

Election To Pave the Highway From Dickens Co. to Crosbyton

Hear Ye! Hear Ye! \$40,000.00 was the sum set by the Commissioners Court in session last Saturday as Precinct 2's portion of the cost of hard-surfacing Highway 53 from Crosbyton east to the Dickens county line. The election is called for

The election was called following a call meeting of the Commissioners Court on Saturday, December 8. About seventy-five people were present to discuss the proposition from different parts of the precinct, and speeches were made both pro and con for the proposition. Following the discussions, which lasted the larger part of the morning, the court went into session and the bond election

Mr. Skelton representative of the state highway commission, was present and outlined the benefits derived from hard-surfaced highways and stressed the fact that a recommendation would be made that the stated and federal government furnish twothirds of the cost of construction of this highway and maintain it after it was finished.

The idea of paving highway No. 53 first originated during the summer among the citizens of the Sast Plains. Dickens county has just finished paving their part of the highway through the county up to the Crosby county line, and the East Plains people decided to agitate the project to continuing the paving in to Crosbyton from the line. 




