



LONDON'S WATER.

Its Daily Consumption.

In 1894 the astounding total of 192, 000,000 gallons a day, was reached by the combined water companies of London, says Good Word. This was supplied to the five and a half million inhabitants at the rate of, say, thirtytwo gallons a head for all purposes. These figures represent an enormous volume of water, though small when compared with the mighty river that flows into old Rome. We can only deal with the figures roughly; the supply fluctuates to a considerable degree at different times in the year; it is, therefore, not possible to be mathematically accurate. Allowing for a sligh increase since the last return, and tak ing in other sources, to which I shall refer a little later, we may pretty safe ly put the present London water supply at about 200,000,000 gallons a day Let us try for a moment to realize what these figures mean. With 200. 600,000 gallons of water, we could fill a lake a mile long, a quarter of a mile wide and five feet deep. The water in it would weigh nearly a million tons. This lake would stretch from the Bank of Church, yet it would be emptied in a single day to assuage the thirst of London. Or suppose we could freeze all this water, we could build up a great block of ice a thousand feet long. a thousand feet wide and thirty-two feet high. If we allow for the expansion of freezing, the block would, feited if such a foolhardy attempt were made. of course, be still larger. Sixty-five of

the largest ironclads in the British navy could float in the water we use every day in London. When we come to compare our supply with the mighty torrent of Niagara we belittle it. The water goes thundering over the falls at the rate of two million tons a minute, or four hundred and twenty million gallons. Our whole daily supply would be whirled over long before the second hand of a watch would have traveled once round the dial. And could we divert the magnificent torrent for only three hours we could supply London with water for a whole year at the present rate. Niagara is a

Distributing Revenue Stamps.

Washington special Chicago Journal: The work of distributing the millions of internal revenue stamps over the country is performed in two ways. About 300 such agents are maintained in the principal business centers throughout the country. Commissioner Wilson says a larger commission should be allowed for distributing the stamps. Banks are guite unanimous in refusing to handle them, and the force of special stamp distributers has finally it was cut down to 1 per cent.

It is not generally known, but inquiry developed the fact that the seedy men who loiter around with no apparent aim in life are expert marksmen. These nen can shoot equally well with either hand, and would furnish highly entertaining sport for any one who should attempt to rob Uncle Sam. They are employed by the government at a good salary. Aside from these expert marksmen at the main entrance of the building will be found a number of watchmen, each of whom is provided with a rifle. Secreted in one of the rooms are two gatling guns, and it would require but a short time to bring all these arms into play. To the layman it would seem to be an apparently easy matter to steal some of the




