A gloom was cast over Nacogdoches Saturday eve ning by a telephone message drug bill, paid his board bill, nent business men of Nacog. seeing that he was cared for. the killing and the trouble ted without comment. leading up to the unfortunate occurence are not known to this paper; perhaps to no one.

Three shots were fired by Grayson, the fatal one striking Garrison in the heart and killing him instantly. Garrison had a knife in his hand but was not otherwise armed.

The sad affair is deeply regretted by the entire county, especially among the friends of the two men. Garrison is deeply affected by the untimely death of one of the most substantial of her business men, as well as a citizen she could illy afford, to lose. Mr. Garrison is a brother to Mrs. Dr. Barham and H. D. Garrison, of this city, and was largely connected throughout Nacogdoches, Rusk and Shelby counties.


