S. J. R. No. 33. Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas removing from the Constitution all limitations as to the amount of compensation of officers, the compensation and expenses of said officers to be provided by law, and fixing the compensation of the amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1929, and not sooner.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of

the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by inserting therein a new section to be numbered Section 30a which shall read as follows: Section 30a. All provisions of the present Constitution of Texas fixing or limiting the amount of salary or compensation of officers and members of the Legislature are hereby repealed and hereafter said officers and members of the Legislature shall receive such salary or compensation and expenses as now provided until otherwise provided by law. The salary of the Governor shall be Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,-000.00) per year, and no more, payable monthly, and he shall have the occupancy and use of the Governor's

The High School Building It became necessary at last to construct a separate high school building, and accordingly in the spring of 1924 the upper grades moved to their new home just across the street from the older one. It was this class of 1923-24 that founded the "Rowel." Although the staff of the follwing year designated their papers as Volume I, this class was the first one to select the name Rowel" for the school paper and to publish the periodical.

Supt. Watson At the close of the year 1923-24 Superintendent Cameron left, accepting a profesorship at McMurray College. Mr. J. E. Watson, then at Odessa was elected to succeed him to the superintendency. In the meantime the graduating classes have steadily grown and the number of candidates for graduaiton in '23 had reached 28. The number dropped the following year but gradually regained its former degree until there were twenty one members in the 1924-25 class. The next year doubled that of the boys, the class roll consisting of nineteen girls and nine boys.

From 1923 to the present time, the amount expended for teachers' salaries has increased from \$16,275 to \$19,690 and the total value of school property from \$42,450 to The average attendance

has grown from 120.6 to 160. During this year the students have had the first opportunity of buying school supplies from a store adjoining the campus. And also, the school colors have been changed from Red and White to Blue and Gold.

The superintendent elected for next year is Mr. Cluck, of Hubbard City, Texas; Superintendent Watson going to Post City, Texas to superintend schools there.

Future Plans This story brings us down to the present time. However, each coming year will add new facts and make more goals to fight for. 
