(The Northern farmers spend from \$15.00 to \$20.00 per acre for inoculating and liming their land, then consider alfalfa their most valuable crop.)

Thousands of dollars are being lost annually by not growing from 5 to 20 acres of alfalfa per farm, where land is adaptable.

During the past few months of low priced cotton, we have all some to realize the fallacy of the one-crop idea, and the necessity of diversification of both livestock and crops.

Without feed we can not hope to keep milk cows, pigs and chickens.







Recently there appeared in the local papers of this village two articles written by students of civics in our High School.
