Anyway, today isn't too late to register for the May primaries and no time is too late to register for other forthcoming elections.

We don't know if this new rule is a good one or not. Probably is. At any rate, it is a rule and we'll be playing by it, like it or not.

Our old-fashionedness may be showing a little, but we think the recent court ruling against political candidates paying the cost of party primary elections through filing fees was a bad one.

The recent ruling for outlawing the old system is evident. A potential candidate shouldn't be barred from a race because he doesn't have the cost of the filing fee. On the other hand, if the candidates don't pay the costs of the election, who does? The answer is the taxpayers of Texas. And aren't we already saddled with more taxes than we really feel are necessary.

Here we had a system whereby the candidates were paying the expense and proud to have the opportunity to do so. But we discard it and agree to use \$2 million of state money to pay for this year's election. So, in the interest of being fair (?) we burden many to benefit a few.

We try not to be against changes --- just stupid ones! Remember, too, that the primaries are conducted by political parties, not by the state government. At least that's the way it used to be.

Noticed in the Amarillo paper and on TV from the same town that Dr. Michael Murphy has moved to Stratford to begin practice. Dr. Murphy, you'll remember, considered coming to Bovina a couple of years or so ago.

# Horn New Mayor; Elect 3 Councilmen

Johnie Horn was elected mayor of Bovina and Roy Allen, Dolph Moten and Don Spring were elected city councilmen in an extremely light turnout at the polls Saturday.

In the mayor's race, where Horn was running uncontested, four men received write-in votes with Horn receiving 66 votes, Ed Isaac was given five, J. E. Sherrill two, outgoing mayor Chas. Flynn one and Spring one.

With only 82 ballots being cast, Moten was re-elected to the city position with 75 votes, Allen and Spring became new members of the council after receiving 76 and 73 votes, respectively.

The three men in the race for councilmen were unopposed for three positions on the six-man council.

Moten was appointed to fill

an unexpired term on the council in January of 1970 and was elected to a full term in the April

election that year. Spring and Allen have not previously served on the city council.

## Touch Calling New Innovation --

# Direct Dialing Begins For Bovina April 16

General Telephone Company went all out in planning Bovina's new telephone system, according to Rad Richardson, district manager. At 12:01 a.m. Sunday, April 16, 1972, Bovina customers will have an opportunity to enjoy the benefits of a completely new electronic tele-

phone system that allows instant connections.

Direct Distance Dialing is due to be introduced on that date, which will allow the user to dial station-to-station toll calls completely automatically. Multi-party customers will be requested to provide their number before the connection is completed.

Simply by dialing the access code "1", area code (if different than your own), and number, most telephones in the United States and Canada are accessible.

Complete instructions will be mailed to each customer prior to the conversion, said Richardson.

When the dialing is completed, the timing and billing are completed automatically. Should a wrong number be reached, a call to the operator will result in the proper credit.

Another new innovation for Bovina customers will be the introduction of touch calling, which is specially designed for use with the electronic system. Merely touching the digits on the keyboard will start instant ringing. Business Office personnel will provide information on rates for this service.

One feature of the electronic system is a 15-second time out on the completion of dialing. If the dialing sequence is delayed, a busy tone will interrupt and dialing must start again.

An interim Bovina directory, reflecting the complete number change, will be issued prior to April 16, Richardson stated.

# Rev. J. Abbott Dies In Mishap

Word has been received here of the accidental death of Rev. John Benjamin Abbott, 54, of Espanola, N.M.

Rev. Abbott was killed Thursday when a truck on which he was working fell, crushing him to death.

Rev. Abbott was born here and was graduated from Bovina Schools in the 1930's. He was the son of the late Pres Abbott, who moved here as an XIT syndicate cowboy in 1894, before the town of Bovina was established.

Rev. Abbott was a military chaplain in World War II and was injured while serving in the Philippine Islands. He was currently serving as missionary to missions in Espanola, Chama and Ojito.

Survivors include his wife, Ethel, and one son, John Marshall, both of Espanola.

Relatives in this area include a cousin, Steve Messenger of Friona, and an aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Houlette of Clovis. Rev. Abbott was a frequent visitor in this area.

## Whitten Re-Elected; Trimble New Trustee

Earl Whitten and C. E. Trimble were named to fill two vacancies on the board of trustees of Bovina Independent School District when patrons of the district went to the polls Saturday. They were among four names appearing on the ballot this year.

Incumbent Whitten received 116 votes, Trimble 110, Houston Bartlett 47 and Jimmy Cockerham 37.

Wendol Christian was returned to the county school board as trustee-at-large with 132 votes.

Only 159 voters marked ballots in this year's school election. Of the total number of ballots, 24 were absentee votes.

Johnie Horn was election judge with Mrs. Henry Minter serving as clerk.

The terms of Whitten and

Thomas Rhodes expired this year. Whitten and Rhodes were elected to their first terms in 1969. Rhodes chose not to run for re-election this year.

Holdover members include Lawrence Jamerson, Leslie McCain and Leon Ware, who

have two years remaining on their terms; and Edwin Lide and Robert Read, who have one year remaining to serve.

The new and old board members will hold an organizational meeting Monday night following a dinner meeting for them and their wives.

Whitten and Trimble were elected for three-year terms. Terms of board members are staggered so that two members are elected two years out of three and three are elected one year out of three.

Trimble is a farmer, Whitten is a certified public accountant, employed by Sherley Grain Co. here.

A new business in Bovina is scheduled to open its doors the early part of May.

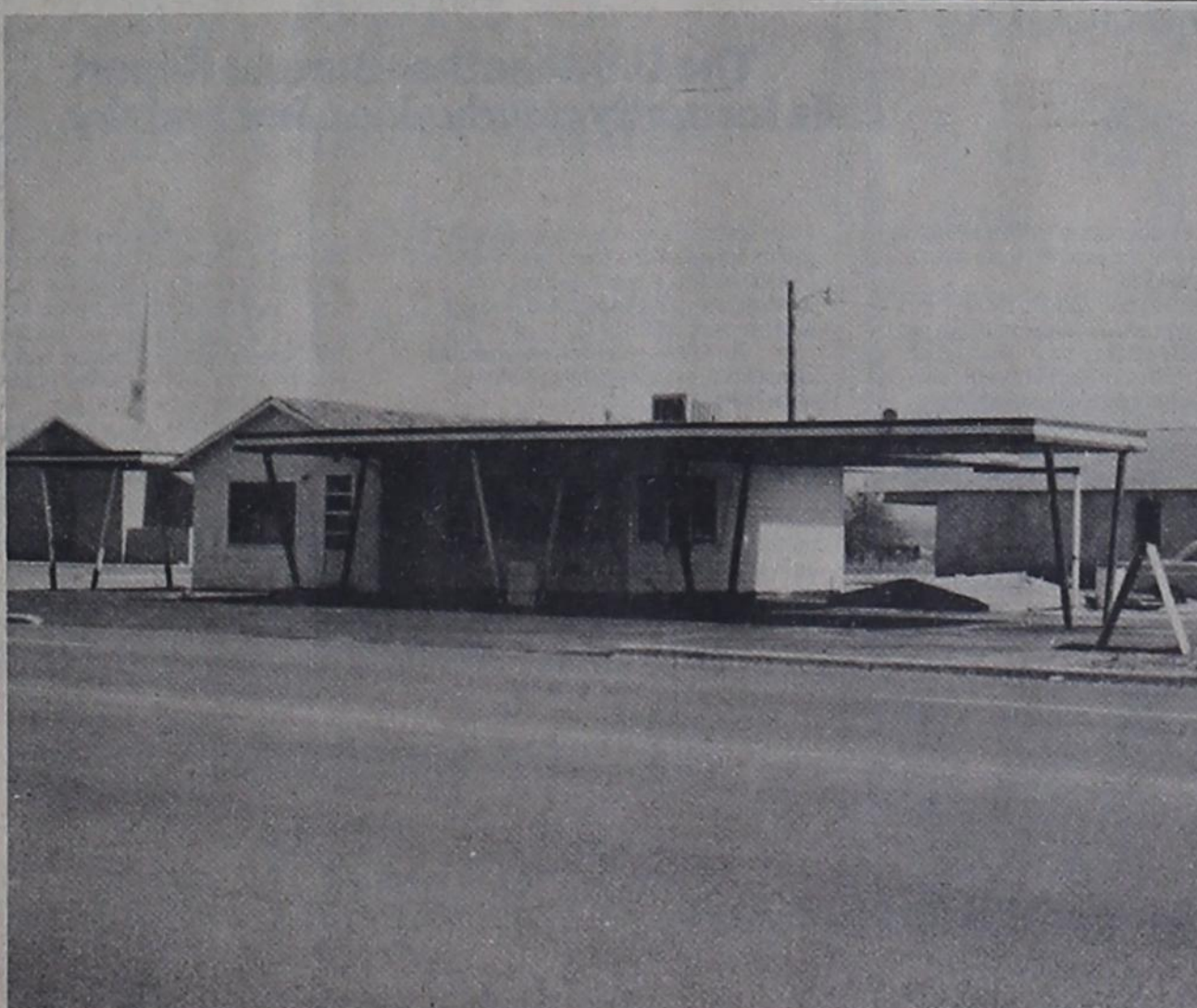
The Stitch Niche, a fabric and notions shop, will be owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Winston Allison.

The business will be located on Third Street, next door to Fantasy Beauty Salon.

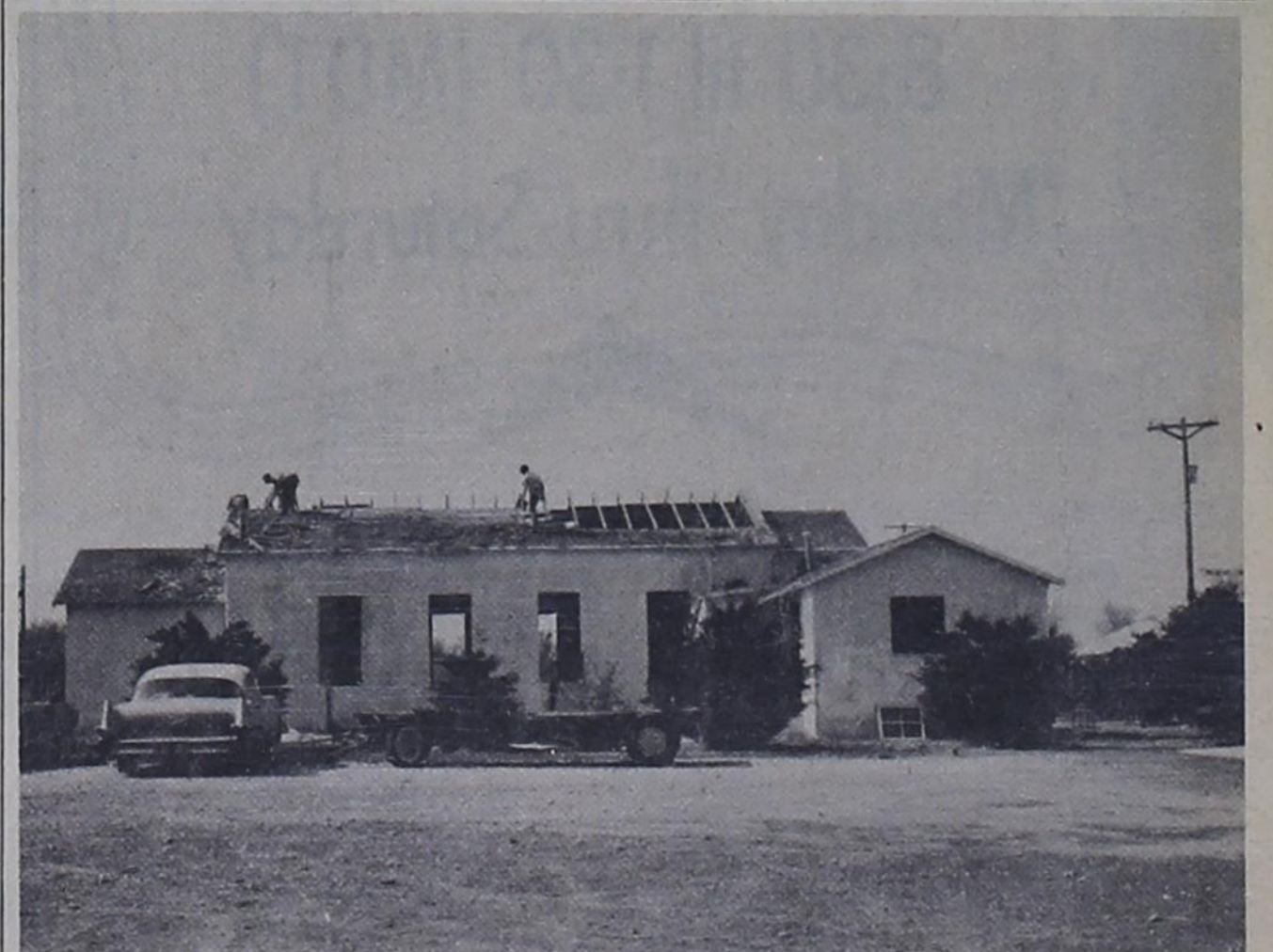
"We will carry a complete line of fabrics and notions, plus a popular brand of patterns," said Mrs. Allison.

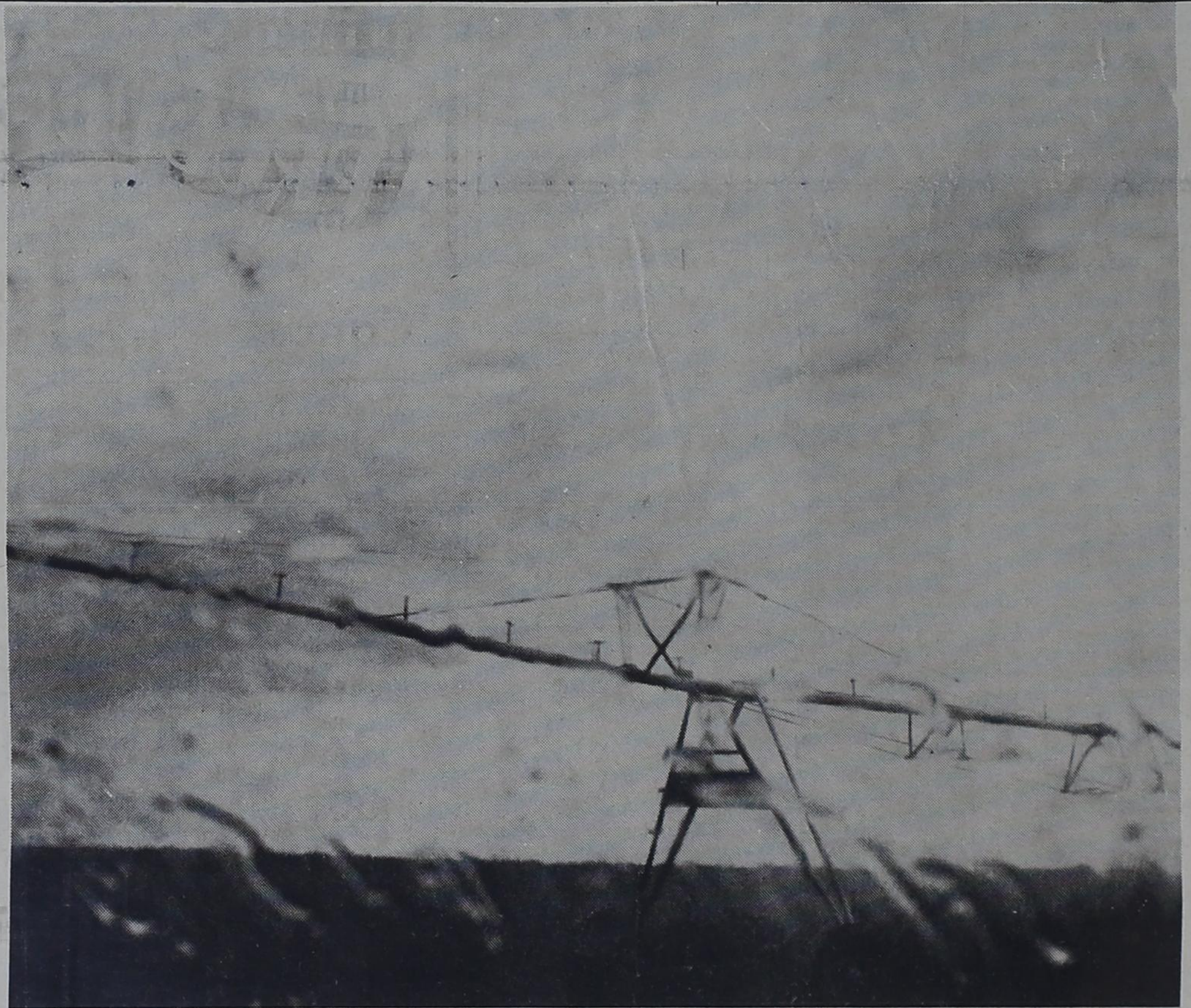

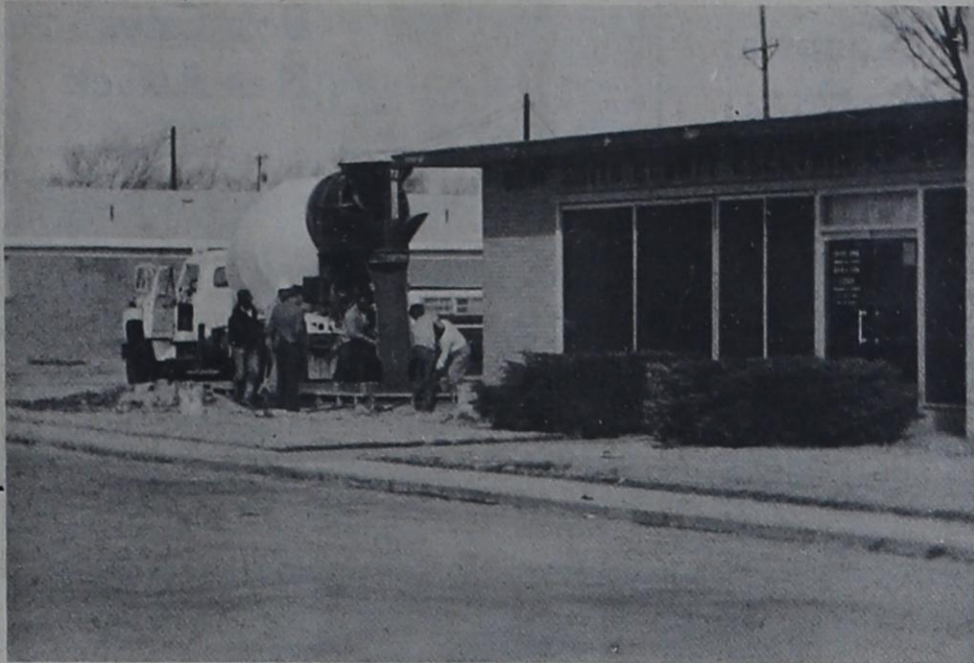

## Electric Cooperative Slates Construction

A major remodeling project has recently begun at the Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative offices in Hereford, according to James Hull, general manager. Hull said the cooperative's board of directors had accepted the low bid of \$90,000 of Wiley Hicks Jr. of Amarillo for the construction project. Separate bids went to Hereford bidders, Brown Sheet Metal for heating and air conditioning and Owen Electric for wiring. The facility, in addition to a face-lifting of the interior, will be enlarged an additional 2,284 square feet, most of which is incorporated into a community room. The new meeting room will be used to handle requests for meeting space from organiza-

tions throughout the cooperative's service area. The construction is the first major change of the building since it was erected 22 years ago, Hull said. An explosion partially demolished a portion of the building in 1958, but little change was made when restoring the building. Hull, in announcing the "new look" construction, explained the one major factor influencing the decision to enlarge was based on the tremendous growth of the cooperative in the past seven years. "We simply did not have enough office space to adequately accommodate the personnel we now employ," Hull commented. The cooperative was established in 1937 with six em-

ployees and now has 41 on the payroll. Construction is scheduled to be completed by May 1. "We think when it is finished, our member-owners will be proud of it as well as the community," Hull concluded.

# Farm Census Shows Growth

The number of farms in Parmer County increased from 783 in 1964 to 856 in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released recently by the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census, a part of the department's Social and Economics Statistics Administration. Of the county's total farms in 1969, 803 were reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agricultural products in the year, as

compared with 756 in 1964. The report also shows the average farm size in the county to be 663.6 acres and average value of this farm, including land and buildings, to be \$246,905. Other figures in the report include: value of all farm products sold in 1969 to be \$122,498,985 compared to \$38,482,500 in 1964; value of all crops sold in 1969 was \$27,647,534 to \$29,905,283; and the value of all livestock, poultry and their

products sold in 1969 was \$94,851,451 and in 1964 \$8,577,570. Reported for the first time in an agricultural census was information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of farms from which agricultural products totaling \$2,500 and over were sold. Including family farms using this type of business structure, nine of the county's farms are incorporated.

## SBA Workshop Set At Dumas

A Small Business Administration Workshop, co-sponsored by the SBA and the Southwestern Public Service Company will be held in the Reddy Room of the Dumas office of Southwestern beginning at 2 p.m. Tuesday, April 11.

"Money for Your Expansion Plans" will be the theme for the workshop which is designed to point out to present industries in the area the avenues for financial and technical assistance which will aid them in expanding their operations.

The speakers from the SBA, Lubbock office, including Phillip J. O'Jibway, district director; Jud Simpkins, loan specialist; Carl Lightner, community economic development specialist; and J. B. Hare, from the procurement and management assistance division, will advise participants on availability of direct government loans and community loans and how to get government contracts.

Bud Reed of the Texas Industrial Commission in Austin will discuss the sources of assistance in employee training and Peter Dallas, vice president of the First National Bank of Amarillo, will speak on what a banker wants to know. The West Texas Business Development Corporation, a new industry-financing plan, will be explained by Bob Brummal, chairman of the new corporation. Brummal is Southern Division manager for Southwestern Public Service Company. Larry Milner, manager of industrial development for Southwestern, said the workshop would be of interest to manufacturers, businessmen and community leaders throughout the area.

"The very heart of industrial development is for area and community leaders to help those industries they already have expanded and develop so they can play a bigger role in the economic growth of the region. This workshop is designed to help in that effort by emphasizing the opportunities that are available to existing small industries for financing and technical assistance from governmental and private sources," Milner concluded.

### An Unwinding Tale!

#### THE SILVER YO-YO

NEW YORK — Yo-yos come in a variety of styles and shapes from mini to basketball. There are even some that whistle. But the most delightful yo-yo of all is the new Gorham silver yo-yo.

Gorham executive W. Dan Lemeshka calls it a "sterling clad" yo-yo. It is an elegant string-along for an executive, a pacifier, or a paperweight. It can be engraved with your initials if you like.

For whatever its uses, the silver yo-yo is the newest mark of distinction. They are in such demand you may not even be able to find one.

Forerunner of the yo-yo was probably a thonged stone used by Neanderthal men to stun and stone prey, but the first yo-yo as we know it appeared in Greece and was called a disc. Yo-yos turned up in England in the 18th century. A painting in the British Museum shows the Prince of Wales and King George IV playing with theirs.

Somehow they moved from England to France, and then to Canada. The late Donald F. Duncan brought them to the U.S. in the 1920s and they continued to be popular until 1963 when they all but disappeared from our scene. They reappeared in September of 1970, first on college campuses, and now they are everywhere.

It is said that yo-yos are for the very young, but Lemeshka says "ours is for the young in heart".
