The testimony on the trial in the Federal Court at Lubbock shows that a meeting was held in the basement of Bryant-Link Company store on the 4th or 5th day of September, 1928, at which 30 or 35 citizens of Spur were present, the object of which is disclosed by the testimony of Geo. 





#### Dr. C. W. Barrier Becomes Ill on Visit to Dickens County

Dr. C. W. Barrier, of Dallas, became very ill while registered at the Central Hotel in Spur last Friday evening. Dr. Barrier, who specialzes in correcting deformed feet and limbs, had been called to take care of a case in the Afton country. He had registered at the Central Hotel about one week before this time and had spent the intervening days in Afton community, and came back to Spur Friday afternoon.

He stated to friends Sunday that he had been suffering a number of years from an acute indigestion that ne had not been able to analyze, and that he had almost died of this condition the last two or three attacks. Also, he stated that two of his brothers had died of similar attacks. He seemed to understand that another attack was coming on, and made all preparations in the event the crisis should come. He finished writing out all instructions at the Central Hotel about nine o'clock Friday evening and then retired, givng instructions that he be not disurbed since he was very tired .. It appears that Dr. Barrier's extreme omatose condition was due to the condition of his kidneys. Local physicians found the urine heavily lader with albumin and sugar.

Dr. Nichols was summoned Satur day morning, and also, Dr. Morris was called. Both physicians pronounced the patient's condition very serious, and entertained but little hopes of his recovery. Dr. C. W. Barrier, of Harris Sanitarium at Ft. Worth, and a son of the patient, vas summoned by telephone and arrived Saturday evening about eight clock. He stated his father had suffered several years from this condition. Mrs. Bacon, a special nurse at Nichols Sanitarium, was put in charge of the case and with the phyicians and nurse working diligently all night, the patient regained consciousness about ten o'clock Sunday

Upon gaining consciousness Dr. Barrier was questioned as often as he could be questioned, and stated he felt sure Friday afternoon that he would suffer another attack and Barrier was questioned as often as made all preparatinos possible as he feared the worst would come. Bilberry, of our city, is an old friend of his, Dr. Barrier having treated his daughter some twenty five years ago. Mr. Bilberry went to the hotel Saturday morning and called for him and was first to find him in his illfated condition. 

"The Company proposes to furnish—said machinery and materials specified herein for the sum of One Hundred and Four Thousand (\$104,000,00) Dollars. To be paid in 72 equal monthly payments, first payment due ninety days after completion of plant.

"The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised, or to be raised by taxation.

My ideal poultry house is the air type that admits plenty of sunshine and plenty of fresh air at all climates, 25 per cent more can be housed without crowding. This is due to the fact that the fowls do not have to be housed in the warmer sections of the United States. It is a great mistake to crowd chickens into a house, as they should have plenty of room at all times. This house should be 9 feet high in front hot weather for coolness at night; above the floor, and all openings while during the fall, winter and should be above this. spring the north, east and west In cold climates, the north, east end of the house to the other on on. the birds at night.

The openings in front are all the ventilators a boultry house needs, and the larger these permanent openings are, the healthier the fowls will be, as long as they do not freeze their combs and toes. By having the roosts along the north wall there will be no drafts at night by having the north, east and west walls closed tight, even if the south is open.

Every poultry house should have a floor-either concrete or wood. It is impossible to keep a dirt floor clean and sanitary. The floors in all my houses are made of tongue and grooved flooring that is absolutely tight. All my houses are up on posts two or three feet high, which provides a cool place during the heat of summer. A good roof is very essential, as a poultry house must be kept dry if the fowls are to be kept healthy. The usual material used for shed roofs is either roofing paper or galvanized iron. The latter is usually most durable, but is also very hot during hot weather if the roof is not high. A straw loft or a ceiling under the rafters will make the house a great deal cooler in summer and also warmer in the winter. Do not have the roof too low, especially in warm climates, nor too high, especially up north. There should be 51/2 or 6 feet clearance space in the rear, and 8 or 9 feet in the front inside.

This poultry house is equally good in any climate and at any season of the year, the only difference being in the construction of the front openings. In the southern states, the front should be left almost entirely open at all times, while up north where the weather is cold, most of the front should be closed for the protection of the fowls. In the northern states, quite a portion of the front can be covered with glass substitutes to admit light and sunshine, and sufficient air for ventilation can be had through openings that are covered with thin muslin curtains during cold weather. In climates similar to Missouri, the openings in the front should equal about 10 per cent of the floor area of the house, and these openings should be left open at all times except in extreme cold weather or while storming from the south, when a thin muslin curtain can be pulled down.

Of course, some rain will beat in the southern openings at times, but the harm from this is trival as compared to having the front of the house closed or nearly so.

The floor should be sloping a little to the front, so that the rain that should blow in will run to the front

## BY U.S. FARMERS

Farm Bureau Federation Demands Adequate Protection for Domestic Sugar Industry.

CHICAGO.-Recent action of the American Farm Bureau Federation, representing 750,000 farmers, in adopting resolutions at its annual conven-



relief problem. "We urge that the situation regarding entry of

sugar into the United States be brought to the attention of members of congress without delay," the resolutions set forth, "and we respectfully ask them to use their best efforts to place a limit on the free entry of sugar from the Philippines and Porto Rico to a point which will guarantee reasonable protection to the United States sugar industry; and that the tariff rate against all foreign sugar be increased so as to give adequate protection to this great American enterprise."

Future of Crop at Stake.

"Future of sugar beets as a profitable American farm crop is at stake," said Stephen H. Love, president of the U. S. Beet Sugar Association. "More than 100,000 farmers in the United States raise sugar beets, from which they realize annually from \$50,000,000 to \$60,000,000, while the beet sugar industry covering eighteen states represents an investment in factories alone of over \$250,000,000.

"Interests of the farmers who raise the raw materials and the manufacturers who produce the finished product are identical. If the invasion of the United States market by foreign sugar produced by cheap labor under living conditions far below the American standard forces the price of domestic sugar below the cost of production, the American beet farmer and cane grower are faced with competition they cannot meet. Ninetynine per cent of all the sugar imported into this country is supplied either duty-free from our insular possessions, or enters from Cuba, which enjoys a tariff rate 20 per cent below that paid by any other foreign coun-

Cubar Situation Menacing.

"The Cuhan situation is Employment-C. C. Halie, Chm., menacing to the domestic sugar instricted to 4,000,000 tons, Cuban raw sugar is selling in New York at 2 cents a pound, or approximately 11/2 cents per pound less than it costs the American farmer to produce sugar in the beets even before the process of manufacture has begun.

"In 1929 Cuba will have no crop restriction and will produce at least a million more tons of sugar than in 1928. The only salvation for the domestic sugar industry is an increase in the tariff sufficient to keep Cuba from dumping this enormous increase on the American market at ruinous

#### **DUTY-FREE SUGAR** THREATENS RUIN TO U.S. MARKET

DENVER.-Expansion of the sugar industry in the Philippines at the expense of the beet sugar industry of the United States is the plan of Philippine leaders, who hope to erect a augar producing empire in the islands rivaling that of Java, with 1,000,000 tons' production by 1935 and a potentially unlimited output in the future in spite of their present statements to the contrary, according to W. D. Linpitt of Denver, an official of the Great Western Sugar Company. "Since the introduction of Congress-

man Timberlake's resolution proposing to limit the amount of Philippine sugar entering this country free of duty to 500,000 tons annually," said Mr. Lippitt, "Philippine leaders have declared that further expansion of their sugar industry is unlikely. Yet only four years ago a statement in the Central and Planters News, the official publication of the Philippine Sugar Planters' Association, predicted a crop of 1,000,000 and commenting on the unlimited possibilities of future exploitation declared, 'Another ten years of development will place us in a class with Java in so far as the production of sugar is concerned.' "Imports of duty-free sugar from the Philippines in recent years have shown the highest rate of increase of any source supplying the United States, while the domestic industry has suffered losses in the majority of sugar producing states. The problem is chiefly agricultural, due to the production of sugar in the islands under low oriental standards of living and wages, with which the American farmer cannot compete."
