Wormy pullets are always hungry, yet poor, thin and lean. At For County Judge and School Sup't. the age of six weeks to three or four months round worms cause the most harm.

To determine whether or not the flock is affected, four or five unthrifty birds should be killed and the intestines examined. The intestines should be opened the whole length from gizzard to blind pouches.

Tobacco Treatment We do not know of a treatment that is entirely satisfactory. Several patent preparations are on test and sometimes in the near future wa will know more about their actual value. The tobacco treatment consists of feeding fine ground stems, fresh and of a 11/2 % nicotine content. Mix 2 or 3 pounds with each 100 pounds of dry mash. Be sure mash, this is very important for best results. Feed this for a period of 3 or 4 weeks then skip one or two weeks and repeat the treatment. Nicotine capsule treatment, also is satisfactory. 




