I would like to have the office, mainly because I feel I can render service that will bring the taxpayer one hundred cents for every dollar paid.



COUNTY SUICIDE IS

NEW KIND OF TRAGEDY Death from suicide, a verdict given when James County, Tennessee, voluntarily wiped itself off the map of the United States as a separate entity, may become a popular method of saving expenses and improving public welfare in the country.

A tax rate of \$2.60, effective before the voters of that section decided to amalgamate with Hamilton County, was changed to \$1.30 after the amalgamation became effective, the Farm and Firside magazine points out.

"We got ten times as much for our tax money as we did before the consolidation," says T. J. Smith, one of the oldest residents in what was James County, quoted in the magazine. Where there were nineteen schools in James County alone before the change there are now ten schools, with better equipment better teaching staffs, and they are operated at less expense.

"Automobiles and telephones nowadays make a county seat every few miles a senseless encumbrance on the public purse," says the magazine. No one knows how many needless sets of county officers and unnecessary courthouses are keeping farm taxes high and delaying improvements."







Car Kills Man Sleeping on Road near Lockney

Richard Gray, 28, of Goree, Texs, was the victim of an unusual tragedy at an early hour Monday morning when he was struck by an automobile while sleeping on the Ploydada-Plainview highway, and was instantly killed. The accident occured at about 3:30 o'clock Monday morning when Gray and Floyd Smith, 21, of Munday, who were walking to Plainview, sat down in the road to rest. A transient automobile struck Gray across the chest and passed on, unheeding the call of his companion.

Smith in giving the details of the accident to Sheriff P. G. Stegall, stated that they had ridden from Floydada to Aiken with L. D. Mc Reynolds, of Aiken, and were walking the remainder of the way to Plainview where Gray's family was visiting with relatives. Approximately nine miles east of Plainview, they sat down in the road to rest and fell asleep. Smith was awakened by Gray's screams, and before help could be summoned from the neighboring farm houses, he was dead. His shoulder had been broken and his ribs crushed into his

According to Sheriff Stegall's theory of the accident, the occupants of the automobile had not seen the two men, and were unconscious of the fact that they had run over anyone. The injuries inlicate that the bumper of the car struck the man across the chest and the wheels never passed over the body. Stegall does not believe that the dead man is the victim of a 'hit and run" driver.

The deceased is survived by his wife and three small children, of Goree, who were visiting with D. Norris, of Plainview, at the time of the accident. His body was taken to a Lockney undertaking parlor. Floyd County Hesperian.

MONGRELIZED COTTON A

BIG LOSS TO FARMERS

College Station .- The continual planting of gin-run mongrelized cotonseed by so many farmers and the planting of too many varieties in a community is costing the farmers of Texas millions of dollars every year and is a mark of backwardness in the cotton industry that should be corrected as rapidly as possible, E. A. Miller, agronomist Extension Service, A. & M. College of Texas told the crops and farm engineering group at the nineteenth annual Farmer's Short Course. His subject was "Cotton Standardization by Communities."

"By growing the different varieties in the same community the seed become badly mixed at the public gins crossing takes place in the fields and the seed run out." Mr. Miller said. "Even if good seed produce an uneven fibre which the milis do not want because there is too much waste in spinning uneven cotton. It is getting more difficult for the spinner and the automobile manufacturers to obtain even running lots of fibre which they require.

It is only in communities where the farmers get together and plant one variety of cotton that the seed can be kept pure and the production of superior cotton made possible. Office in Cowan Bldg. The one variety communities by producing commercial quantities of the same kind of uniform cotton can establish a special market relation that unorganized communities could not possibly obtain. The main things holding the movement back are that too many farmers in every community have some pet variety which they do not want to give up because they have not been getting the proper premium when sold on the isual 'hog a-round market."

> A recent survey shows that coton variety standardization has been worked up by county agents in fifty-nine communities in twenty-three ounties of the state and that many nore communities have made a start, Mr. Miller added. "The survey also shows," he said, "that wherever the cotton was pooled or old through a marketing asociation brought an average of \$7.85 a

My opponent states that he was commissioned only seven days but to my own personal knowledge he has been working since November, most of the time. Mr. Rawlings says I am ignorant, but I have the job done and would not make the same remarks about him-as I was taught better when a child.

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
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
