directed alike against those who give and those who reto cover discrimination in prices as against competitors particular locan resorte ing competition. In order to reach producers guilty of thes offenses, who are as producers merely beyond National control, a penalty should be im posed upon the interestate and foreign transportation of goods produced by them and Federa courts should be given power
to restrain such transportation at the government's suit."
The president's policy is to keep competition free, believ ing that in this country, where money is cheap and abundant and within the reach of keen and capable men, this course will make monopoly imposst
ble. He urges that small en terprises have certain advan tages over large combinations and will live and thrive if assured of an open and farr field. This is good, sound democratic doctrine, which if carried out will raise the president a notch or two in the estimation
of the struggling "small fry" of the struggling "small
manufacturers, at least.

Every person having a claim is entitled to a vote and should be present, either in person or by attorney. These creditors, by a majority vote in num-

ber and amount of claims, elect "one trustee or three trustees," whose duty it will assets and to reduce of all the the property of the estates. When the property of every character has been reduced t money, and the costs and ex-
penses have been paid, the money on hand will be paid pro rata to the creditors whose claims have been allowed.
This in short is the course of bankruptcy proceedings and most cases are easily disposed of. But the W/ettermark bank ruptcy is enormous and intri-
cate, having many conflicting interests. There are many questions of law and of fact There are questions of offsets counter claims, agency, surety ship, partnership, etc., whic will take time and patience The trustee should be the most competent man available.
