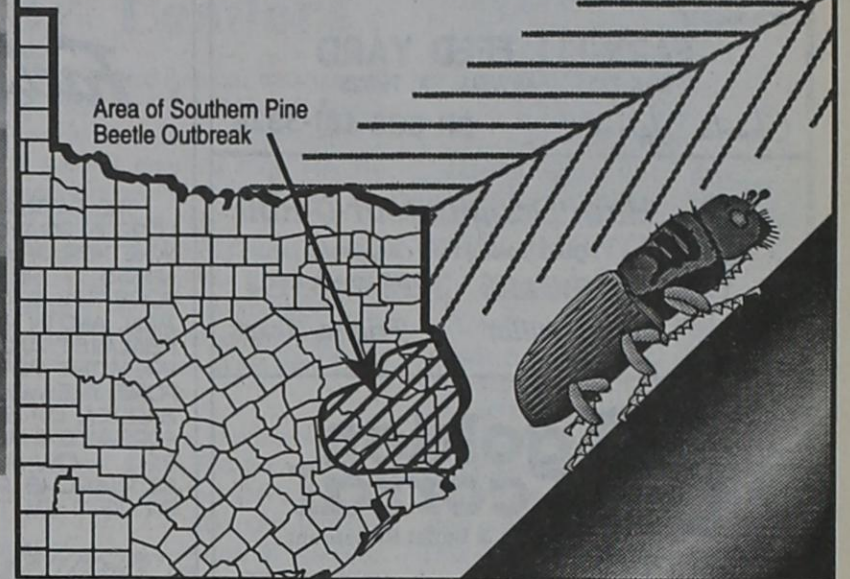
Cheyenne has one great grandmother, Lora Sikes of Lubbock, Texas.

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Detecting Infatuation

I came across some material at a seminar the other day that I thought you might benefit from. I have written about this type of thing before, but this has a different slant that might help if you are in an infatuation-type relationship.

Infatuation is a strong attraction between two people. It can lead to strong physical reactions and preoccupation. It is not the same as love. Being infatuated occurs with someone you don't really know. You can't deal with reality and be infatuated at the same time. When one comes in, the other fades.

Infatuation brings about such a strong physical reaction that many confuse it with love. The reaction or feeling tends to verify in the person's mind that this must really be serious due to the feelings they are experiencing. It's like, "How can something that feels so right be wrong?"

There is usually a mixture of pleasure and pain. You feel on top of the world and then suddenly you are depressed. It is hard for the infatuated person to see the reality of things. They have the tendency to distort or bend reality. Infatuation is not a good state of mind to be in when making serious decisions. Our thinking is clouded. The infatuation will end, but the consequences of those decisions may not.

We usually have an ideal type of person in our mind. When we become infatuated, we are usually tapping into that ideal type fantasy. We experience a "glow," and it's hard to examine those feelings because of the fear of having to give up the ideal.

What usually happens is that something causes us to come crashing down and reality hits us hard. It's easier if we can gradually ex-

amine our feelings--the shock isn't so bad. If you find yourself in a relationship that is built upon infatuation, don't despair too much--it does show that you are emotionally alive. I'm not sure some people are.

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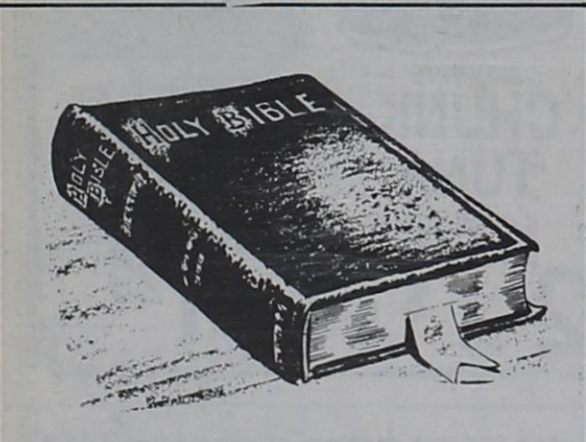

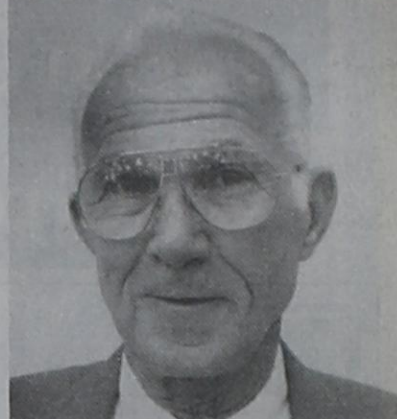
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Montgomery Is Honored By Leaders

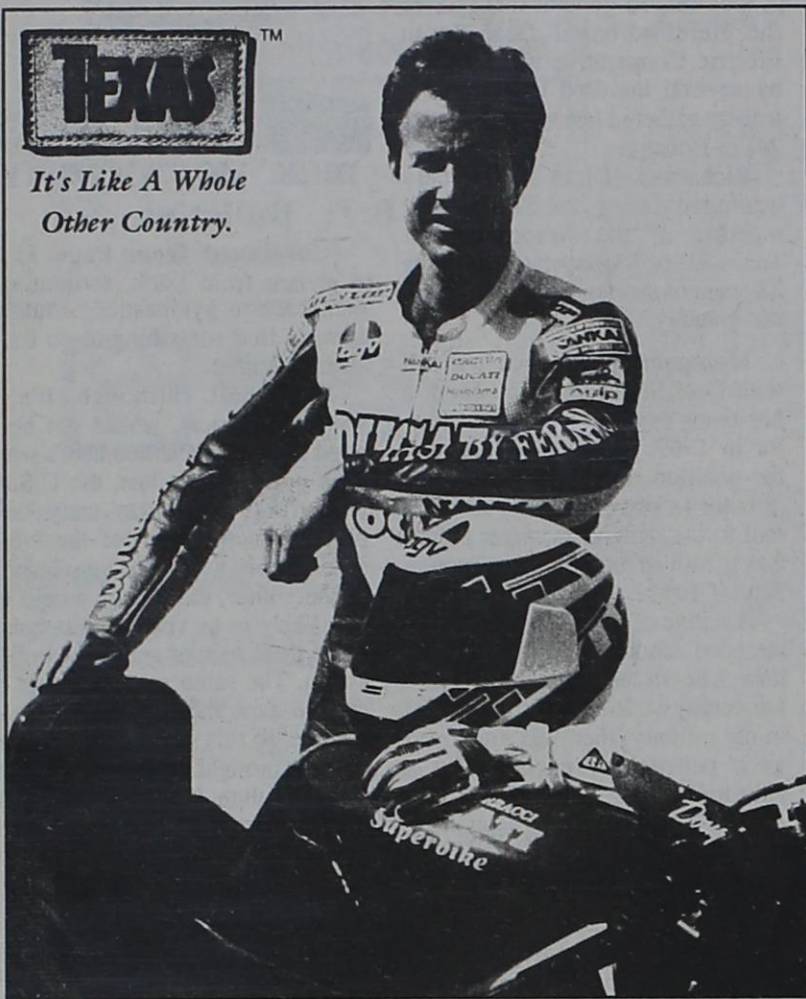

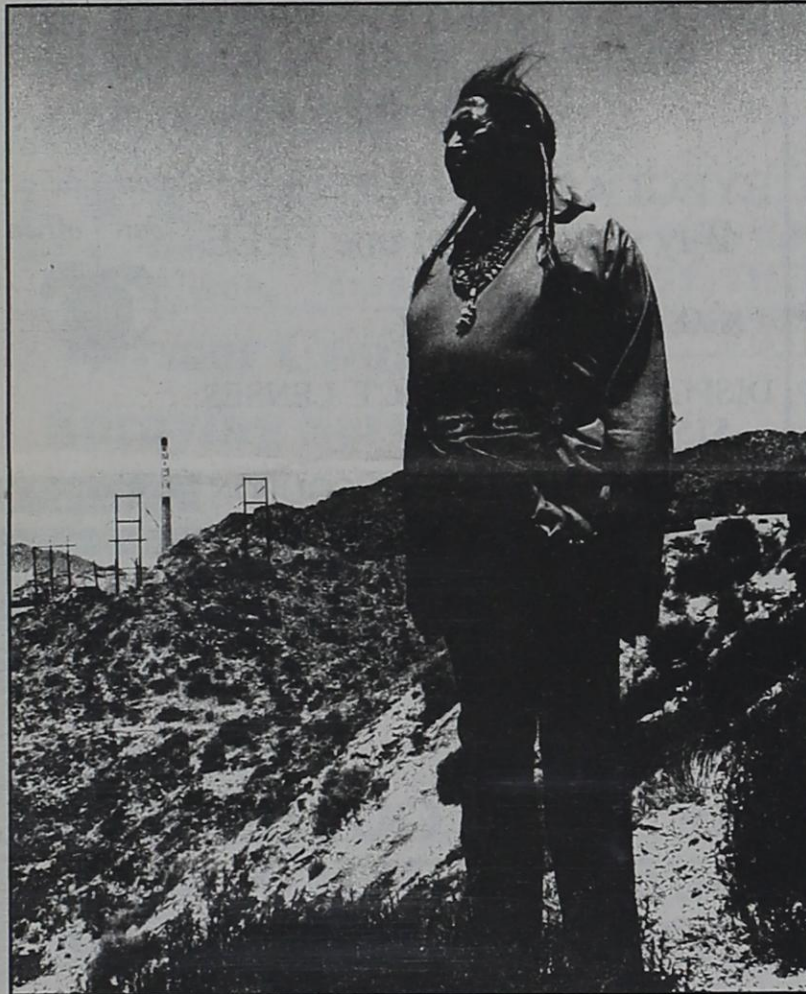

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Looking Up!

"Therefore, he (Absalom) said to his servants, "See, Joab's field is next to mine, and he has barley there; go and set it on fire." II Samuel 14:30.

What must our young people do to get our attention? In recent weeks we have seen farmers burning off their wheat stubble, but Absalom burned off Joab's barley field before it was harvested. Why? To get Joab's attention. Absalom had not seen his father, King David, in two years, and his request to Joab, David's Chief-of-Staff, to arrange a meeting with his father went unheeded. Finally, in desperation to get Joab's attention, and ultimately the attention of his father David, Absalom burned Joab's barley fields.

Too often our youth have to go to great extremes to get their parents to pay attention and hear their needs. So, like Absalom, they intentionally get into trouble, or carry on recklessly, or dress extremely, in order to say, "Hey, I am important! Listen to me! I have needs! Please care about me and see me for who I am!"

I know that there have been times when I have been guilty of not listening to my kids or to other young people. Perhaps we have all been guilty at times of giving our children money, material possessions, and even criticism, rather than what they need the most, us! Our children need us to be there when they are coping with peer pressure and struggling with self-doubt.

Youth need to know that parents and other adults will take the

time to listen to what they say and try to understand how they feel. It has been said that for youth, love is best spelled, "T-I-M-E!" Young people want us to have time for them and to spend some time with them. They really want to know we care.

Absalom felt abandoned by his own father. As King, it was certainly within David's power to find his rebellious son and bring him back home, but he did not. So Absalom took matters into his own hands. Even Joab, another adult, seemed not to care how Absalom felt, and ignored Absalom's pleas for a meeting with his father. So Absalom did what he felt he had to do to get their attention. In frustration and desperation, he burned Joab's barley fields! It worked! "Why have your servants set my fields on fire?" (v. 31) Absalom got Joab's attention and finally secured an audience with his father David. But David's denial of Absalom had evil consequences for years to come!

Hopefully, unlike David, we will not force our children to make an appointment with us before we will listen to their needs. And hopefully, unlike Joab, we won't force our young people to go to great extremes to get the attention they deserve. As summer draws to a close, why not spend a little extra time with your teenage children or grandchildren. Let them know you care and accept them for who they are. And go out of your way to let the other youth of our community know they are important to you. Time goes by so quickly, so do it now!

Help Children To Shop Wisely

When shopping with your child, you have a great opportunity to develop their skill in finding the best buy for the money. Choose an item that is something they recognize, but not something they are trying to buy, such as milk or bread. Ask them to tell you which brand, or which size container is the best buy? They may have learned some buying skills at school. Let them show you what they know. Ask them to share how they made their choice.

Take a few minutes to show them the unit price label on the shelf. This helps them spot quickly which one costs the least per ounce or pound. Then ask them how much they think the family needs. Would one size be better than another for your family? Would one type be better for the use intended? Is there some other reason why the lowest price may not be the best buy?

Share how sometimes our personal preference for a taste or texture of a food influences our choice about which one is the best buy. Some people prefer whole grain bread over enriched white bread, and are willing to pay more for it.

Explain how the giant, economy size may not be the best buy if you need only half as much. Help them see that products that look alike may have different purposes, such as skim, low-fat and homogenized milk. Show how other products that may look entirely different can be a better buy, such as non-fat dry milk for cooking; or, canned rather than fresh tomatoes for soups and sauces.

If you are shopping for clothing, let them compare the cost of brand name items with the cost of similar items having a store or generic brand. Let them figure out whether it is more important to them to have more of the items (jeans, shirts, shoes) at a lower price, or fewer at a higher price. Which is more important to them, and what trade-off are they willing to make to get what they want?

Next, choose an item on your list and give them the responsibility for finding the best buy. Build their confidence by showing them

how much they saved the family by making the best buy.

Learning to use time and knowledge to compare prices and products develops youth's resourcefulness.
