



Texans Responsible For Appropriation For Terrace Study

There is one small item in the agricultural appropriations bill of the present Congress that deserves a story. Undoubtedly other features in this outline of the House of Representatives for the expenditure of agricultural funds would merit consideration here, but in this lone appropriation of \$160,000 for the "Investigation of the causes of soil erosion and to devise means to be employed in the preservation of soil and the conservation of rainfall by terracing or othed means" is found almost the first national legislative recognition of the importance of soil and rainfall conservation. As such this item deserves mention, and it should be a matter of pride to Texans that the inclusion of this Four Cows Make appropriation is the work of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, the Extension Service, and civic organizations and was introduced and championed by Texas representatives.

Here is the story. Whatever the cause, Texas has been pioneering in the field of soil conservation. Since 1914 or even earlier, county agents have been demonstrating terracing as the only practical method of preventing huge soil and rainfall losses. About ten years later the idea was so thoroughly accepted by Texas farmers that the demand for county agent service in running terrace lines became so great that the terracing school for training farmers to do their terracing was adopted. Since then the terracing school has been pushed on a state wide scale by the Extension Service assisted by the Federal Land Bank at Houston.

In the meantime, the Spur Sub-Experiment Station began in 1925 one of the most remarkable experiments in the United States. Every one agreed that much rich top soil washed away each year but it took the Spur Station to throw the bomb shell that awoke the State that a nearly level field in a cauntry of relatively light rainfall loses forty tons of top soil in six months time! Speaking another way, soil erosion is proceeding at the rate of the loss of the top six inches of dirt,—the farm in other words,-in forty two years.

This has been determined by completely enclosing the sides of several small plots of land, each with a different slope and each treated differ-ently as to cropping; and providing storage reservoirs at the low end for receiving and measuring the eroded soil and the rainfall run off. It has been found that frequently as and here. Out on the station farms fields were terraced in various ways and some left without terraces. The are ample justification of the Extension terracing program, for the terraced fields out yielded the unterraced from fourteen to forty two pr ent in cotton. Furthrmore, the practice of using level terraces with no slope whatever allowed the ter racs, as used for a number of years by the county agents, has shown to be productive of bigger crops in the Spur country than the older types where several inches fall was allowed per hundred feet of terrace.

The experiments are not ended and will extend indefinitely, but it must be remembered that the Spur Station conditions are not typical of the entire state, much less the entire nation. More such work is needed and needed quickly. With this in view the Bryan chamber of commerce initiated a request for Congressional aid. The East Texas chamber of commerce took the matter up, as did the Bryan Lions club which enlisted the support of Lions International. Then Congressman J. P. Buchanan of Brenham, already famed in Extension eircles for securing relief funds for additional Extension work last year moved an amendment to the appropriations measure in the House in December, calling for \$160,000 for the work previously referred to. 
