RONALD REAGAN has been in office only a couple of weeks, but we like the things he has done in that short time. The few actions he has taken give evidence that already he is working to cut down on needless spending, and help the country's sagging economy.

The president's first major act was to declare a freeze on the hiring of government employees. This was a move aimed at cutting down on federal spending, mainly through the control of the bureaucracy.

If Reagan can accomplish nothing else during his term of office, trimming the number and size of government agencies could be the most important legacy he could leave for his country.

The work of these agencies in recent years has approached the gestapo stage, and frankly, we don't need this type of "Big Brother" activities in our country. Hopefully, these bureaucracies have not become so rooted that they cannot be pruned, trimmed, or just uprooted altogether.

So many programs need to be re-worked, such as the food stamp program. We understand that the food stamp program has been much abused, and costs the taxpayers millions of dollars each year.

For the most part, the middle class and lower middle class taxpayers are getting sick and tired of having not only to make a living for themselves and their families, but virtually add another family to their responsibility.

It would be nice to trim this downward, to just your own family again, plus perhaps the very old and needy.

Then this week, Reagan announced the scrapping of the former administration's program which was to require the teaching of native languages other than English by the school systems.

This program was ridiculous from the start, and it's bad we have to have a new president to remind us that the federal government cannot be all things to all people.

The teaching of Spanish to children in this area would not have been so bad (except that we think it should have been taught to all children, and not just those with Spanish-speaking backgrounds). The rub came where Vietnamese immigrants, for example, demanded their language be taught to their children.

As was stated, America may be the world's melting pot, but at the same time it must maintain its own identity.

GOOD NEWS on the business front this week is the announcement by Karen and Daryl Kirkpatrick, that they will open a store in the former Isaac's location.

Bovina does not have a business to spare, and while we regret losing the Isaacs from the business community after a number of years, the announcement by the Kirkpatricks assures us that an outlet of that nature will remain here.

WE CONGRATULATE Bovina on securing Home Box Office (HBO) to its cable system. The addition of HBO to the cable lineup puts Bovina cable viewers on a par with those in cities the size of Amarillo and Lubbock.

We also salute the owners of the cable company for the strides they have made in recent years. The additions of the other channels to their regular service, such as the Lubbock channel, PBS, the Atlanta and Chicago stations, have made our cable system a true bargain.

Court Approves Dues Various Associations

It was "dues paying" time for the Parmer County Commissioners at a mostly routine meeting in the court's regular session Monday, January 26.

Annual dues of \$40 were paid for membership in the Panhandle County Judges and Commissioners Association. Dues of \$100 were paid to the County Judges and Commissioners Assoc. of Texas, and \$25 was paid for County Attorney Johnny Atkinson's dues in the Texas District and County Attorneys Assn.

At the suggestion of Mrs. Benna Felts, County Treasurer, a motion was passed to put \$18,000 of money from the Right of Way fund in a certificate of deposit to mature on March 31, 1981.

In other business, the commissioners approved payment of medical expenses for Anthony Mauldin, in the amount of \$33.

Herschel Allen of the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corp. appeared before the court to explain

the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) that his group administers. A motion was passed to continue the county's participation in the program.

George Louder of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission appeared before the court to explain some of the programs his group administers.

The list of members of the Parmer County Historical Commission was approved.

After much discussion about the increased costs of travelling, a motion was passed to increase the mileage allowance for county employees to 25 cents per mile.

Sheriff Bill Morgan reported on the cost of jail food, discussed recently. The court agreed to purchase a 20-foot food freezer, and that "T.V. dinners" be served as jail meals, in order to provide a more balanced meal at less cost.

Motion was passed approving soil conservation work as follows: Lester Cole, \$67.50; Joe Bob Johnson, \$87.50; Greg Bell, \$125; Larry Scott, \$12.50; James Brown, \$350; Bruce Billingsley, \$250; John E. Jones, \$140; David Engelking, \$25; Robert Gallman, \$25; and Nickey Nichols, \$25.

The payment rate for soil conservation work was raised to \$35 per hour effective February 1.

Resolution Honors Trio Of Hostages

Senator Bill Sarpalius today introduced a resolution honoring three Texans who were among the Iranian hostages who have been released. The Senate passed the resolution unanimously.

The three Texans honored by the Panhandle Senator and the full Senate are Lieutenant Commander Robert Engelman of Hurst, William Royer, Jr. of Houston and Marine Sergeant John McKeel, Jr., of Balch Springs.

The resolution praised the bravery of the three Texans, "held in captivity in Iran for 444 days by a group of barbaric fanatics." Sarpalius' resolution told of the three Texans being "subjected for 14 months to physical abuse by being bound, gagged, blindfolded, pushed and shoved often in the presence of mobs of maniacal, militant Iranians who taunted and flaunted their captives before the world."

Sarpalius, through his resolution, praised the courage, forbearance and dignity of the hostages, calling it "unsurpassed in history." The resolution also invited the three to visit the Senate for a personal welcome, heartfelt thanks, and recognition of valor. Additionally, each man will be presented with a Texas flag which was flown over the Texas Capitol on January 20, 1981, the day the former hostages were released.

"We as people have a lot to be proud of. If you don't believe that, look at these three men. These Texans have set an example for all of us. I am very proud of them, and I was glad to be able to show them the Senate is proud of them, too," Sarpalius said.

General Files Rate Request

General Telephone Company of the Southwest Friday, January 23, filed a request with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for \$44.6 million in new revenues.

F.E. Hightower, vice president-revenue requirements, said major factors contributing to the need for additional revenues are continued inflation, record-setting gross construction expenditures, growth and new technology.

Refreshments were served to those attending.



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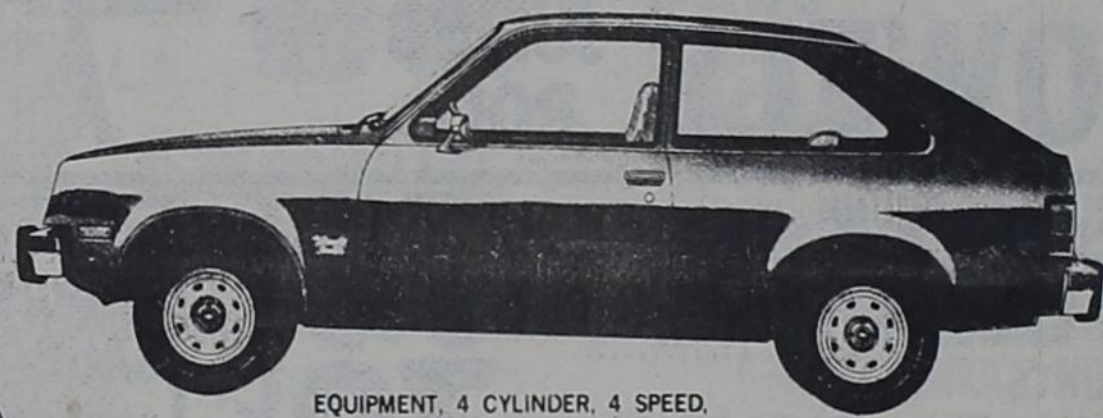


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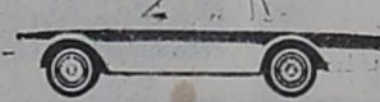


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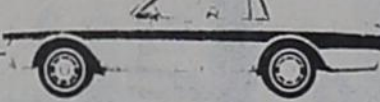
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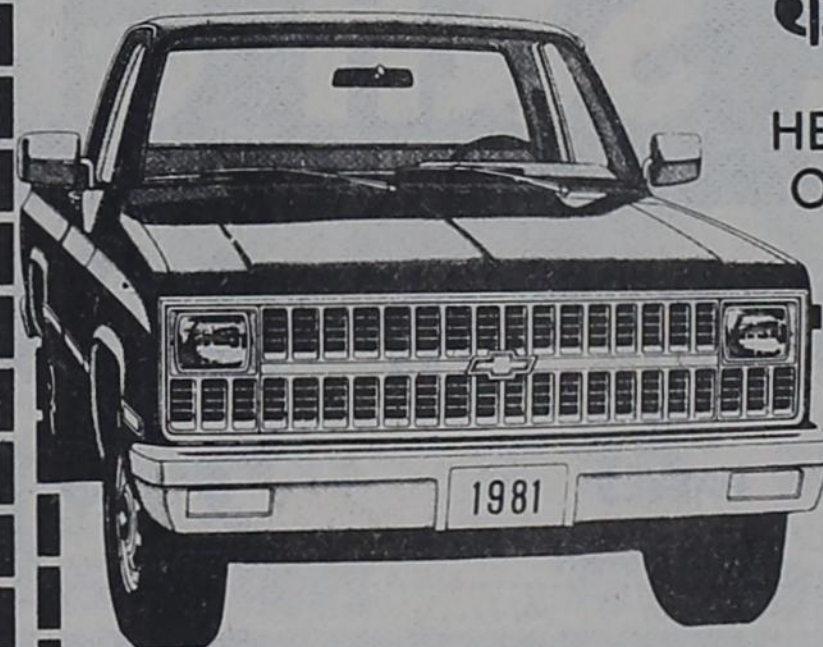
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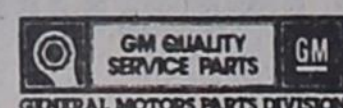
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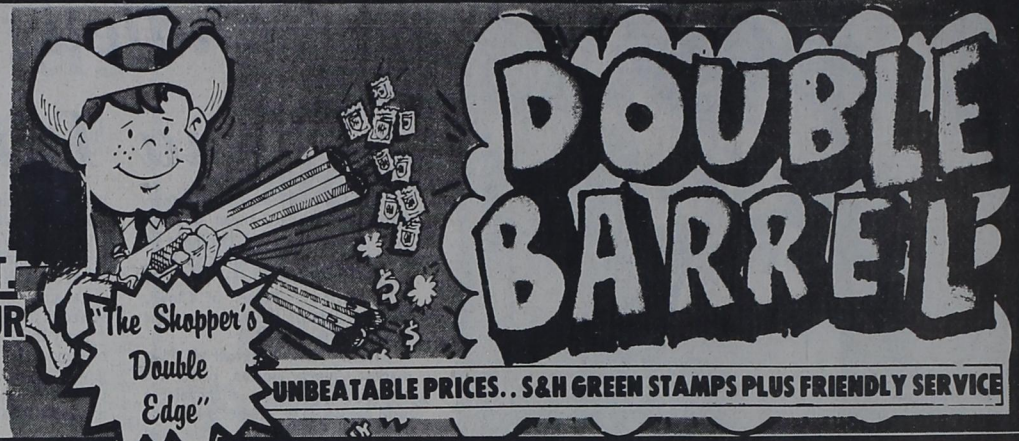

Mrs. Looney was also honored Monday morning with a get-together in the home of Shirley Ware with several friends and family members helping her to celebrate her birthday.

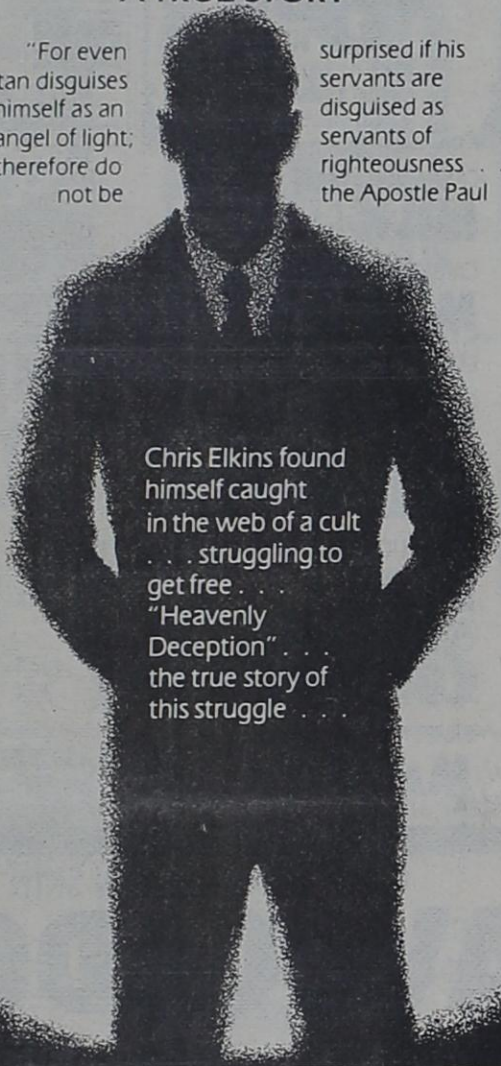

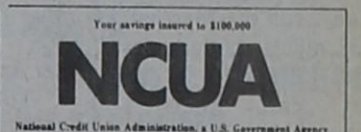
Haney was a Baptist and a veteran of World War I.

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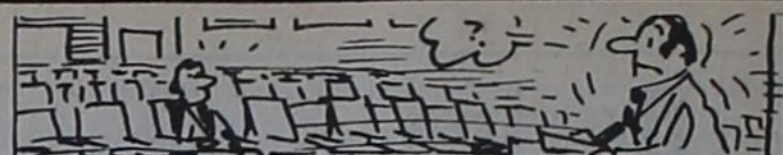
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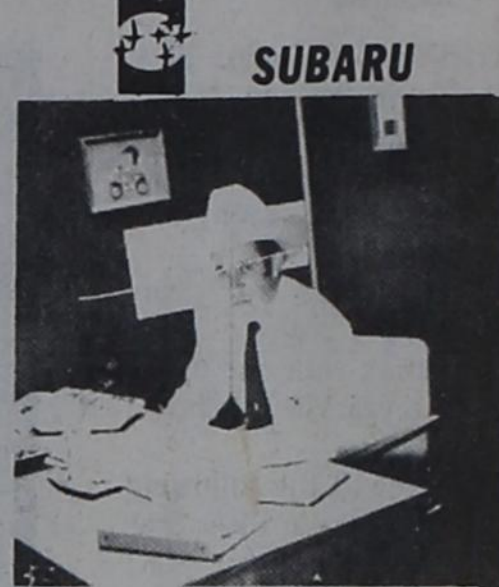


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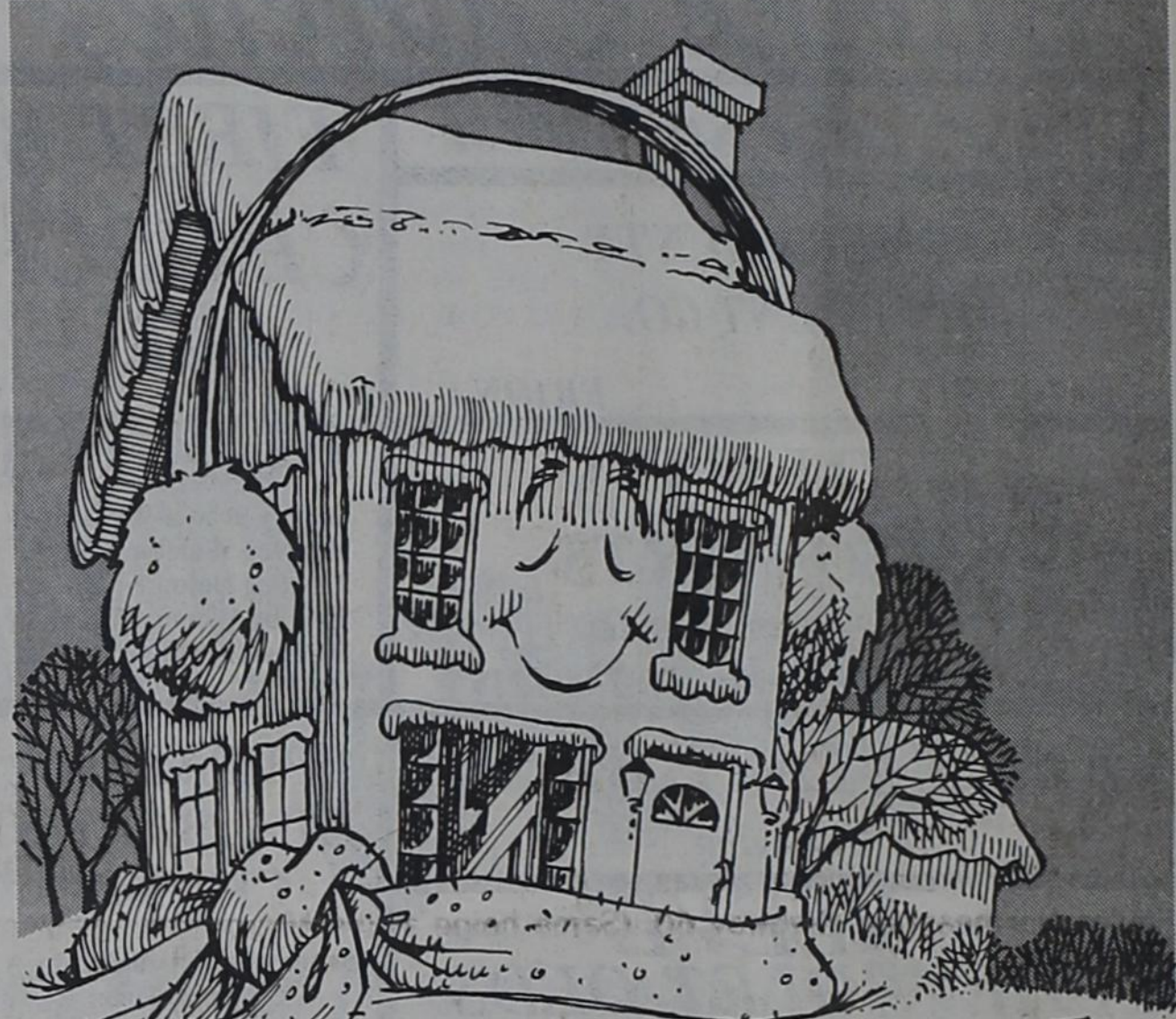


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Ponies Edge Vega; Hold 3-AA Lead

Scientists harvest first successful crop of freshwater shrimp

COLLEGE STATION — Fisheries scientists at Texas A&M University have successfully raised and harvested more than 800 pounds of shrimp 100 miles from the nearest saltwater. The project shows promise for the creation of a shrimp-raising industry for Texas and other southern states.

The shrimp were raised in soft-bottomed freshwater tanks where they were grown during the warmer months of the year. Like shrimp in the Gulf of Mexico, they were born in saltwater.

The freshwater shrimp research, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, is part of an on-going project that may be a forerunner of large-scale commercial shrimp farming.
