Up to this date we have heard no candidates suggested, and it is very probable that the retiring members will be asked to serve another term.

The retiring board members are T. C. Ensey, E. J. Cowan, C. P. Harris and E. A. Russell.

Schools are the most important institutions of the city and country, and the present school board has demonstrated interest, efficiency and activity in all school matters and are capable of rendering most valuable service in promoting and advancing school and educational interests.

Base Ball Season to Open in Spur April 11th, 12th and 13th

The Spur Base Ball Club organization has been perfected in a substantial and permanent manner.

A meeting of prominent business men was held Wednesday in the Spur National Bank building, and the following officers were elected: Faust Collier, President; M. C. Golding, Vice-President; Jas. B. Reed, Secretary-Treasurer; W. A. McAlpine, Business Manager; Abie Edwards, Manager; Cecil Hicks, E. C. Edmonds, L. H. Perry, Ralph Jackson and Eric Ousley, Directors.

With the arrival of three more players from Abilene, the Spur team looks like a real ball club and a sure winner over any opponents in West Texas. District Court Now in Session and the Grand Jury Busy

The first term of the newly created District court convened Monday in Dickens, with Judge Bain on the bench, and Attorney Folly prosecuting.

The grand jury was empaneled the first thing Monday morning and immediately began the investigations with the result that twelve bills of indictment have been turned in to this date.

The following cases have been disposed of up to Thursday night:

The State of Texas vs Frank Hoagland, charged with violation of the liquor law, not guilty.
W. J. Clark vs Lon Klizziah, et al, foreclosure of vendors lien, judgment for plaintiff.

Smith vs Smith, divorce granted.
Robinson & Rabe vs Austin Bridge Co., suit for damages, verdict and judgment for defendant.

The criminal docket is set for Monday, April 8th.

The case of A. J. Hagins et al, vs W. T. Wilson, is set for Monday, April 22nd. This case has been in court several years, and has been to the supreme court and back.

Road Will be Paved From Spur to Dickens, Crosbyton

Stamford—Adding further to the campaign to pave the Texas Transcontinental Trail route connecting Fort Worth and Lubbock announcement was made here Tuesday that two additional gaps in the route are to be paved. One of these projects will connect Spur and Dickens county and the other is from the Dickens-Crosby county line east to Crosbyton, bonds for which have recently been voted.

Completion of these two projects will afford a continuous pavement from Spur to Crosbyton as newly constructed pavement from Dickens west to the Crosby county line was recently completed and has been opened for traffic.

Southwest of Spur engineers are in the field making surveys of extensive improvement to the route between Spur and Jayton.

East of Stamford the designation has been hard surfaced to intersection with highway No. 1 nine miles west of Albany, affording a continuous paved highway from this city to Fort Worth.

The city, as we understand it, will be divided into districts, and substantial prizes will be awarded in each district for the first, second and third winners in each district. Every home in the city should take an interest in the campaign and contribute to the success of its aims, whether or not they are entered in the contest. Civic pride and attractiveness means much to a city and a people—and it is possible to make Spur one of the most beautiful and attractive cities of all of Western Texas.

The score card for awarding the prizes in the home beautification contest is as follows:—

- A. Planting design, (arrangement of beds, hedges, gardens, etc, continuity of bloom—color scheme)—25 points.
- B Screening unsightly views—30 points.
- C Absence of plant disease—20 points.
- D Maintenance of neatness—25 points.

Total,	\$881.00

In raising and marketing the above items from which the sum of \$881 was realized, it did not in the least detract from nor interfere with the growing of cotton, maize and other crops on the place, and was a source of income at all seasons of the year—and the sum realized contributed much to the income and prosperity of the Shaw farm.

Johnson Defeats Hargrove in City Election Tuesday

In the city election held Tuesday for the purpose of electing city officers for the ensuing two years, there was only one contest, that of J. E. Johnson and M. Hargrove for water commissioner, Johnson defeating Hargrove for the place, Ned Hogan being reelected mayor, and S. H. Twaddell street commissioner, without opposition.

There were a total of 304 votes polled in the election, as follows: Ned Hogan, for mayor, 298, and 1 vote for W. D. Wilson whose name was written on the ticket.

J. E. Johnson 223, and M. Hargrove 81 votes, for water commissioner.

S. H. Twaddell 301 votes for street commissioner.

In the campaign for water commissioner, M. Hargrove made cheaper water rates his issue, while J. E. Johnson advanced the issue that at this time, since the city is building and establishing an electric light and power plant principally under his recommendation and guidance, that it would be unwise to change administrations, and that he desired to serve another term in order that he might continue the work started, and see it through to completion.

Recent Heavy Rains Insure Big Wheat Harvests on Plains

One Block to be Paved at Once in the City of Spur

Agreements, or petitions, have been signed by all property owners on each side of Burlington Avenue on the two main business blocks, with the exception of two non-resident property owners, asking the city to pave the street on Burlington from Fifth to Harris Streets.

The city commission has agreed to pay one-fourth the cost of such paving, and the property owners will be assessed three-fourths of the cost.

The paving will be of concrete and the work will probably begin within a very short period of time, or just as soon as the necessary orders and arrangements can be made and bids received on the plans and specifications of the paving.

School Census Shows 1227 Pupils Within Spur Ind. District

Superintendent R. N. Cluck, of the Spur Schools, has just completed the census enumeration of pupils within the Spur Independent School District, including transferred pupils, and reports the total number enumerated for the coming term as 1,227.

FOR THE PURPOSE OF FIRE PREVENTION IN THE CITY OF SPUR

He is obtained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Spur, Texas:

Section 1. Hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person to throw place, or deposit on the ground outside any building, within the fire limits of the city, any loose paper trash, or combustible material, or to burn any such materials in the open, unless same is securely inclosed in metal wire or iron receptables

Section 2. Any person violating any provisions of the foregoing Section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding One hundred (\$100.00) dollars.

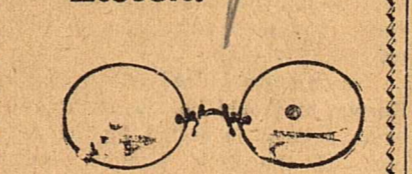

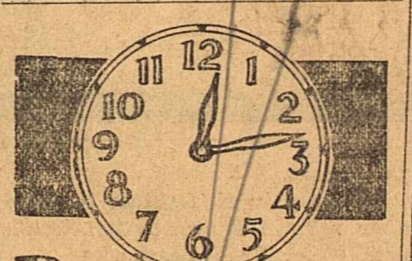
