A total of 2,443 Poll Taxes were paid by the voters of Dickens County this year. Following is a tabulation of the number of Polls paid in each voting box of the county:

It will be noted that Spur is listed as having two voting boxes. Burlington Avenue is the dividing line of the two boxes, the West side being in box 10 with 586 polls, and the East side being in box 16 with a poll of 330.

In each voting box there are exemptions of both oxers and unders not included in the poll list, the total number of the county probably being 200, making the total voting strength approximately 2,650.

Dickens High School Boys Win Basket Ball County Championship

At the Dickens County Athletic Meet held February 17th in Dickens, the Dickens High School boys won the basket ball championship of the county, over all other county contestants.

This Dickens County championship Ball Team of boys is made up of the following members: David McAteer, Loren Harkey, Odis Lusk, Fay Slough, Cyrus-Beechley, Grady Edgar, Charley Street and Troy Drennan. The team will go to Lubbock to contest in the district meet, and all of Dickens county is backing them to win the district championship and be among the state contestants at a later date.

Dickens High School Girls Win Tri-Banner

The Dickens High School Girls on February 10th won the Basket Ball Banner among the schools of Dickens, McAdoo and Croton. This banner was bought by the above mentioned schools four years ago, and the school who won it two years in succession got to keep it. The first year Dickens won, the second year Croton, and the last two years Dickens won by defeating McAdoo by a score of 25-6, and Croton was defeated by a score of 8-3. This shows that Dickens Girls had McAdoo and Croton Girls out-classed, for they stayed ahead all during both games. Therefore Dickens Girls won the Banner permanently, and it will be a trophy for the Dickens High School for years to come.

Jas. F. Williams Died Thursday Afternoon at Home in Spur

Jas. F. Williams died Thursday afternoon at three o'clock at his home in Spur, following an illness protracted over several months. Funeral services will be held today, Friday, at three o'clock.

Jas. F. Williams was one of the pioneer business men of Spur, having come here in 1910 or 1911 and engaged in the drug business. He was a man of strong convictions and solid ideas. He contributed of his means and service to public interests. He for years served on the school board and contributed materially in advancing and promoting school and educational interests. He was interested in politics and for years also served as County Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee. He talked little but did much for the public good. He was on the right side of public questions and issues and was ready to defend the right on every occasion. Jas. F. Williams was a real man, a good citizen, and a friend. The town and country sustains a loss in his death.

West Texas Gas Co. Will Furnish Gas in Spur Within Year

During the week the West Texas Gas Company, with headquarters in Amarillo, have had representatives in Spur seeking a franchise from the City Commission to furnish natural gas to the people of Spur. The franchise contract has been signed by the City Commission and forwarded to the Amarillo headquarters for the acceptance of the gas company.

The franchise provides that until 550 users of gas are obtained, a monthly charge of \$1.50 will be made after which \$1.50 per month will be the minimum monthly charge, with rates for domestic purposes ranging from 67½ cents per cubic foot up to 50,000, to 40 cents in excess of 150,000 cubic feet; and for industrial purposes a rate of 45 cents up to 50,000 cubic feet, down to 16½ cents for 60 million cubic feet.

The company will run a pipe line from Crosbyton into Spur and have gas provided to users in the city not later than March 31st, 1929. However, we are assured that gas will be provided to users for domestic purposes in Spur in time for the next winter season.

This is one of the biggest propositions secured for Spur, and which will materially benefit every citizen and household in the city. The piping of natural gas to Spur will mean thousands of dollars fuel saving to the town and the citizenship, and the City Commissioners are to be congratulated in issuing the franchise at this time.

E. J. Cowan Will Head a Home Building and Loan Syndicate Here

W. E. Young of Amarillo, was in Spur this week, arranging for the establishment of the Security Thrift Bond Syndicate of Denver in the city of Spur. E. J. Cowan will be the local representative of the syndicate, and upon the completion of the organization of the business will be prepared to finance home building propositions in Spur.

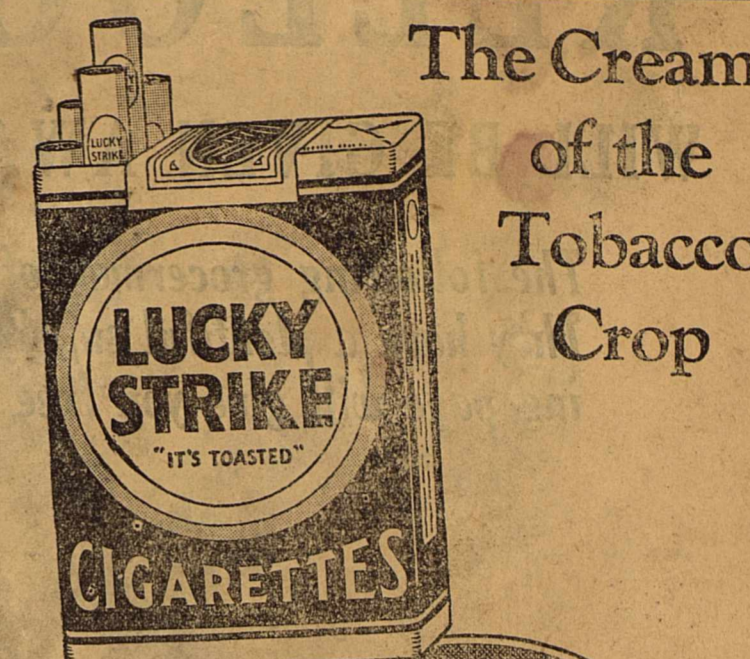

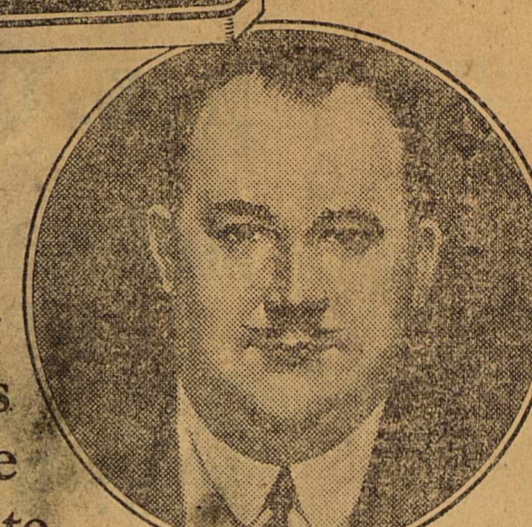

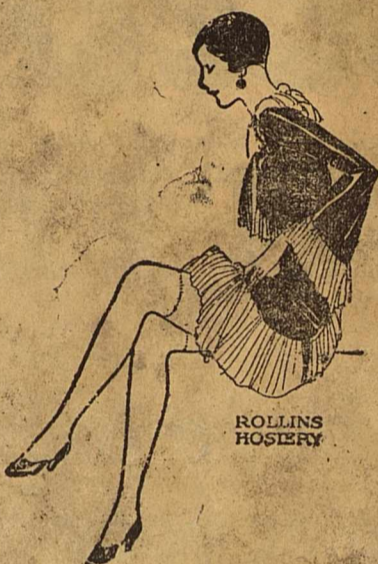
