THREE NEGROES SHOT.

Desperate Fight Between Will Smith and Will Dixor

About 5 o'clock yesterday evening a desperate tight took place between WM Smith and Will Dixon, both colored, in which both combatants were probably fatally wounded and Henry Abraham, a colored barber who was acting as peacemaker, was shot through, the bowels and will probably die. Abraham's wound was accidental. The tight took place in one of the baildings. in the Bailey block on Church street just north of, the Sentinel office, used as a colored barber shop and res taurant the restaurant being run by Ben Teel, colored, and the barber shop by Abraham. The shooting began in the kitchen of the restaurant. All effort to find out what the fight was about has failed. The cook, a negro boy, who seems to have been the only one present when the fight occurred, either does not know, or will not tell, what it was about. THE FARMERS' INSTITUTE.

Two Interesting and Instructive Session Held Yesterday.

Two sessions of the Farm ers' Institute were held vesterday, at 1 o'clock and at night, and many interesting talks were made, which were received with enthusiasm by large audiences.

Besides a good representation of larmers from all sections of the county, the following prominent gentlemen were present: Wm. Doherty, Assistant Passenger Agent of the H. E. & W. T. Ry.; A. H. Atwater, Industrial Agent Southern Pacific Ry.; F. W. Mally, State Entomologist; Prot. C. E. Green, Chair of Horticulture, A. & M. College; Sam H. Dixon, Immigration and Passenger Agent H. E. & W. T. Ry.; W. H. Taylor, Freight and Passenger Agent H. E. & W. T. Texas Farm and Ranch; Prof J. H. Connell, of the A. & M. College, and others.

The meeting was called to order by T. E. Burgess, president of the Nacogdoches Fruit and Truck Growers as sociation and the openining address was delivered by Prot. Connell, followed by Prot. and Judge Middle-Green

with thirty-four members, and H. S. Edler was elected president, W. R. Falkner vicepresident, J. D. McKnight from start to finish, and was secretary, and C. A. Hodges attended by representative reasurer.

The address of Prot. J. H. Connell, of the Farm and Ranch, was yery interesting. He spoke of the progress of crop diversification and the ent. importance of further development and improvement. and urged that the time had come when the farmers of this country were compelled in self defence to turn their attention to other matters than the raising of cotton.

Mr. Sam Dixon spoke next, showing that the success of the fruit and truck industry depended entirely upon organization and co-operation. He gave several instances as illustration of the point and advised the people to see that the tomato crop next year was either sold at the depot or consigned to other points only upon guarantee. Mr. Dixon's remarks were a center shot + the local situation, and he was the recipient of numerous congratulations upon his strong

There were several other speeches upon the same line,

interesting and to the point. The night session was opened by Prot. Atwater, his theme being "the undeveloped resources of Texas." He had at hand to illustrate his talk, pecans, peanuts, tomatoes, corn, cotton, silk and all the fibers that can be produced from cotton, weeds and grass. He also had samples of several hardwoods, all of which belong to this country and are very valuable. Prof. Atwater stated that the soils of Nacogdoches county were well suited to almost every kind of cereal and fiber under the sun, and that almost every known money crop could be produced here easily it the people would only take the time and trouble to experiment. All these remarks were illustrated and enlivened by anecdotes, and his address was concluded with the remark that the people of Texas, besides living in the greatest and grandest state in the Union, had caused a dozen blades of grass to grow where only one grew before; they had made wool on sheep longer and better, the hair of goats finer and more valuable, the horns of steers shorter, the nose of the razor back reduced in length, fruit placed on trees hitherto considered worthless, the desert had been made to bloom as the rose, and last of all the bray of the jackass, human and beast, had been changed into a melody that chimes with the grand march of progress.
