Weather, Farming Dominate News Here In 1983

Weather, sports and the farm situation dominated the news in Bovina during the calendar year 1983, according to a check of the Bovina Blade files.

The year started off on a cold, snowy scene, and when it ended, the cold had returned.

Here is a capsule of the year's top stories, as gleaned from the Blade pages:

JANUARY

On the final day of 1982, representatives of Energas Company, with the cooperation of City of Bovina employees and other local residents, had to make an emergency door-to-door check of residences, following a break in a gas line just south of Bovina. The break caused gas pressure at local residences to drop drastically for a time.

On January 5, we reported that Bovina resident Don Spring had completed his course and passed examinations to become a licensed paramedic. Spring spent seven and a half months on the course.

Bovina Woman's Study Club's Project Christmas Card raised \$1260 during the Christmas season, it was announced. The money is to go to help pay off the land on which the Bovina Clinic is located.

City Manager Tom Bonds was relieved of his duties at a special meeting of the Bovina City Council January 11.

New officers were elected by the Bovina Volunteer Fire Department at their first January meeting. The meeting also was a chance for the firemen to try on their new coverall-uniforms, purchased recently thanks to a fund drive.

The Bovina area received its second major snowstorm within a month's time on January 20-21. Total accumulation was around 11 inches, almost exactly what had been received in the local area on December 26, 1982.

FEBRUARY

Yet another winter storm struck the area January 31-February 1, dumping an additional six inches of snow. This storm was whipped along by 20 mph winds. Wreckers and tow trucks were kept busy pulling motorists out of ditches Tuesday morning. The storm was blamed for the deaths of three people following a wreck near Farwell.

Bret Whitten, Terry Moore, Ted Clayton and Matlock Howell exhibited the Grand Champion animals at the 27th annual Bovina Jr. Livestock Show.

The Bovina Mustangs won the District 5-AA basketball championship, running up a 10-0 district record. It's the first time in 22 years for the Mustangs to win the district title.

Rodney Bachman has been named new City Marshal for Bovina, and Mel Clark is a city patrolman. Former marshal, Ron Avirett, is the county Sheriff's deputy for

the Bovina area.

Bovina's Mustangs upended the state's ninth-rated class AA team in their bi-district game, taking an impressive 59-50 win over Shallowater February 25 at Plainview. Richard Shepherd scored 29 points, added six steals, five rebounds and one blocked shot.

MARCH

The Mustang basketball team saw their great 1982-83 season come to what fans felt was a premature end on March 1 at Monahans, as the team fell to Clint, 70-58 in an area playoff. An uneven break in fouls hurt the Mustangs, as officials called 23 fouls on Bovina and only nine against Clint. The Lions responded with 32 of 36 shots from the foul line.

Billy Cupit, Bovina FFA member, exhibited the breed champion Duroc at the Houston Livestock Show, and received \$6,888 in prize money. In all, local entries won around \$18,000 in the show.

A large number of friends and neighbors gathered March 14 at the Wendell Garner farm to plow the farmland of their friend, who passed away February 17.

Joe W. Jones was honored as Bovina's Man of the Year, and Frances Willard was named Woman of the Year at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet March 17. Other honors went to Margaret Durben, Teacher of the Year, Bret Whitten and Patti Sherrill, Outstanding Young People.

Parmer County farmers have gone for the "PIK" program in a big way, according to the county ASCS office. Figures showed that 95.5 per cent of the county's farmers plan to lay out a total of 117,686 acres of their 1983 crop.

APRIL

Even though the calendar says it's spring, you wouldn't know it by the weather. Temperature on Monday, April 4 was only 32, setting a new record for lowest maximum temperature on that date. Snow flurries were reported in the area on April 1, as winter hates to give up.

An estimated 25,000 acres of grass were destroyed north of Bovina in the Rhea community on Monday, April 11. Bovina firemen joined those from Clovis, Texico, San Jon, Grady, Broadview and Friona in fighting the fire.

Richard Shepherd, Greg McClaran and Jon Riddle were named to the all-district basketball team. Shepherd was also named the district's Most Valuable Player, and Coach Marks Lanham was named "Coach of the Year" for District 5-AA.

Lisa Schilling, Shana Gober and Marie Pesch were named to the girls' all-district team.

Richard Shepherd was chosen to a spot on the

Conference 2A all-state team, announced by the Texas Sports Writers Assn.

MAY

Honor graduates for Bovina High School's Class of 1983 are: Bret Whitten, with a 96.2 four-year average, and Jan Shough, with a 94.99 average. Whitten is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Whitten, and Miss Shough is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tillman Shough.

Thirty-nine BHS seniors received their diplomas in graduation exercises May 27 at the Bovina Schools Auditorium.

JUNE

One of the oldest institutions in Bovina, Bovina Wheat Growers, closed its doors for good on Friday, June 10. BWG was organized in 1928. The elevator had closed previously, and the fuel division had been kept open for the past several months.

Paving of the parking lot at the Bovina Senior Citizens Center was begun, and workmen uncovered two large underground gas tanks on the lot, which had been all but forgotten by local residents.

JULY

Gabe D. Anderson, Jr. was elected to the board of directors of the Texas Commerce Bank of Amarillo early in July. Anderson is president and chief executive officer of grain elevator companies in Bovina, Farwell, Lazbuddie, Lariat and Rhea.

Gateway Produce Company re-opened on a limited basis on July 12. Buck Neil of Farwell is serving as manager.

AUGUST

Three men from Bovina, Andy Garza, Corky Saenz and Arty Kunselman, attended the Texas A&M Fire Protection School at College Station.

The 20th annual Bull Town Days celebration was held August 18-19-20-21. New events included a "Bull Run," and a "Flip For Funds." A second-year event was the Tug-o-War. With the possible exception of the parade, most events were well-attended with good participation.

SEPTEMBER

Two men were in jail September 5 charged with aggravated robbery, in connection with the knife-point robbery of the Allsup's Convenience Store in Bovina early on the morning of Sunday, September 4.

Along with a number of similar depots across the Panhandle, Bovina's Santa Fe Railway depot was closed as of September 12, with regional freight office (RFO) service coming through Amarillo.

Bovina's city council, after considering bids on a seal-coat program for city streets, has decided to do the job themselves. The city said it expected to save about half the cost, or over \$8,000 by doing the work using city employees.

OCTOBER

Bovina Supermarket is now a member of the Affiliated Grocer group, it was announced October 5 by Billy Whitecotton and Billy Smith, owners. The store will operate under the Thriftway group.

The Bovina Mustangs broke a three-game losing streak, and got their district schedule off to a good start, with a 35-14 win over the Hart Longhorns October 7. The game was the Homecoming game for the Mustangs and their fans.

The Bovina Chamber of Commerce announced that it had withdrawn its sponsorship of the city's Bull Town celebration. The Chamber felt that another organization might be interested in taking sponsorship of the event.

NOVEMBER

Larry Mitchell has completed his work and is now a certified Paramedic, it was announced.

Seth Ralston, Parmer County Agent since 1978, has tendered his resignation to the county commissioners effective December 1.

Butch and Ben McCain, Bovina natives, were featured performers on ABC television's Hee Haw show on November 19. The brothers are a news and weather team for station KTVY television of Oklahoma City.

Leon Grissom of Bovina was a lucky winner at the Texas Cattleman's Convention in San Antonio November 13-16. He was the winner of a new saddle. The Bovina resident also had the chance to visit with singer Charlie Pride while flying back from the convention.

DECEMBER

Richard Shepherd, Bovina High School athletic star, proved he can also pick the winners of football games by winning the grand prize in the Blade's annual football contest. Shepherd edged out Frances Johnson for the 1983 title, 123 points to 122.

The Body Connection celebrated its first anniversary of being in business with a Christmas bazaar and open house on December 10.

Clayton Farm Center opened as a new business in Bovina. Dickie Clayton is owner and manager. The business is located at 700 Third Street.

Billy McAlister is the new manager of Lone Star Insurance Agency, replacing Ken Horn, who has moved to Lubbock.

County Agent To Report January 16

A new county Extension agent for agriculture has been appointed for Parmer County. Gary D. Patterson will assume the post January 16.

Patterson has served Hockley County as agricultural agent with Bill Taylor for the past two years. His selection for Parmer County was announced by County Judge Porter Roberts and Dr. Catherine B. Crawford, district director with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Patterson fills the vacancy left by the recent transfer of Seth Ralston to Parmer County.

Born in Lubbock, Patterson grew up in Hale Center and was graduated from Hale Center High School. While there he was named to the all-district football team and was active in 4-H. He exhibited a grand champion steer at the Plainview Stock Show and took first place at State 4-H Roundup with an agronomy demonstration.

He received a Bachelor of Science degree in animal science from Lubbock Christian College in May 1981. At LCC, he was a dean's list student, was active in the Agriculture Club and was named outstanding freshman agriculture student. He was on the livestock judging team for four years and was a member of the first place national collegiate team in 1981.

Following graduation he worked as a construction foreman for Plainview Foundation, Inc., until joining the

Extension Service as assistant agent in Hockley County January 1, 1982. He is a member of the Texas County Agricultural Agents Assn.

Patterson is married to the former Cindy Hacker of Hale Center. They have a son and a daughter.

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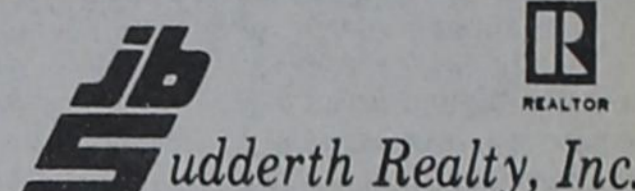
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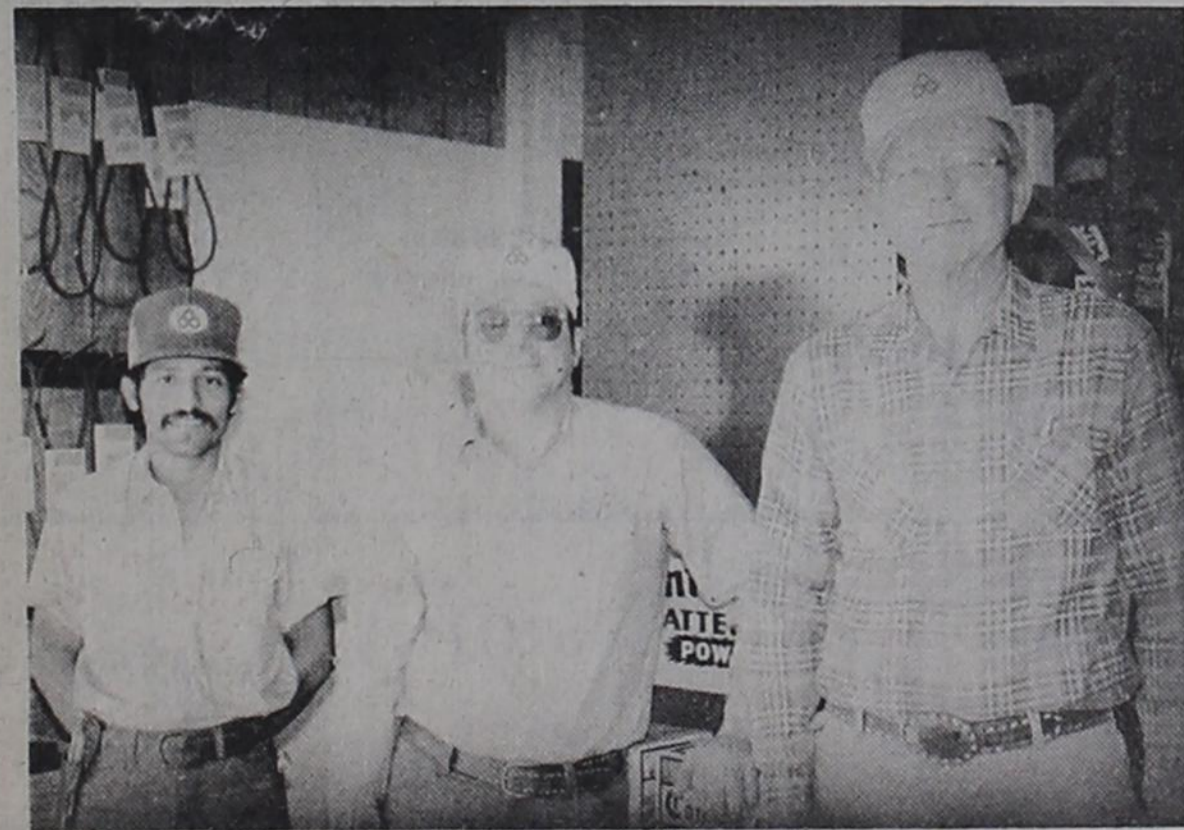

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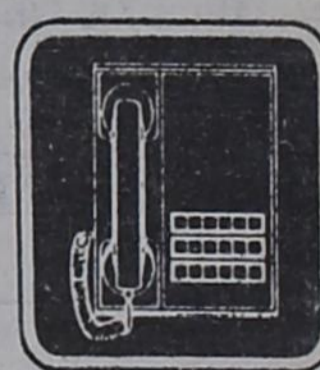
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School Corner

We are presently living in an exciting and challenging time for education as the State of Texas examines the curriculum of our public schools. The 1984-85 school term will introduce some major changes to our curriculum. It is impossible at the present time to be exact as to the new changes; but the following is the High School proposal being examined by the State Board of Education:

Twenty-one units will be required by the state for graduation including: 1. English-4 units; 2. Mathematics-3 units; 3. Science-2 units; 4. Social Studies-2½ units; 5. Economics-Free Enterprise ½ unit; 6. Physical Education-1½ units; 7. Health-½ unit; 8. Electives-7 units.

Students who wish to complete an advanced or college prep high school program and to have such accomplishment recognized and distinguished on a transcript form adopted by the State Board of Education, must complete additional requirements. Twenty-two units including the following must be taken:

1. English-4 units including

advance English IV which is British Literature ½ unit, and Composition-½ unit; 2. Mathematics-3 units to include Algebra I, Geometry, and Algebra II; 3. Science-3 units to include selected courses from Physical Science, Biology, Chemistry, and Physics; 4. Foreign Language-2 units of any one language; 5. An additional unit from Mathematics, Science, or Languages; 6. Fine Arts-1 unit; 7. Social Studies-2½ Units; 8. Economics-½ unit; 9. Physical Education-1½ units; 10. Health-½ unit; 11. Computer Science-1 unit; and 12. Electives-2 units.

Students entering the ninth grade in 1984-85 will be required to graduate under new regulations in 1987-88 if this plan is adopted by the State Board of Education.

With these new regulations approaching, it is very important for parents to become involved in the enrollment of next year's ninth grade class. An announcement will be publicized when enrollment begins this Spring.

Let us all continue to work together in insure success of our young people in their educational endeavors.

Fillies Run Season Wins To Twelve

The Bovina High School Fillies won their last two games of 1983, and pushed their season record to 12 wins against only two losses.

The Fillies topped Three Way, 59-29 here on December 20. In that game, the team had a narrow 11-8 lead after one quarter, but gradually made the game a runaway.

Three girls tied for scoring honors with ten points each. Rande Cupit, Shana Gober and Terisa Shepherd all scored ten points, as the team came

up with a balanced scoring attack.
