Treating Fruit-Trees for Scale.

There is probably no more deadly pest known to fruitgrowers than the scale which infests many of the finest orchards of California. Innumerable efforts have been made to rid the trees of these destroyers; but the success which has been attained has not always been noteworthy. Mr. Isaac M. Clark, a fruit growor of Lompoc, Cal., has invented a process which seems to be all that can be claimed for it. The substances which are used in the process by which the trees are ireed of scale comprise essentially any mineral oil caustic alkali, and water. The mineral oil is sprayed upon the trees by means of a pump. The oil-spraying is then followed by the caustic alkali solution, applied in the same manner. The oil is intended to kill and destroy the scale and insects that infest the trees-a result achieved in from three to eight minutes. The caustic alkali solution serves the purpose of neutralizing the oil after the desired




