Senator Bill Sarpalius today introduced a resolution honoring hree Texans who were among the released. The Senate passed the resolution unanimously.
The three Texans honored by the Panhandle Senator and the full Senate are Lieutenant Commander Robert Engelmann of Hurst, William
Royer, Jr. of Houston and Marine Sergeant John McKeel, Jr., of Balch Springs.
The resolution praised the bravery of the three Texans, "held in captivity in Iran for 444 days by a Sarpalius' resolution told of the three Texans being "subjected for 14 months to physical abuse by being ound, gagged, blindfolded, pushed mobs of maniacal, militant Iranians who taunted and flaunted their aptives before the world.
Sarpalius, through his resolution, praised the courage, forbearance and dignity of the hostages, calling it resolution also invited the three to visit the Senate for a personal welcome, heartfelt thanks, and recognition of valor. Additionally, each man will be presented with a
