FARMERS SHORT COURSE JULY 30TH TO AUGUST 4TH.

Farmers and their families, boys nd girls of 4-H Clubs, members of ome demonstration clubs and of arious organizations allied with agicultural pursuits are expected to and girls of 4-H Clubs, members of home demonstration clubs and of various organizations allied with agricultural pursuits are expected to gather in record breaking numbers at the A. & M. College of Texas for the nineteenth annual Farmers' Short Course this summer, H. H. Williamson, vice-director and state agent of the Extension Service, declared following a survey of plans and preparations for the forthcoming meeting. The Short Course will be held this year the week of July 30-August 4. Most of the details for the meeting have been worked out and complete program is to be announced soon.

The scope of the short course program will be as extensive as ever this year, with talks and demonstrations on virtually all branches of farming, livestock and poultry raising and home making, scheduled. In order to facilitate matters and to prevent as many cnoflicts in the various meeting as possible, the program for men has been divided into three main sections, livestock, po 'ltry and crops. The livestock secmen will deal with beef cattle, sheep oats, hogs and dairying, while the crop section will be devoted to the main field crops, farm engineering fruit truck, and pecan culture.

The program for women and girls will include courses in food preparation and preservation, relation of food to health, appropriate clothing for the family, interior home decoration, home and yard beautification gardening, poultry raising, and dairy

Among the many state contests to be held during the short course will be the 4-H club girls appropriate dress contest, womens' judging of butter, 4-H club boys contests in judging livestock and grain and in terracing and state poultry judging contest for both boys and girls.

Meetnigs of numerous special in various phases of agricultural development have been scheduled for the short course period. Among these are the Texas Beekeepers Association, Texas Agricultural Writers service group of the Texas Farm Bureau Extension Service and Experiment Station workers, county school superintendents, county commissioners, county judges and oth-

The same method of handling the lodging and feeding employed last year in caring for the 4,000 who attended the short course, will be in effect again this year, Mr. Williamson said. The rate for rooms will be \$1.50 for each person for the entire week and the cost of meals for the entire five days will be \$5, according to announcement. Railroads have again been authorized special rates to College Station for the meeting.

Shortcake Like Ma Made

Strawberry shortcake like mother used to make has staged a return to popular favor.

It's back on the dinner table again in its old-fashioned splendor, whipped cream and all, back after biscuits and cake dough have begun to pall on the whimsical American palate. And is it a toothsome dainty, that shortcake of

Try the appended recipe in your oven and let the mouth-watering result speak for itself.

Old-Fashioned Shortcake.

Ingredients: Two cupfuls of flour four teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one-half teaspoonful of salt, six table spoonfuls of margarine or butter, three quarters of a cupful of milk, also two tablespoonfuls of sugar, if slightly sweetened dough is preferred.

Sift the dry ingredients together, cut or rub in margarine or butter until mealy looking, and add milk to make soft dough. Flour board well, toss dough onto it, sprinkle flour over dough, and roll the mass out one-half inch thick. Cut with a large biscuit cutter for individual shortcakes, while for one shortcake, divide dough into two equal parts, rolling each one just to fit a deep cake pan. Place one on top of the other, set in ungreased baking pans and bake at 450 Fahrenheit for about twelve minutes.

When done, slit in two crosswise. spread one-half generously with margarine or butter, then with berries. placing the other half on top and cover this with whipped cream and

BANKERS PROVIDE STUDENT LOANS

American Bankers Association Completes Plan to Award 167 College Economic Scholarships Throughout Nation.

AWARDS TO START THIS FALL

Students in Agricultural Economics to Be Helped in Farm States-Will Also Facilitate Entry Into Business Life.

One hundred and sixty-seven collegiate loan scholarships will be provided by the American Bankers Association, 98 of which are now being proffered to 71 selected colleges and universities in 34 states, it has been announced by John H. Puelicher, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Association's Foundation for Education in Economics. The foundation fund of \$500,000 was started in 1925 to commemorate the Association's fiftieth anniversary and its aim is to stimulate and aid worthy men or women students to pursue courses in banking and economics in collegiate institutions throughout the country.

The scholarship awards will be available for the scholastic year beginning this fall and will provide recipients with unit loans of \$250, to be repaid on easy terms following their entry into earning business life. In several farm states, it is provided, scholarships shall be specifically awarded in agricultural economics.

A special feature of the plan in addition to its educational advantages is that scholars, upon discharge of all their financial obligations connected with their loans, will be given certificates of honorary membership in the foundation signed by the members of the board of trustees, which will be available as evidence of financial reliability for their use in starting their business careers.

Plan of Operation The general plan allots scholarships to higher institutions of learning in states where the banks have completed the subscription quotas assigned them in the foundation fund. Institutions are selected on the basis of type of school, educational standards, geographical distribution and desire to co-operate in the plan. A scholarship committee is to be created in each selected institution, to consist of members of the faculty and a prominent banker. All scholarship applications must be made formally through the college committees and not direct to the foundation. Three home-town references are required of each applicant, at least one of whom must be a banker. Only students of junior or higher grade in banking and economic courses are eligible and those who have also attended American Institute of Banking courses will

be given preference. Easy Terms

Scholarship payments will be given only to those whose means of education are dependent in whole or part upon their own efforts and will continue only during satisfactory scholastic standing or conduct. The loans are at five per cent beginning the first day of the second January after the date the scholar leaves school, with no interest on repayment made prior to that time. Loans may be paid off in monthly installments of \$10 or more. After three installments have been promptly met payments may be placed on a quarterly basis until the oan is wiped out which must occur within three years. In cases of delinquencies, consideration will be given o special circumstances, such as ill ealth or unavoidable unemployment.

BIG FACTORS IN PRODUCING MILK

Because of the prevailing high prices of feeds much stress has been laid on weeding out the poor cows and keeping only those that produce only if the cows have been properly fed and cared for, states E. A. Gauntt, assistant dairy specialist at

the New Jersey College of Agriculture. "Two factors must be considered in milk production, namely, inherited ability of the cow to produce milk, and feed and care. The importance of proper feeding was proved recently by the Minnesota experiment station, which purchased four poor cows from a member of a cow-testing association. This man thought he had fed his cows properly. He bought large quantities of mill feeds. He fed a mixture of 90 parts of bran, 80 of middlings, 18 of ready-mixed feed and 4 of oil meal. He fed five pounds of this to each cow daily. The cows were on pasture six months. This feed cost him \$49.46 a cow and the average milk production was 4,662 pounds of milk and 182 pounds of fat. His net profit was \$37.90 per cow.

"After the college purchased them their feed was changed to a balanced ration and instead of feeding each cow five pounds, they were fed according to the amount of milk thy produced-in other words, the more milk they gave, the more feed they were given. The cows were kept on pasture only five months instead of six, and got alfalfa hay and corn silage instead of timothy. This change boosted the average to 6,375 pounds of milkan increase of 36.7 per cent, The butterfat increase was 77 pounds per

in Handling Dairy Bull A few days ago a Fort Collins man was killed by his Holstein bull. He was leading the bull into the barn by means of a halter and lead strap when the accident occurred. This is only one more added to the great list of people who have been killed or seriously injured by bulls, states L. P. McCann of the animal husbandry department, Colorado Agricultural college, who adds that this accident, like many others, could have been avoided if the handler had not trusted the bull.

Every dairy bull, warns Professor McCann, should be regarded as a pofrom careless handling proves this to be true. In spite of this men and women continue to risk their lives every day, thinking that their bulls are different from the others that have already taken a toll of lives.

For the man who handles one of these animals, the small amount of money required to buy a good bull staff is about the cheapest life insurance in which a man can invest.

Self-Feeding Cows Not Profitable at Illinois

Tests were recently made at the

University of Illinois on eight dairy cows to determine the value of self feeding. The practice was not eco nomical nor were the milk yields appreciably increased.

For a short period after calving the amount of feed consumed was too small. Later it was too large, and the cows increased in weight. The animals were not injured by the practice because they were gradually accustomed to it.

The chief purpose of the test was to determine the relative palatability of different feeds. Corn proved most palatable of the low protein concentrates. Complete details may be obtained by writing for Bulletin 289 published by the Illinois experimen: station, Urbana.

Buying Dairy Cows

When buying cows at a closing out sale of a man who has been in a test association, one gets a chance at cows that have records. The better cows are mostly worth the money they bring, especially if hey have not had the best of care. If one buys such a cow that has the earmarks of a dairy cow and has a fair record with ordinary care, and takes her home and feeds her and makes her comfortable do her part.

Danger in Warm Cream

It is a common practice among farmers to keep cream too warm even in winter. Cream should never be allowed to freeze, because it is then hard to get representative samples. In order to avoid this, some producers keep their cream near a stove or in sour or to absorb bad odors or both In order to produce the highest quality cream, it is necessary to be provided the year around with a cool place, free from all contaminations.



TURKEYS REARED LIKE CHICKENS

Turkey rearing has been profitable when click rations and methods of management have been used during growing period. The results of four years' experimental work with turkeys at Purdue university has shown that the turkey is very similar to the chicken in its feed and management requirements, in spite of the general belief that it belongs to the range country, must be hatched by hens, fed a special diet and given an endless amount of care the first few weeks of brooding.

Turkeys have been reared on limited grass range, confined to pens with outside platforms for direct sunlight and in pens with no direct sunlight when the ration carried 2 per cent cod liver oil.

The "all mash" and grain and mash type chick rations have been used with equally good results. When the "all mash" ration was used succulent feed, liquid milk, grit and grains were not fed, with apparently no unfavorable effect on the growth or mortality

The factors that have been found most important for brooding are: 1. A good brooder with a temperature of 100 degrees Fahrenheit under the Lover the first two weeks and adequate heat as long as the poults show a need for it. 2. A good chick ration fed in the same way one would feed chickens. 3. A clean pen and clean range (if used) throughout the growing period.

Wet Mashes Should Be

Goslings should be fed soft feeds, up of say four parts corn meal, three parts wheat bran and one part red dog, Five per cent of meat scraps should be added when one week old. This mash may be mixed with water or skim milk and fed in a trough, if scalded and allowed to cool so much the better. One precaution, which many beginners do not take, is necescertain amount of grit. This should consist of fine clean sand, which may be put in the bottom of the drinking dishes or added to the mash, one pound of sand to 100 pounds of mash. This mash should be fed four times daily for the first two weeks; three times daily for the next two weeks, and then, morning and night will do, provided, of course, they have plenty of range.

Heavier Breeds Useful

for Raising Broilers Heavier breeds should be used for broiler production, even though they do mature slightly less rapidly than light breeds. Any of the heavier breeds will be found satisfactory—the particular breed adopted for the purpose depending for its success upon the way it is handled. Just as we often make the statement that there is no best breed for egg production, so we will make the statement that there is no best breed for broiler production. There is a greater variation between the individuals within a breed than there is between breeds, and for this reason it is advisable to select the best that the breed offers and then proceed to handle the flock in the most approved manner to get the best results possible.

Close Inbreeding With

Turkeys Is Dangerous Close inbreeding with turkers, as with all forms of live stock, must be carefully guarded to safeguard vitality. If you had but one old turkey hen so that you know that the young tom and young hens to which you refer are full brother and sister, there might be some danger in mating them, unless they are all especially strong and well developed. If you had more than one hen last year so that these birds might be only partly lessened; but vitality and developmust always be guarded.
