HOME DEMONSTRATION

"We live at home" is what the 3 individual farm exhibitors portrayed in their booths at the county fair. Mrs. E. M. Howell in her general collection of canned products had 51 varieties of fruits, vegetables, jams, jellies, preserves, pickles, and relishes. Mrs. Ed Fuqua and Mrs. Howell had in their collection a display of five different watermelon rind products. The watermelon jam, preserves, marmalade, pickle and garnish. The Garnish was made with the one inch cubes and colored red and green. These are to be used for decorating desserts in place of the green and red cherries, and they are delicious, as well as inexpensive. Among the 49 varieties that Mrs. Baxter had in her general collection of canned products was cherries, grapes, blackberries, apples, pears, 3 varieties of plums, and 3 varieties of peaches. Among her canned vegetable products were kraut, sweet potatoes, spinach, turnip greens, turnips, kale, swiss chard, 2 varieties of beans, 3 varieties of peas, tomatoes, beets, mustard, squash, asparagus, carrots, corn, cucumbers. She had 12 kinds of pickles and relishes, and a 12 kinds of jellies, jams, and marmalades. All of these products were raised on their farm near Afton.

Mrs. B. F. Middleton, of Prairie Chapel, out of 150 turkeys hatched off, has 135 ready for the market. The hens averaged eight and a half pounds and the gobblers averaged ten and a half. She states that in the first place she started out with pure bred turkeys, and took particular care about the proper feeding and kept the young turkeys protected from the damp cold weather. She says that she would have raised all of the 150 if it had not been for the skunks.

140 ENROLLMENT IN VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT AT SPUR

Patrons of Spur are always interested in the progress of the various departments of the schools. This year, everyone is asking about the new vocational agriculture departments just added.

In the Home Economics Department, at all hours of the day, one hears the busy shuffle of pots and pans or the hum of the sewing machines—sixty girls working in different groups during the day, learning the science of cooking and sewing. The department which is under the direction of Miss Annabel Hardison, is an inspiration to anyone interested in the progress of Spur Schools, particularly the teaching of practical subjects.

At present the department can take care of only sixty girls; thirty-five had to be taken out of the class from the ninety-five who enrolled. These numbers indicate the great demand for vocational Home Economics.

In the commercial department, under the direction of Mr. Harcrow and Miss Cleo Hankins, we find almost the same situation. Here are thirty-five prospective bookkeepers, and stenographers busy; there is now room for three or four more students, if there are those who want the course.

The vocational agriculture department which is having a second successful year under the direction of Mr. Joe C. Williams, is full also. In this group there are forty-five young farmers learning the science. There were eighteen turned away from this course this year.

One immediately sees how these departments are in demand, how the curriculum is becoming more and more practical every year, how, as a result, students are better fitted for the practical means of earning a living with just a high school education, are graduated.

Babe Berry, who had the brick work contract on the Antelope school building, informed us that the brick work is now complete and the building will be completed in every detail by the first of November.

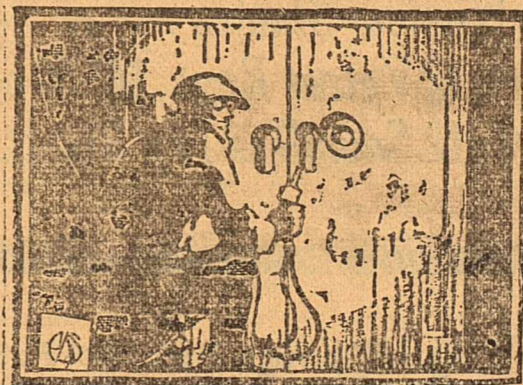
The Antelope school building is constructed under modern plans required by the state educational department, and will be an asset to the community.

How to Play BRIDGE Series 1929-30 by Wynne Ferguson Author of "PRACTICAL AUCTION BRIDGE"

In the preceding article the following problem hands were given and some interesting solutions have been received. Please note the following analyses:

Answer to Problem No. 2 Hearts—J, 10, 9, 7, 3 Clubs—7, 6, 3 Diamonds—Q, 10 Spades—A, 8, 2

No score, rubber game. Z dealt and bid one no trump. All passed and A opened the dummy of clubs, Y played the trey, B the nine and Z won the

Answer to Problem No. 3 Hearts—9, 2 Clubs—Q, 7, 5 Diamonds—8 Spades—K, J, 10, 9, 6, 5, 4

Rubber game, A B—20; Y Z—0. Z has the deal. Give the proper bidding of all four players and when you have decided on the final bid, the correct opening lead and subsequent play of the hand.

Solution: With a freak hand of this type, Z's only proper opening bid is four hearts. A should pass and Y should pass. He has fair help for hearts and should depend on the soundness of his partner's original bid. B has no choice but to double four hearts. He has apparently four tricks in his own hand and a good chance to defeat the bid. All should pass and A must then decide upon his proper opening.

Answer to Problem No. 4 Hearts—J, 8, 7 Clubs—A, Q, 9 Diamonds—6 Spades—none

There are no trumps and Z is in the lead. How can Y Z win four of the seven tricks against any possible defense?

Solution: Z should lead the four of spades. A can either win this trick by playing the queen of spades, or allow B to win the trick with the jack of spades. (a) Suppose B wins the trick. Y should discard the seven of hearts. B can now make one of three leads, (1) the ten of diamonds, (2) the ten of clubs, (3) the six of hearts. (1) Suppose at trick two B plays the ten of diamonds. Z should play the five of diamonds and A can either (a) play the seven of diamonds or (b) the queen of diamonds. (a) Suppose A plays the seven of diamonds. B must now lead a heart or a club. If he leads a heart, Y wins two heart tricks and returns the ace of clubs, thus forcing B to lead clubs, thus giving Y the two remaining tricks. If at trick three B should lead a club, Y should win the ace queen and throw B in the lead with the third club. B is then forced to lead hearts and Y again wins two heart tricks. (y) Suppose at trick two, A plays the queen of diamonds. Then A's best lead is the seven of diamonds, forcing Z in the lead with the jack of diamonds. On this trick B is forced to discard the ten of clubs or all of Y's hearts are good. Z should then lead the six of clubs, Y should play the ace and then the queen, forcing B to win the trick with the king. B must again lead hearts up to Y's hand and thus again Y Z win four tricks. (2) Suppose at trick two B leads the

trick with the ten of clubs. How should Z plan the play from now on so as to be sure of game, irrespective of the position of the cards and of his opponents' play?

Solution: The opening of the dummy of clubs marks A with exactly four clubs and B with two. For that reason, Z should lead the king of clubs at trick two so that when B obtains the lead, he will be forced to lead one of the other three suits. Z should then lead the ace and king of hearts. At the fifth trick Z should lead the jack of spades and, if A plays a low spade, Z should finesse the jack. If B wins this trick, he is thus obliged to lead back either hearts, spades or diamonds. No matter where the cards lie, Z must thus score three odd and the game. A good way to get the proper results from this hand is to lay out the cards and play the hand, first as directed and then without leading the second club and the two heart tricks.

Hearts—6, 4 Clubs—A, K, 8, 4 Diamonds—A, Q, J, 7 Spades—A, 8, 2

trick with the ace of diamonds and lead the four of hearts. Z should win this trick with the ace of hearts and lead the seven of spades. When A plays low, Z should finesse the nine of spades in Y's hand and B should win the trick with the ace.

If B makes the mistake of leading another heart, Z will make the balance of the tricks as he will in the trick in Y's hand with the nine of hearts and make all of Y's spades as they are now set up. If B leads the king of clubs, the result is the same as Z will trump and put Y in the lead with the nine of hearts and thus again be able to make all of Y's spades. B's best play at trick four is the lead of the queen of diamonds. Y must trump this trick with the nine of hearts and should then lead the king and jack of spades on which Z should discard his two losing diamonds. In this way, also, Y Z can make five odd, so it seems that there is no way for A to defeat the hand. If any of our readers can discover a way to do so, don't hesitate to send in solutions.

Hearts—9, 6 Clubs—K, J, 10, 9, 6, 5, 4 Diamonds—10 Spades—J

ten of clubs. Y should win the trick with the queen of clubs and force B in the lead with the ten of diamonds. B will then be forced to play the hearts or clubs up to Y's hand and he again makes three more tricks. If B leads hearts, Y easily makes two hearts and the ace of clubs. If B leads clubs, Y wins with the ace and returns a club which B must win. B then has to lead hearts up to Y, giving Y the two remaining tricks. If at trick three A should overtake B's ten of diamonds, the play will continue as already pointed out in (y).

(3) Suppose at trick two B should lead the six of hearts. Y will win this trick and lead back the six of diamonds forcing B in the lead. If B leads another heart, Y will win the trick and lead the nine of clubs. In this way Y will again win two more tricks. If A should overtake the ten of diamonds at trick three, the play will continue as already pointed out in (y). (b) Suppose A should win the first trick with the queen of spades. Y should discard the seven of hearts. A's best play is to return the eight of spades. B must discard the ten of clubs or all of Y's hearts will be good. Z's best play is to let A win this trick. A should then lead the seven of spades, forcing Z in the lead. On this trick, B should discard the ten of diamonds. Z should now lead the six of clubs which Y should win with the ace and lead back the queen of clubs. B is forced to win this trick and must lead hearts up to Y, who again wins two tricks. Played in any of these ways, therefore, Y Z must win four tricks against any defense.

The DAIRY

GARLIC FLAVORED MILK NOT WANTED

Precautions Needed to Keep Cows Away From Plant.

Garlic may have its place in the diet, but that place does not include the milk supply. Most consumers, in fact, object seriously to milk tainted with its noisome odor and, ordinarily, only a few bottles of it need be left at their door to cause them to change dealers.

Because of this, the dairy department of the New Jersey agricultural experiment station, New Brunswick, has suggested that dairymen take special pains to keep their cattle from indulging in the pernicious weed which causes the trouble. It has been found that even a very little partaking of this member of the onion family will become evident in the milk given by the cow shortly afterwards. Where milk purifiers are available to the milk distributor it is possible to remove much of the garlic aroma, but since such devices are not in universal use, various precautions are needed to keep the cows from the garlic plant. This is especially difficult in the spring just after the herds are turned out to pasture.

One method of circumventing the difficulty is to turn the young stock out on pasture at least two weeks ahead of the milking herd. In this way the young animals eat off the weeds. When the milking herd does finally go to pasture it should be returned to the barn about noon every day for a few days and given a liberal feeding of hay. Several days may pass before it is safe to turn the herd out at night. After that the garlic has become more or less stunted in growth and the animals have lost their first tendency to eat everything that is green. In other words, they seem to become more particular in their eating.

Milk Powder for Calves Tried in Various Ways

Many dairymen have tried in various ways to make use of skim-milk powder in calf feeding. Maurice Baird, connected with Ohio State university, who has charge of a number of dairy calves now on feed, outlines this method:

Use whole milk until the calf is two months old. This should be followed by a dry feed mixture, 300 pounds each, corn and cob meal, and ground oats bran, and 100 pounds oil meal. Two to three pounds of this mixture is fed daily. Skim-milk powder is added to the feed so the calf will receive one and one-half pounds of the mixture. Feeding is made at morning and evening periods. The skim-milk powder is omitted when the calf reaches nine months. Mixed hay and a pound of dried beet pulp are used, and plenty of water is available at all times. Silage may be used, replacing the beet pulp. Plenty of salt is supplied. Clean stalls at all times, and these stalls when cleaned should be sprinkled with lime, after which a plentiful supply of bedding is applied.

"The eye of the master fatteneth his flock," is always a part of the scheme of animal feeding. Experiments with skim-milk powder diluted in water have caused calves to get off feed, and have affected digestion. Skim-milk powder is well supplied with minerals needed by the calves. The cost of feeding and raising a heifer is so great that only good stock should be considered. Stock from disease-free herds, kept and raised under sanitary conditions, is the most desirable.

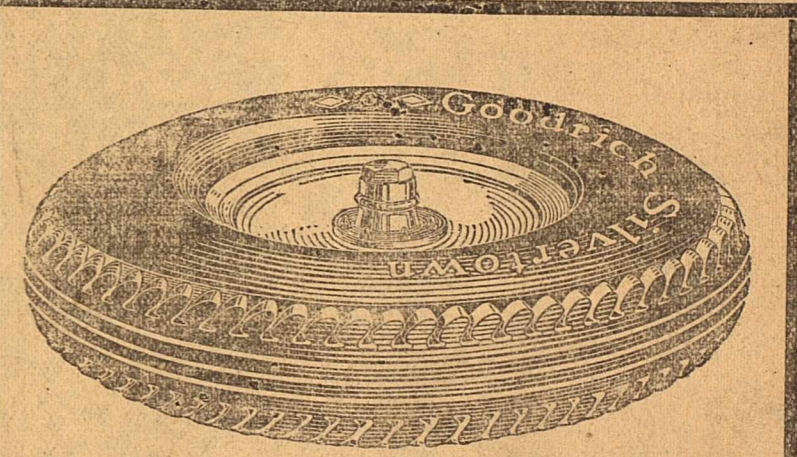
