

well test not a grain of sand or oil indications were encountered, and that after casing off the first stream gaming. of water near the surface no other water was encountered within the 3509 feet drilled.






20,905 Bales Cotton



Last week two car loads of sheep were shipped from the J. C. Jones Ranch in the north part of Dickens county to the Fort Worth markets.


