SATURDAY afternoon between four and five o'clock a big 14-passenger Ford Tri-Motor Monoplane attracted attention and was observed by many as it passed over Spur, flying at a low altitude and apparently barely missing the house tops. Within a short time a message came from Dry Lake residents that the plane, in flames, had crashed, falling in the field of Mr. Carr, five miles northwest of Spur, all five occupants of the plane being killed either by the flames or the crash.




