# 3 DROWN IN 'RED TANK' NEAR WATSON

### Veritable Holocaust Fire on Catfish Farm, Wednesday

FIRE DESTROYS BARN, FEED, DOGS Harley Sadler in AND HORSES ON **FUQUA FARM** 

Wednesday night between nine farm place in the Cat Fish country ifteen or twenty miles southwest of Spur, resulting in a veritable holoeaust, destroying not only the large parn filled with feed but burning two work horses and three of Ed's fine wolf hounds, together with two wagons, harness and other farm

When the fire was discovered it had gained such headway that no attempt was made to extinguish the flames, members of the family dehousehold effects from the farm house which was threatened by flames from the burning barn, and which would also have been destroyed but for a timely change of the wind in blowing the flames from the house nearby.

Aside from the burning of horses and dogs, the barn and feed loss was a calamity, amounting to several thousand dollars in actual value, regardless of the feed shortage conditions which prevail throughout the

The origin of the fire has not been determined but it is presumed to have originated from a smouldering spark unknowingly dropped from a pipe in smoking, or an accidentally dropped match struck by mice.

It would be a wise thing for the city council to pass an ordinance requiring every property owner to number his house so that when the inspection is made by the Post Office department, there will be no delay in starting the service.

The city driectory is being printed by the Texas Spur and contains a list of 1100 names giving the head of the family, wife's given name, occupation, street address and telephone number. When completed it will be a great convenience if everyone will cooperate to the extent of having permanent numbers placed on their property. Spur Bank Adding Vault for Safety Deposit Boxes

An important improvement which is being made, and of which little has been said, is the addition by the Spur National Bank of a large burglar proof vault for individual safety deposit boxes. Some two hundred boxes will be installed in the vault, with ample room for the addition of other boxes as they may be needed by bank patrons. One feature of the safety deposit boxes s that two keys, one kept by the bank and one by the individual depositor, are required to open them. The vault is so constructed in the rear of the bank building as to give customers free and uninterrupted access at any time.





COWS NEED WARM DRINK IN WINTER

Successful winter dairying calls for an adequate supply of water at a temperature that will not paralyze the entire digestive tract of the cow when

"Water is equally as important as feed," says Dr. C. H. Eckles, chief of the dairy division of the University of Minnesota. "A cow milking 30 pounds daily drinks close to 100 pounds of water every 24 hours. Sometimes watering the cows means turning them out of the barn once a day to drink what they can stand of ice-cold water. Can we imagine a cow which weighs around 1,100 pounds drinking 100 pounds, or nearly one-tenth of her weight, of ice water at once? Of course she will not do it and consequently will not give her owner 30 pounds of milk even though she has the ability to produce this much and has feed enough as well.

"The milk flow may be cut down quicker by a lack of water, or by the use of ice water, than by poor feed. W. R. Terry, manager for the Individual drinking cups in my judgment pay more dividends to the user of modern barn equipment. "The oversupply of animals with records is no longer evident," declared Harris, "in fact, there is an vanced registry backing. This situation indicates that the most opportune this year."

Winter months are particularly especially to make semi-official records. Cows freshening in the fall produce as much as 15 to 20 per cent calving in the summer. Another advantage of starting the test in the fall or winter is that on many farms plenty of help is generally available to care for the cows when production is highest. In short time testing, ranging from seven to thirty days, the best records are usually made in the winter.

#### Providing Ice Storage

for Use in the Summer As an aid to farmers in providing fce storage, the division of agricultural engineering, department of agriculture, University of Minnesota, has prepared blue prints of a plan for a farm ice house holding 16 tons. The blue print shows just how the ice house should be built, and is distributed through the division of publications. University Farm, St. Paul, at the nominal charge of 10 cents to cover costs. With creameries paying premium prices for sweet cream, more and more farmers are becoming interested in providing ice for use in the summer in order that the cream may be kept cool until it can be marketed.

#### Efficient Ration for

Bull Calf Is Outlined A good bull calf ration is ten pounds of clover or alfalfa hay, topounds of clover or alfalfa hay, to-gether with a grain mixture of six parts of corn, four parts of oats and one part of linseed meal. The grain mixture should be fed according to the appetite of the calf, the object being to bring about a gain of about two pounds daily or a little better. To start with, five or six pounds of grain daily will be enough for the calf, but it soon can be increased to ten or twelve pounds. In some cases it pays to substitute bran for part of the oats and to increase the linseed meal in the ration to two pounds

#### Feed for Cows

Use home-grown feeds as far as pos-Use home-grown feeds as far as possible. Alfalfa or other legume hay is best. For most economical production, provide silage. Feed one pound of hay and three pounds of silage for each 100 pounds weight of animal. If silage is not available, feed two pounds of hay for each 100 pounds weight. Use a good grain mixture containing a small amount of cottonseed meal or linseed meal. Feed one pound of grain mixture for each three pints or pounds of milk produced.

GET CHICKS OUT

Muddy Runs and Yards Encourage Parasites and Ills.

Get the chicks out of the mud. Long-continued sloppy weather, conditions for the parasite which Have used cars for sale or trade, causes the disease coccidiosis, as well will take good notes or cows. #### Quality Eggs Can Be

Produced on Any Farm Eggs unfit for food cost farmers from one to three cents per dozen. Approximately 17 out of every 100 eggs marketed are unfit for human consumption, according to the United States Department of Agriculture. This means a loss of about \$4,000,000 annually to farmers. An egg buyer of Clinton county, Indiana, recently reported to Purdue university that onehalf of the eggs delivered to him were not good enough to eat.

Two principal causes for the large volume of inedible eggs are as follows: Improper care of eggs at the farm, and neglect in marketing them more frequently, according to E. R. Menefee of Purdue.

Quality eggs can be produced on corn belt farms if producers will follow the suggestions which be makes. Remove all the males from the flock immediately. Males are not necessary for egg production and fertile eggs will not keep their quality in warm weather.

Remove all broody hens from the nests promptly. The body temp ture of a hen is 106 degrees and will reduce the quality of the egg in a few hours' time. Gather the eggs twice a day in hot weather and place them in a cool room promptly. A basement or cellar if not moldy or containing any peculiar odors furnishes about the best place on the farm for holding

#### To Distinguish Sex

of Guineas Is Hard There is no sure way to tell the male guinea fowl from the female by looks. Usually the wattles of the male are a little larger than the female's, but this is not always noticeable-nor is it true in every case.

But their cries are different, and will reveal which is which. The female has a two-syllable cry which sounds like "buckwheat, buckwheat," or to some folks "pot rack, pot rack." Anyhow it's a two-syllable cry. But the male has only a one-syllable sort of shrick. Sometimes too, he makes a chattering noise and often says 'quit, quit, quit."

But don't try to tell the two apart when they're frightened or excited. Both the male and female then make the one-syllable cry.

#### Oats Cause Trouble

The use of ground whole oats containing an abundance of indigestible fiber has caused many losses among young chicks when such material has been included in the home-made starters. A laying mash containing a lot of ground oat hulls has less feeding value than a mash without so much fiber. There should be a good demand for hulless oats for chicken feed if they can be raised as economically and are as good feed as oats which have been hulled.

#### Remove Litter Daily

Daily removal of soiled litter from the henhouse is important. If the dampened litter is left on the floor, it'eal conditions are created for spreading of disease. The soles of shoes that have come in contact with such litter should be disinfected. Contamination is easy unless every caution is used. This risk can be greatly reduced by wearing a special pair of rubbers and by having a pan of disinfectant outside the brooder house to use when entering and leaving.
