PARMER COUNTY had gross sales in 1990 of \$225,935,039. The bulk of this figure no doubt came from sales by the Excel Corp., and by the county's feedlots. These contributed around \$209,266,783 to the county's total.

Agriculture contributed \$7,490,265 to the county's income, and transportation added another \$7,418,436.

In retail sales, building materials amounted to \$9,187,282 during the calendar year. Food stores combined to sell \$8,400,739; automotive sales came to \$4,585,498; restaurants added another \$1,517,294, and miscellaneous retail sales came to \$6,843,467.

Total gross sales for the county came to \$290,324,298. These sales figures are as reported to the State Comptroller of Public Accounts.

Parmer County had just about exactly one vehicle for every man, woman and child in 1990. The total number of registered vehicles was 9,837 and the county's population was 9,863.

With four school districts within the county, we had a total of 2,526 students in 1990.

Census Bureau statistics showed that 55.7 per cent of Parmer County residents were high school graduates or higher. However, that ranked the county 222nd, only above 32 other counties in the state.

Only 8.9 per cent of the county's residents hold a bachelor's or higher degree from college, which ranks 216th in the state.

With its 9,863 population in 1990, this ranked the county 162nd among the 254 counties.

The median age of all county residents in 1990 was 30.4, and this ranked Parmer County 200th in that department. Llano County, in Central Texas, had the "oldest" population, with a median age of 55.4, and Starr County in the Rio Grande Valley, had the youngest average, at 23.9.

Parmer County's population was listed as 91.0 per cent white, which ranked it 57th in the state in that regard, and our black population was only 1.2 per cent, which ranked 175th.

The Hispanic origin population was listed at 41.5 per cent, and this was 47th in the state.

Per capita income in Parmer County was listed at \$9,087, and this ranked 211th in the state. The median household income was \$19,742, and this put the county at number 161.

The last category listed was median household value, and the county ranked about halfway down the list, tied with Potter County for 138th place with an average value of \$39,100 per home.

We found all of these figures extremely interesting, and we have the listings for all 254 counties in the categories mentioned. We'll keep this report on file, in case any reader would like to check it out.

YE EDITOR, being the official weather recorder for Friona, had a startling experience one day this week.

Always interested, I intended to check on the temperature as reported on Channel 6's weather report. The indicator gave a current temperature of 64. The high for the day, it said, had been 161, and the low had been zero.

I didn't think I had seen anything approaching those extremes on my instruments, so before I called the Associated Press, I watched further.

Board Awards Bids For 1992-93

The Bovina School board met in regular session August 10, with bids for school needs for the 1992-93 school term being major items.

A motion was passed unanimously to award the school lunchroom's milk contract to the Borden Company.

Other recommended bids on cafeteria foods were passed as brought before the board.

The transportation fuel and oil bid from Charles Oil Co. was accepted for the school term on a unanimous vote.

The 1992-93 substitute teacher list was approved as presented.

Superintendent Tommy Cathey was approved as the bonded textbook coordinator.

The board approved, on a vote of 4-3, setting the mileage reimbursement rate at 25 cents per mile. Those voting for the motion were Norma Whitten, Dennis Willard, Jerry Roach and Wes Cockerham. Voting against were Dickie Steelman, Larry Hodnett and Mike Beauchamp.

In other business, a public hearing was held on the 1991-92 Academic Excellence Indicator System, and a discussion was held on the 1992-93 group health plan.

The board went into executive session for a time to discuss matters. Following the executive session, the board voted to hire Alayne Bradshaw, teacher/coach; Ron Bradshaw, teacher; Glenn Carlyle, teacher/coach, and Robert Perez, teacher/coach.

The principals gave their reports, and Superintendent Cathey gave his.

Screening Clinic Is Scheduled In Friona

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines

The guidelines are: (1) Learn and perform breast self-examination; (2) Have a physical examination every year; (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age 35-40, one baseline

mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; over 50, yearly mammograms.

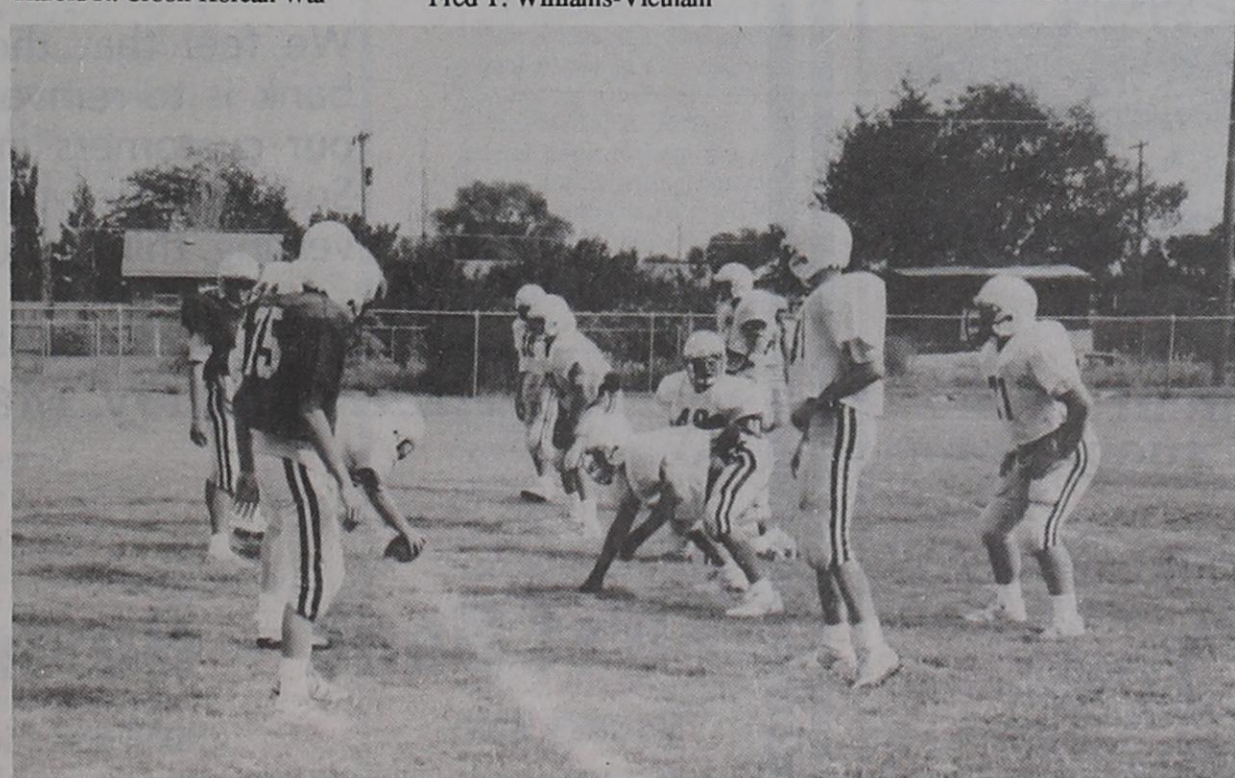

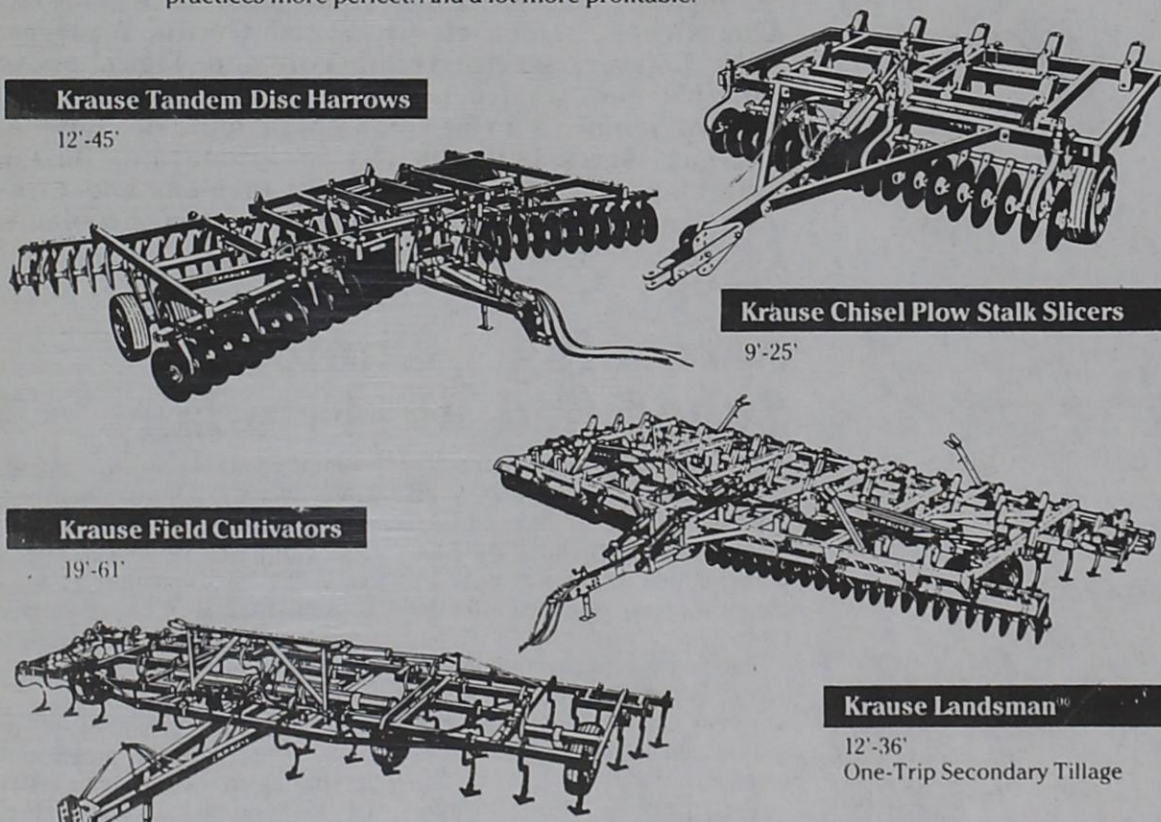

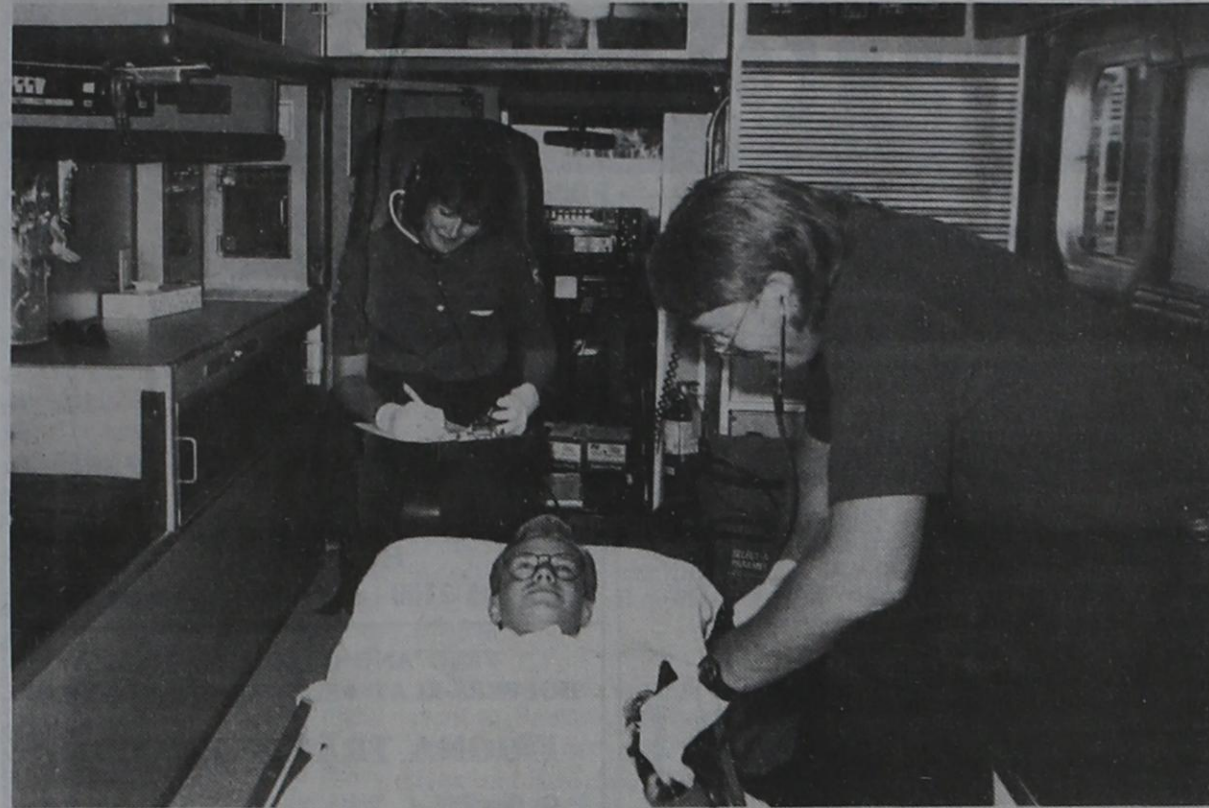

IN TOUCH EN ROUTE.....Radio equipment forms a vital link for the Panhandle Emergency Medical Services System. Radio Contact Can Be A Life-Saver

It can be a long drive by ambulance from an accident site in Parmer County to the area's sole emergency receiving center at Northwest Texas Hospital (Nwth) in Amarillo. Radio communication bridges time and distance for emergency medical crews on these prolonged runs.

A local firm is at least figuratively riding along each time an ambulance rolls in Parmer County. WT Services, Inc., a subsidiary of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative of Hereford, helps to maintain the Panhandle Emergency Medical Services System (PEMSS) a network of 17 radio repeaters scattered over the Panhandle.

WT Services sales staff, radio shops and technicians in Hereford, Amarillo and Borger work closely with NWth to upgrade and improve the system.

Radio communication is a vital link between ambulance service in communities such as Friona, Bovina and Farwell, their local hospitals, and hospitals in

Amarillo, says Kenneth Jones, PEMSS.

"Two hours or more is a long time for a paramedic to be managing a trauma victim. If paramedics have to administer medication enroute to NWth, they have to get physician clearance. Paramedics aboard ambulances can communicate with NWth via the PEMSS radio system to get such clearance, and instructions on patient care. Communication from St. Anthony's Hospital and High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo can also be patched into PEMSS radio.

"The remote location of many Panhandle communities and the need for a standard of care where all emergency services are operating under the same protocol make good radio service essential. Radio contact with the doctor while a victim is enroute to NWth can make the difference in someone living or dying," says Jones.

The Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center is also staffed with two crisis and trauma physicians. Jones says emergency ser-

vices in Friona, Bovina and Farwell can communicate with these physicians.

"We've seen a lot of rural hospitals closing, and there's a great deficit in physicians in these rural areas as well. The PEMSS communications network allows access to crisis and trauma care physicians 24 hours a day," says Jones.

While several Panhandle communities handle their own ambulance dispatching through the local police or fire department, 15 rely on the communications center at NWth for 9-1-1 service and ambulance dispatching.

Dispatchers handling 9-1-1 calls at NWth take information and get an ambulance rolling. An EMS dispatcher remains on the line with the caller to offer assistance, such as instructions on how to clear an obstructed airway, or how to perform CPR.

Among communities that count on the NWth communications center for ambulance dispatching are Amarillo, Canyon, Borger, Texline, Pampa, White Deer, Panhandle, Claude, Lake Tanglewood, Wayside and Frich. Dispatching in Parmer County is handled through local emergency agencies.

Radio equipment is currently being replaced or upgraded in some Panhandle locations to improve PEMSS.

Jay Green, WT Services sales representative in Amarillo, says that WT Services has replaced PEMSS channels to improve the emergency network.

"We have relocated towers from Hereford to Summerfield, and from Tulia to Silvertown to make the radio signals more powerful. The Summerfield site gives more coverage in the Dimmitt, Bovina and Farwell area, and the Silvertown site will cover the Tulia area and reach into isolated locations in the Rolling Plains such as Quitaque," Green explains.

Other PEMSS tower sites are located at Dalhart, Stratford, Spearman, Glazier, Dumas, Borger, Miami, White Deer, Vega, Canyon, Claude, Clarendon, near Palo Duro Canyon, and at Amarillo.

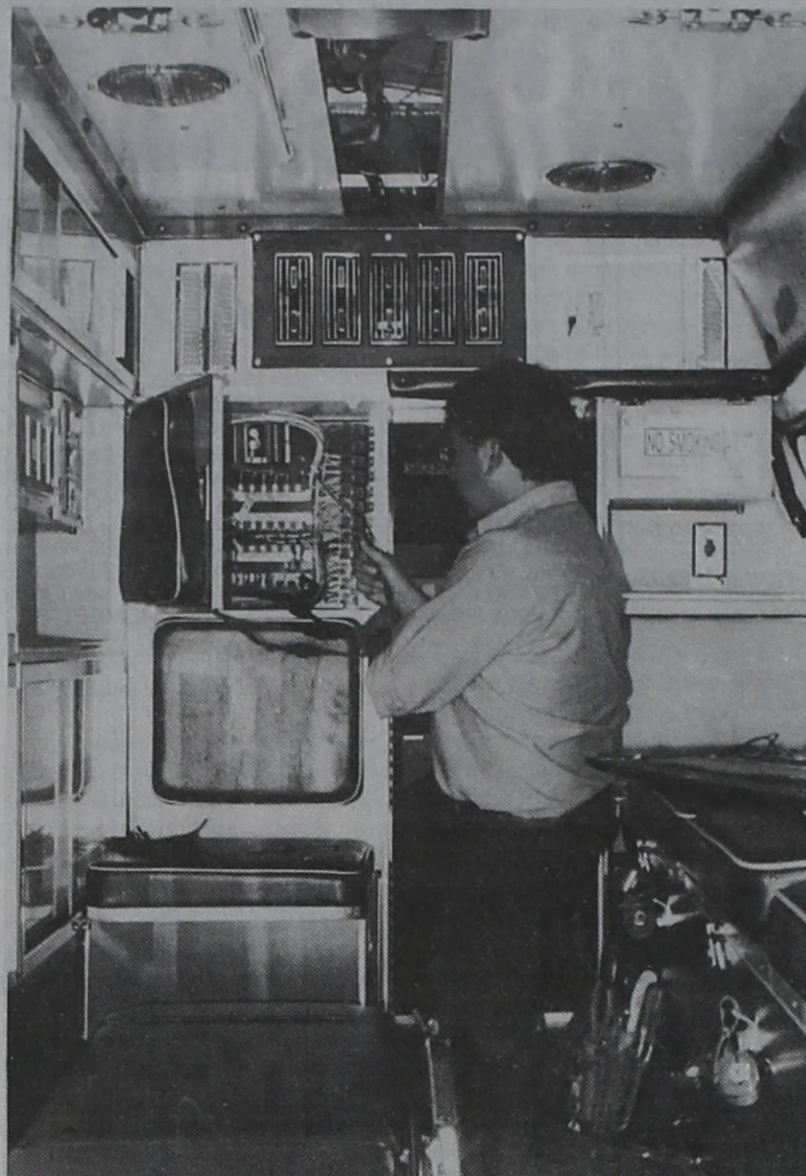
The PEMSS originated in the 1970s when the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission saw the need for a uniform EMS system in the Panhandle. PRPC received a federal grant to help put EMS in place. Participating communities received ambulances fitted with the necessary radio equipment.

Some ambulance services are still using essentially the same equipment nearly 20 years later.

Green says that if federal grants are provided, PEMSS might replace its present radios with a new, high-band system—a potential \$3 million project.

"This would give PEMSS clear channels. They could transmit data, and use microwave links that would allow running video. Such capability could put a doctor in Amarillo right in the emergency room of local hospitals, through a video hook-up," says Green.

WT Services also maintains paging systems for NWth, St. Anthony's and High Plains Baptist hospitals in Amarillo, and for Deaf Smith General Hospital in Here-

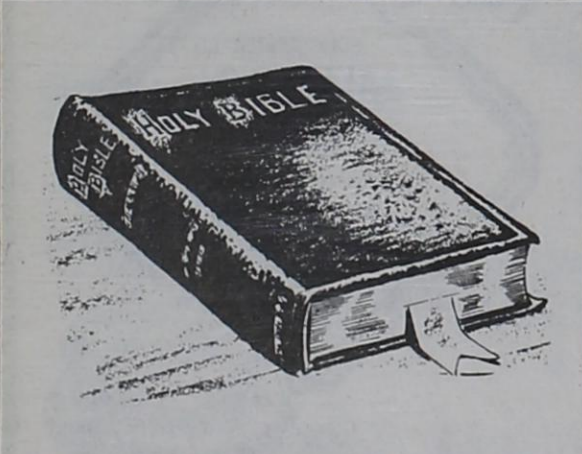
