Texas

Texas farmers and tourists now enjoy 784 miles more of the Federal highway than they did a year ago, according to the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation. The mileage completed in the year ending June 30, cost a total of \$11,778,972, of which the federal government furnished \$4,867,315. Highway construction under this plan now under way in the state totals 1509 miles, while the total mileage completed previous to last year was 3122 miles.

This additional mileage, while a convenience to the tourist in the state, is a godsend to the farmer, according to the Foundation. It is estimated that each and every rarmer in this section of the country aver ages 23 tons of farm products hauled to market and 5 tons of fee, fue, fertilizer, machinery, supplies, etc., from town. When good roads make trucks feasible this is not very burdensome, but it represents a good many hours' labor where horses and poor roads must be used. And so while the tourist finds the intter-city roads mighty comfortable, to the farmer a good serviceable road from his farm to the nearest market is a downright necessity.

Snyder, August 23 .- What kind of terracing is best adapted to the soils and land surfaces of their respective counties is the problem that is occupying the minds of several county demonstration agents in this section.

Most of the agents declare that all of the land in this section of the State can be terraced by what is known as flat or level terraces. Under this method the terrace is the same height or depth across the plat of land. Level terracing is especially adapted to even surfaces and soils of a sandy nature. Several representatives of A. & M. College of Texas are reported to be of the same opinion in respect to the adaptability of this means of ter

However, John Carmachael Scurry County Agent, and one or two others differ with them. Carmachael believes with the somewhat rolling surfaces and some buckshot soils of this county it is necessary to use fall or graded terracing to get the best results. He says some portions of Scurry County can be level terraced but many other communities will have to be terraced under the graded plan. This method of terracing calls for a graded bed, to be higher or deeper at the beginning than at the end or other places as is best suited for the surface of the land. Carmachael has terraced several thousand acres since coming to this county less than six months ago, and some of t has had as much as a 4 per cent

While he was attending the farmers' short course at A. & M. during the early part of this month. Carmachael mentioned the fact to sevcral agents and representatives of the college, that he had been terracing land with a fall or grade to his terraces. Most of them took issue with him, declaring that it had geen proven that the level terracing was the best and more practical for this section. Naturally, a friendly rgument resulted that could not be stisfactorily settled

In order that they may be able to each some conclusion in the matter, the agents of several counties adjoining to and including Scurry have agreed to meet at the Spur Experiment Station on Sept. 4 and 5 to experiment with the various

methods of terracing. Around 25 bankers, merchants and farmers of Scurry County will accompany Carmachael to Spur to see the demonstrations and experiments be made. It is believed that the trip and inspection of the work being done at the Spur station will be of untold value to the individuals who make the trip in better equipping them to assist their communi

ties in farming problems. Carmachael's work on terracing has been thoroughly tested in this county this year. The rainfall, in most communities, has been unusually light and has fallen in most instances in rains of short, heavy precipitation. But, where the land has been terraced, giving an even distribution of the water, the crops are good. In fields, where there has been no terracing, the plants are uneven. Along the ends of the rows and other low places the plants are much better than in the field at large, where the water drained off.
