Upon the strength of the cotton ginning report issued Monday, the price of cotton jumped three dollars a bale. The report showed a million bales short of former government estimates of cotton production. there being a total of 17,687,607

bales ginned of the 1926 crop. However, the three dollars a bale advance in prices did little good to producers since practically all cotton is now in the hands of buyers and speculators, thus representing a loss of approximately fifty million dollars to cotton growers through early selling.
