fused to redeem its pledges. The amendment will not be submitted. But the end is not yet. The tribunal of the highest resort is the people; and these have yet to speak. And when they do speak, we apprehend it will be with no uncertain sound."

The Mercury clear forgot to state that every populist member of the legislature voted against submitting the amendment. It is quite true there is only one member of the populist persuasion in the present legislature, but all the same his vote is recorded on the side of those who opposed the amendments, and in the eye of the public this lone memberis supposed to represent the populist political sentiment of the entire State. The fact is, the populist party of Texas, through his representative in the legislature, has voted in favor of the railroads and corporations every time the opportunity offered. This is a matter of record and history. In 1892 the populist party elected six or seven members to the legislature. The member from this county was a populist and is the same gentleman who a few days ago voted against the Hogg amendments. Early in the session of the legislature in 1893, a bill was introdruced under the following title: "An act to define the franchises; to make public the value of railroads; to make effective section 6, articlé 12 of the State constitution; to 'declare the effect of judicial and other sales of railroads; to limit the amount of stocks and bonds and other indebtedness that may be issued by railroad companies, etc." The main effect of the bill was to prevent the issuance by the railroad companies of watered stocks and bonds. On the 6th day of April 1893 the house of representatives passed this bill by a vote of 62 yeas and 32 nays. There were eight populist members present and voted against its passage. The intention of the legislature was that the rules should be suspended and the bill become a law at once. To do this a two-third vote was necessary. If the eight populist members had voted in the affirmitive a two-third vote would have been secured. As it was, however, it did not become effective till ninety days after adjournment or August 7, 1893. During this time fourteen railroads in Texas issued bonds to the amount of \$42,850,000. 


