WMU Observing One Hundred Years

The Bovina WMU of the First Baptist Church helped the National WMU celebrate its 100th birthday, Sunday evening, May 22.

Doris Lawlis, WMU Centennial chairman, put together thirty-five years of Bovina WMU history in the form of a display. The display consisted of scrapbooks, poster books, magazines, concept books, mission books, Round Table books, old-fashioned clothes, miniature home furnishings of years ago, maps, Week of Prayer posters, flowers and pictures. This display was also shown at the Beacon Heights Baptist Church in Lubbock at their "Spring Fest" one year ago.

The ladies at the celebration were dressed in early years attire and their hats were chosen from a hat display and placed on their heads as they came into the Fellowship Hall.

Mrs. Lawlis explained that the display was "God's Clutter" and had at one time been stored in her box car, "Jewel Box," named by a grandchild, Connie.

Mrs. Lawlis said that her mission interest started as a very young girl in GA's (Girls Auxiliary), when a missionary from China came to her church and taught her group Chinese words to the song, "Where He Leads Me, I Will Follow," and she said she still remembers the words.

The 100 candles on a big birthday cake were lit and the birthday party guests sang "Happy Birthday, WMU." The party was followed by refreshments of birthday cake, punch and sandwiches which served about fifty guests.

The guests enjoyed both the display, refreshments and also a video tape of the National WMU celebration from Richmond, Virginia where over 11,000 women had gathered from around the world for the 100th birthday party on May 14. Jackie Turner had taped the video live for the Bovina WMU.

The theme for the birthday celebration for WMU has been called "A Century to Celebrate, a Future to Fulfill."

In the beginning, thirty-two women from twelve states met in a basement room of the Broad Street Methodist Church in Richmond, Virginia and organized Woman's Missionary Union Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention. Texas was one of the states represented.

Texas WMU was organized in the basement of First Baptist Church in Austin in 1880, eight years before the National Organization. The 100th birthday of Texas WMU was celebrated in 1980.

Bovina WMU was organized in 1915 and Mrs. J.H. Martin was the first president. Mrs. Richard Grisham is now Bovina's Centennial director. Other WMU presidents or directors of the Bovina First Baptist Church WMU were Mesdames McDonald, Hecox, Sides, Starrs, Tidenberg, Gooch, Hawkins, Adams, Kelly, Fuller, Englant, Murphy, Cumpston, Lawlis and Barrett. The Bovina WMU will celebrate their 100th birthday in 2015.

The current officers of the Bovina WMU are: Mrs. Richard Grisham, director; Mrs. Don Murphy, president of Baptist Women; Mrs. Ovid Lawlis, Centennial chairman; Mrs. Buster Morgan, current missions; Mrs. Prentiss Pruitt, Mission Action chairman and Brother Richard Grisham teaches the Bible study.

In closing the celebration, Mrs. Lawlis held up a sign, words from Mary Martin and she had inserted the words (Woman's Missionary Union). The sign read, "I Wouldn't Have Missed My Woman's Missionary Union Life For Anything."

Mrs. Lawlis is a dedicated worker of the organization and the display at the 100th celebration showed many years of love she has for Woman's Missionary Union.

Telephone Company Seeks Rate Increase

After failure to gain acceptance of an offer to withdraw its 1984 rate filing and failure to negotiate a settlement concerning tax and expense issues, GTE Southwest has filed updated rate schedules in accordance with directives of the Public Utility Commission of Texas to update the company's unresolved 1984 filing for \$84.8 million of additional revenues. The financial information contained in the updated rate filing demonstrates the company has an \$81 million revenue deficiency based on a rate of return which is actually lower than the commission's last authorized rate of return.

(Editor's note: If the proposed rate schedule for GTE is approved, here is how it would affect Bovina customers, on local exchange access rates: the one-party business rate would jump from \$22.15 to \$33.65 per month, an increase of \$11.50 per month or 51.9 per cent.

A one-party residence rate, currently paying \$8.55 per month, would go to \$14.45 per month, a hike of \$5.90 monthly or 69 per cent. Extended Area Service (EAS) would change very little, dropping from \$3.55 to \$3.25 for business telephones and increasing from \$1.35 to \$1.40 for residences.)

GTE Southwest President E.L. "Buddy" Langley said, "The last time the company raised rates was in 1983. We have known with increased expenses and capital investments that eventually we would have to ask for increased revenues. With the downturn in the Texas economy we wanted to delay this as long as possible. However, since we are being required to update the current financials and process the merits of the rate filing, we have decided to seek the rates necessary to cover the revenue deficiency."

The company filed a petition early in 1987 to withdraw its 1984 filing, but some participants in the case resisted the move, voicing concern the company could be overearning because of changes in state and federal tax laws. As a result, the company was ordered to prepare the updated information by April 30. An extension was granted to allow for additional negotiation, but the parties to the case were unable to resolve the

issues. Langley said the four-year delay in the rate proceeding illustrates the complexities caused by deregulation and other major changes affecting the telecommunications industry in the 1980s.

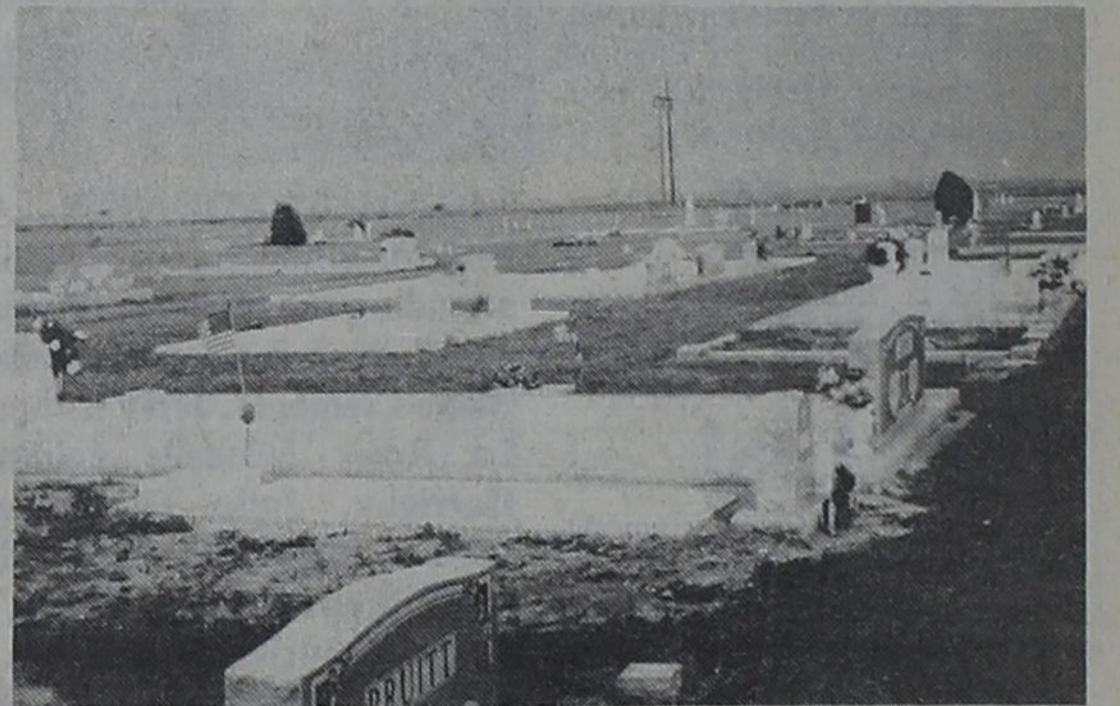
GTE initially filed for \$84.8 million in additional revenues in February 1984. Prior to hearings, the case was suspended to await a decision in another commission proceeding concerning changes brought about by the AT&T divestiture and competition in long-distance service. Due to the many complexities associated with these issues, a final order was not issued in this proceeding until September 1986.

"Our updated financials show

we are not overearning," Langley said. "We have factored in all the changes affecting the company, both positive and negative, and the result is that the company still has an \$81 million revenue deficiency."

"The reduced expenses, such as the reduction in both state and federal taxes, have been more than offset by increases in other expenses and in our investment in providing service in the state," he said.

The company now expects the administrative law judge in charge of the company's filing will set a schedule of dates to allow other parties in the case to file appropriate testimony and data, and set hearing dates to consider the new proposed rates.

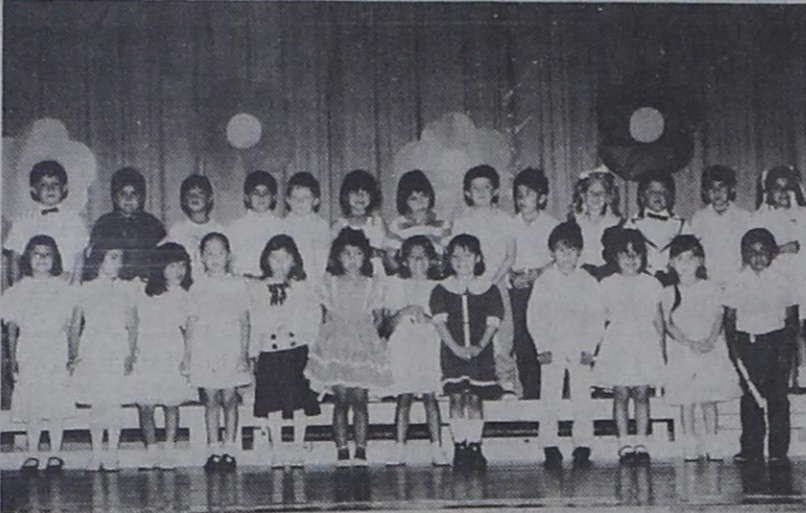

Roger Scaff of Bovina is among 346 students named to the Dean's Honor List for the spring 1988 semester at South Plains College.

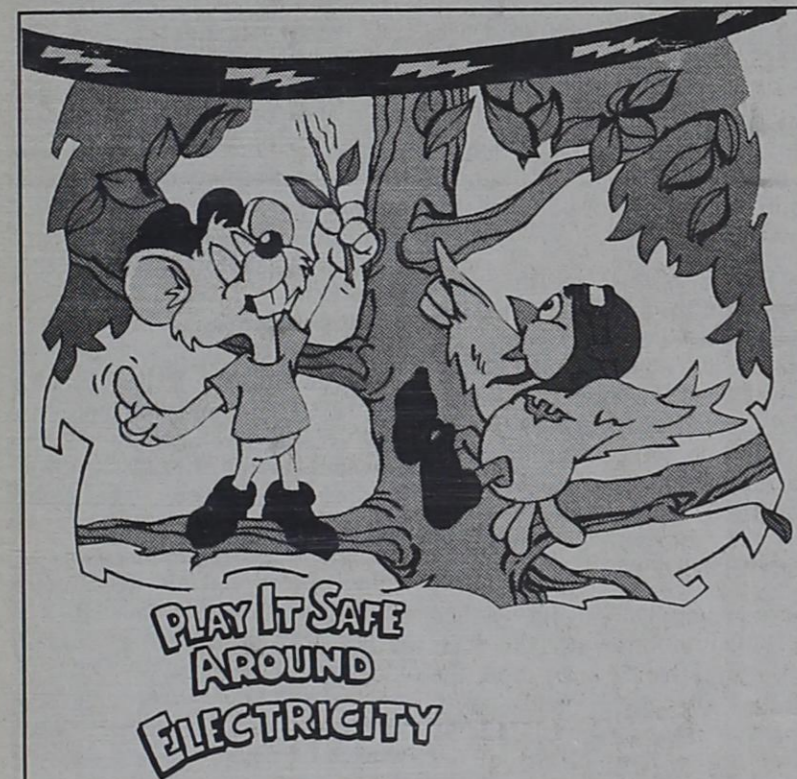

- Do not shoot at insulators on poles, towers or structures.
- Never climb on or go inside a substation fence. Call SPS to help you retrieve anything thrown into the substation or caught in its fence.
- Avoid using electrical tools like lawn mowers or hedge clippers when grass and leaves are wet.
- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

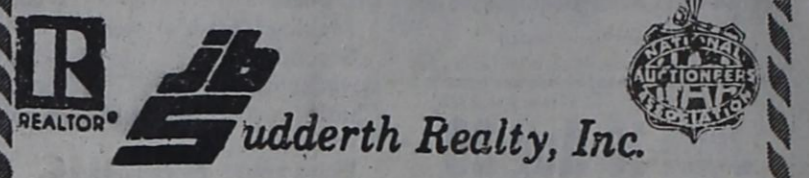
You may have had your bikes registered a few years ago, but the registration cards have been misplaced. So please bring your bikes and get them re-registered. There is no charge.
