CJC to sponsor workshop on **Native-American histories**

Dr. Duane Hale, Cisco Junior College History Instructor, won't have to travel far this summer to conduct his researching and writing tribal/band histories workshops.

For the first time ever, Cisco Junior College will sponsor these interesting sessions. They will be held at the home campus on June 8-12, June 15-19, and June 29-July 4, with registration open to the public.

These Workshops are expected to attract a number of Native tribal American historians, as well as Tribal leaders, Indian Studies program students, Librarians, Museum Directors, College teachers, Writers, and all interested researchers.

Hale began his researching and Writing Tribal/Band Histories Workshop series in 1983, and each of the 26 Workshops until now have been sponsored by the University Oklahoma.

Most have been held at the University of Oklahoma, but one has been held in Vancouver, Beitish Columbia, two in Ottawa, and one each in Canada, Tempe, Arizona, Chicago, Ili., and Washington D.C. over 450 tribes and bands from North America have attended these Workshops.

There will be a number of topics and activities included in all the CJC Workshops. Monday Each registration will be held from 7:30 -8 a.m., then a one hour introductory lecture by Dr. Hale. There will be opportunity for Internet research in the mornings, and after luch sessions will be held in the Texas room of the Maner Library. Each of the Workshops will be limited to 35 participants.

Those who attended will learn where to find information, common problems Tribal/Band Historical Research, using printed sources, and how to do interviewing and mesh oral history with written history.

There will be instruction on family Tribal/Band genealogy, on deciding what type of book to write, learning how to determine which events are most important, and work on book themes. Tips on writing and publishing techniques will be included.

Participants will also receive a copy of Researching and Writing Tribal Histories, a book written by Dr. Hale.

Return To Family Hour

Even the most conscientious parents can find it a challenge to manage the influences on their young children when one of the most serious offenders sits right in their own living rooms - the television set.

While there remains much to be done, we have seen the impact which coordinated public influence can have. This year, two quality family-oriented dramas were renewed and two new hourlong dramas were added to the 8:00 p.m. schedule. In addition, CBS President Les Moonves pledged publicly that the first hour of CBS' prime time lineup would be suitable for the entire family, and for the most part CBS' has lived up to that promise.

This week I took two steps to add my support to these efforts. First, I signed a bipartisan letter to the major commercial broadcast networks asking them to voluntarily restore the first hour of prime time each evening for viewing suitable by all American families. This "safe haven" would be air time that is free of obscene language and sexual content. The letter also encourages the networks to create more shows which reinforce positive values such as honesty, strength of character and

respect. Secondly, I cosponsored legislation which would give the broadcast industry the tools to reinstate a set of voluntary programming guidelines. The nation's broadcasters once embraced this kind of

Additionally, this bill specifically would prohibit the T.V. industry from using an antitrust exemption to restrict the sale of commercial advertising, fix prices, or engage if any

Getting The Most From Your Money



SOME MIDYEAR TAX REMINDERS

Some businesses are facing an important tax deadline on July 1. That's the date on which certain businesses may begin depositing their federal taxes electronically. The deadline applies to your business if you made federal tax deposits of more than \$50,000 during 1995. You should have received the enrollment information for this new system from the IRS. If you haven't, or if you're not ready to comply with the new rules, you should contact your accountant

If you received revised Form 1099s after filing your 1996 return, or if you discover some other omission or error made on the return you filed, you should file an amended return (Form 1040X). Amended returns can be filed within three years. from the time the original return was filed or two years from the time the tax was paid, whichever is later. If you amend to claim additional deductions and the IRS owes you money, you will receive a refund with interest. If you're filing the amended return to report more income, additional taxes should be paid when you file the 1040X. The IRS will bill you if there are interest and/or penalty charges.

As you do your tax planning for 1997, keep in mind that the politicians in Washington are talking tax change again. While some are advocating total reform of the tax system, change in 1997 is likely to be considerably less sweeping, if it occurs at all. Among the most likely in mind: a tax credit for dependent children, changes in the taxation affecting home sales, expanded IRAs, some sort of credit or deduction for education expenses, and some capital gains t relief. It's a good idea to find out how any pending legislation might affect you before you make any significant financial decisions in either your personal life or your business.
