Do Manufacturers Fix the Prices?

Many have no doubt heard the story of the preacher who had an unusually indifferent audience. He failed to get any kind of response from them, and finally he asked all those who wanted to go to heaven to stand. But few rose to their feet. In desperation he asked: "All those who want to go to hell, stand up.' One lone man arose much to the preacher's astorishment

"And why, my friend, do you want to go to hell?" the preacher asked. "Well, business has gone there,"

The manufacturer, the merchant and the professional man do not always have an easy time as is in evidence by the vast numbers of them who seek relief voluntarily, or are forced into bankruptcy courts. And yet a far greater number merely make some settlement and quit without making much fuss or receiving any publicity. Now, if manufacturers were at liberty to fix prices on their product without other things being taken into consideration, more of them would get rich and a smaller number would fail. As a matter of fact, the market for their product, the same as the market for the farm er's products, fixes prices. True, the products of the farm are subject to the unfair tactics of gambling, but gambling does not rob them of their actual value as a commodity. The fault lies in the system of marketing and distribution. If the farm ers would place themselves in a position to demand the price their product is worth, subject to the economic condition of supply and demand, the gamblers could bet to their hearts content without hurting the producer Under present conditions, producers are merely permitting the gamblers

Do manufacturers fix prices of their products? No. they merely confirm the market price by putting price tags on their products in conformity with the demand and eco nomic conditions which influence the market. Many a manufacturer has found the market below the cost of production and has sold at a sacrifice. But, if he finds that the low market is due to an oversupply, he reduces production until the demand catches up. If he finds that a coman effort to produce more cheaply or to improve his prdouct and to secure a better and more economic distribution. If he cannot accomplish this, he goes out of business.

Economic conditions combine to make a great price fixer. No manufacturer or merchant was ever able to fix an arbitrary price unless he pro duced some exclusive article in demand, or dominates the industry in which he is engaged. Even then his price tags reflect general economic conditions in his territory. Seeming ly manufacturers fix prices ,but in reality the price depends upon the demand for what they produce

Manufacturers, as a whole, are better posted on all matters affecting their business than is the farmer. They study commercial reports and read with care all printed matter which may have the least influence W. R. Stafford is a leader of the on the production and sale of their production and marketing. Some even take pride in displaying an indifference to results obtained by scientists and specialists who have devoted a lifetime to production and marketing problems. While those engaged in other industries of less importance are able to cooperate and thereby overcome many difficulties, farmers, as a class, do not rally to each other's support, but each goes his own way, taking a gambler's chance on results .- Farm & Ranch.






