What Our Courts Say About Injunctions In Local Option Cases.

"It is not made to appear that the court having jurisdiction to try alleged violations of local option laws would not, if the election referred to was illegal and void, so hold and acquit the plaintiff of any charge that might be preferred against him for unlawfully selling liquor in the territory referred to."

True, it is agreed that the enforcement of local option would have resulted in closing and injuring his business; but, if the election was null and void, then the action of the commissioners court in declaring the result of the election would not make a valid local option law, and it is fair to presume that the court having jurisdiction of any prosecution attempted thereunder would so declare and acquit the plaintiff of any charge preferred against him and therefore local option would not be enforced." *Harding vs Com. Court McLennan Co.* In the case of *McDaniel vs State* the Court says: "It is difficult to understand upon what ground an injunction can issue as in this case against the publication of the order declaring the result. If the law is void by reason of any mistake, failure or fraud in any of the prior steps, necessary for its adoption a publication of the result could have added no force or efficiency. Whereas, if the prior steps were valid the Court by enjoining the publication lends the power and process of the Court to thwart the will of the public. It should not be forgotten that a plain and adequate remedy is provided in the law itself. Under article 3239a Rev. Stat. ample provision is made for the contest of the result of the election and the grounds set forth upon which the contest must be made. This contest must be filed before the expiration of thirty days, during which the publication is carried on. Now when the contest is filed there can be no possible necessity for an injunction, for the publication not being completed, the law cannot be enforced, and when completed the contest being previously instituted is the pending and ipso facto suspends the operation of the law, which if found on contest not to be legally adopted, a new election is ordered. I am therefore of the opinion that the law cannot be legally nullified by District Judges intertending with the publication of the order."

The case of ex-parte Robert Mays, the Court of Criminal appeals says: "We do not believe that the District Court had any jurisdiction to entertain the injunction proceedings. The law provides in regard to contest for local option elections that they shall be conducted as nearly as possible under the same rules as in contests for election of officers. The statute having pointed out this remedy it would seem to exclude any other character of proceeding." The granting of injunctions in local option elections is no longer an open question in this State and the District Judge who grants such injunctions does so in the face of repeated decisions of our Courts of Appeal and Supreme Court.

Judge Berger Back.

From Monday's Daily: County Judge Robert Berger returned to the city yesterday and went to his office quite leisurely this morning and made the necessary and usual entry of the publication of his proclamation putting Local Option into effect in this county at 12 o'clock Tuesday night, and about two hours thereafter he was served with a writ of injunction restraining him from making the entry that he had already made. The Judge had been to the Dallas Fair and to several other far away points and says he had a good time. But the officer almost took his breath when he served that injunction on him. It was so unexpected, so sudden, so rash, the good Judge almost collapsed. We all hope for his speedy recovery.

Notice to Tax Payers.

The 1903 tax rolls have been approved and the same are now open for collection. Owing to the fact that from a recent ruling by Atty General of the State, the Collector will not be allowed to use a supplemental Poll Tax receipt Book on his round, and it will be impossible to visit each voting box in the county.

The law will be complied with by spending 2 days in each Justice Precinct at the place where court is held, and I will have with me the Poll Tax receipt Books for the particular Precinct only.

The round will be made later on, of which due notice will be given, and all Poll Tax Payers who do not meet me on the round will have to appear in person at the office or send a written order for their Poll Tax receipts. If an order is given, then your agent will have to furnish the collector with the information required by law (sworn to) before the receipts can be issued. The present method of issuing these receipts is very tedious and I would advise the Tax Payers not to put off paying their Taxes too long and avoid the rush we usually have in the latter part of the Tax paying season in the office.

When the Nacogdoches county people voted for prohibition they did so because the want prohibition and having adopted it they are going to have it, all the devil of hell to the contrary notwithstanding.

If that little crowd are no better at other things than at enjoinin they had better quit for they are star failures in that most unworthy enterprise. What they ought to do is to crawl in a hole and pull it in after them if they can.

It is a little difficult to head these Nacogdoches prohibitionists off when they get their head dead set and have started in the race. And when the race is run and they have won, the trophy is their'n quite certain and don't you allow it to escape your very best recollection.

Our information is that neither Jim McKnight nor Tom Smith had anything whatever to do with getting out that injunction that so signally failed to enjoin. These young gentlemen have always conducted themselves and their business in a quiet orderly manner.

We notice that the Dallas News correspondent from this place says that the principal grounds on which the antis rely to defeat prohibition in this county is that the act of the last legislature extending the time for payment of taxes till March 1st 1903 applies to poll taxes also and that all those who paid poll tax after Feb. 1st and before March 1st were entitled to vote. As if the legislature of this State had the power or authority to amend our constitution!!

When Judge Berger returns to the city and gets to the County Minute book and enters therein his notation that his proclamation has been published in the Nacogdoches Weekly Sentinel on the 16th day of September, the 23rd day of September, the 30th day of September and the 7th day of October, 1903, prohibition will be ready to go into effect in Nacogdoches county. The jig is up with the Antis, and they need not forget it.

It Scoggins has made ten thousand dollars per year on his saloon, and he made affidavit that the business was worth that much to him, why he can afford to retire and start him a bank. Whether he can afford it or not he will be pretty certain to retire from the saloon business in Nacogdoches county. If he don't retire from it he will be retired from it. By the way, if these saloons have been making their proprietors each ten thousand dollars per year a whole heap of good money in Nacogdoches county has been worse than thrown away—for money spent for whiskey in ninety-nine out of an hundred cases is worse than money burned. It isn't one time out of a thousand that whiskey is an advantage to the drinker. It is usually a curse to him.

NONE BUT MEAN MEN WILL VIOLATE IT.

That every good man should vote for prohibition, is we think, an incontrovertible proposition. Still it is not contended that to so vote is a prerequisite to good citizenship. Unquestionably some of the best men living oppose prohibition. But no right thinking man will oppose the enforcement of that law when it has been in conformity with the constitution and statutes adopted. Every good man will favor the execution of the law—support it, uphold it, and denounce its violators. Why then will not prohibition prohibit? Who says it won't? No law, human or divine, is without its violators, we readily concede. Upon what business principle is this law violated when violated at all? Our insistence is that none but very mean men will violate it; none but the most depraved and villainous characters will be found taking that law in their own hands. Certainly it cannot be that men will violate it just for the love of doing so. The man who will violate a law simply because he loves to do so is an arch enemy to his country; and to tar and feather and ride that man out of the country on a barb fence wire is too good for him, for truly his condition of mind is too close akin to the treasonable state to render it safe to others for him to enjoy the freedom and prerogatives that are and ought to be accorded the non-offensive citizenship of the country. What business basis, what calculation, what business judgment can prompt a man to the violation of that law? The very lowest punishment prescribed for each infraction of the Local Option law is a fine of twenty-five dollars and twenty days in jail, and added to this, of course, is the court's costs. The experiences of the courts in the trials of violations of this law prove that the average sale in violation of Local Option is not over fifty cents. If it be conceded that the fifty cents is all profit we find that the salesman runs the risk of having to pay a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars, stay in jail not less than twenty days, and the cost of a trial in order to make fifty cents. To anything like a good man this would be too much sugar, entirely too much, for a dime. The man who therefore violates the Local Option law is a mean man. He deliberately calculates that his every patron will commit wilful and willing perjury for his protection. He is a caterer to perjury. He encourages it. His profit depends upon it. And only upon perjury, wholesale perjury, can he flourish. No more cold blooded debaucher of either private or public morals treads the earth than the man who plays the blind tiger or runs the boot leg racket. He is a monstrous, vicious creature; certainly no better and possibly no worse than the meanest hog thief. When apprehended in his lawlessness he hopes by perjury to induce a jury to acquit him. He must be understood to be appreciated. The innocent child he would as willingly make a victim of his

debauchery as he would any grown person. He should be loathed for he is assuredly loathsome. No reliance can be placed upon his oath, for he who enters that field of operation leaves all honor behind. Jurors must learn him well in order to treat him right—for while perjury is the bootleggers' refuge the credibility of jurymen must finally be his protection, if he has any. Our hope is that jurors and the citizenship of the country generally will place just the proper estimate upon those hellians who go about the country seeking whose morals they can devour so that when in court they will be treated just as they deserve—that they will be believed just as are the thieves and swindlers believed. In short, they will not be believed at all, for they are not entitled to be believed.

There is only one issue raised by the would-be (if they just could-be) enjoiners in their sworn-to application for injunction that has not been decided by the higher courts in favor of the prohibitionists, and that one issue is false, absolutely false, as we are abundantly able to prove. Prohibition in Nacogdoches county is going to prohibit.

If there were but 4 notices of the prohibition election posted who was in danger? What was there to enjoin? In the prosecution of any violations of the local option law as soon as it was shown but four notices had been posted the court would instruct the jury to acquit. Does a petition showing but four notices had been posted show any equity? To the contrary it shows the utter want of equity, and destroys all reason for an injunction because if true the applicant is in no danger whatever.

Why did the antis wait until the last week of publication of the proclamation to get out this writ of injunction? For no other reason than that they knew there was no equity entitling them to an injunction and that if the case was set for hearing before the publication of the last notice the court would most certainly dissolve it. No, that was not their plan. The Plamdealer gives that away when it says in this week's issue that "At all events the antis have just a little the edge by virtue of the injunction which puts the matter in court until next spring." That's the bug under the chip. "In the court until next spring." And all this done to allow one or two saloon men here to continue selling whiskey over the determined protest and emphatically expressed will of the citizenship of Nacogdoches county until "next spring." An injunction granted on a sworn application that says the women, preachers and children scared the timid antis away from the polls. And like Uncle Dan!" when he saw the steam boat coming down the river, they ran in terror to the woods and way off yonder in a weak and trembling voice cried "here I is Lord—here I is."

PRESS COMMENTS.

The Nacogdoches Sentinel came two in a bunch this morning, and both were "warm babies." Fact is, the "anti" people have struck a snag with their injunction and the lessees of The Sentinel are telling them about it.—Timpson Times.

If a district judge proscribes his powers by meddling in a matter coming properly under the jurisdiction of another judge, there being no just complaint lodged against the latter, he need not be surprised to find his orders disregarded and set aside by the people themselves. This is a law-abiding and respecting country, it is true, but it is not a country where the people will stand for a perversion and misapplication of the law. The limit has about been reached, and the "injunction judges" of Texas had as well take notice.—Banner.

There is no little interest now manifested in the result of prohibition the election being declared in this county. The fourth and last publication is made and that will be done in two papers) The Sentinel and Signal published in this county this week. While there is considerable feeling expressed against the saloon men for trying to enjoin the publication, we understand that this proceeding was encouraged by the Brewers and others that furnished the saloon men the beer and whiskey.

Prohibition will be declared by Judge Berger and carried into effect in Nacogdoches county.—Garrison Signal.

A recent edition of the Texas Christian Advocate contained an able article from its distinguished editor entitled, "The injunction Menace," wherein he pointed out the injustice done to the people of a county that had voted prohibition by a judge in another part of the State granting an injunction restraining the results of the election from being published. Nacogdoches county is a victim of this nuisance, as a judge at Houston has granted an injunction forbidding the Sentinel from publishing the order of the commissioners court declaring the results of the election held Sept. 3rd. W. M. Imboden, J. T. Garrison, S. W. Blount, June C. Harris and others have leased The Sentinel for the time being and will publish the proclamation, and pay no attention to the injunction. We do not believe it is right for a judge in one part of the State who has no interest in, or knows anything about the people of another part, to take any hand in such affairs.—Center Champion.

The Nacogdoches Sentinel was leased last week, by Blount, Garrison, Imboden et al and is under the management of Mr. Beeson.

This was a plan evolved by the Pros. to delay injunction proceedings granted by Judge Hamblen to arrest the publication of the order of the Commissioners court for the fourth time, and to enjoin the court from declaring the result of the prohibition election recently held in this county.

The vote of this election

was so overwhelming in favor of prohibition that it was not thought that any proceeding would be instituted to disturb the result. The owners of the plant, Messrs. Haltom & Haltom were enjoined from publication, but the Sentinel under the new management will publish the order for the fourth and required time and also the Signal by order of the court of Oct. 3rd publishes the same. The voice of the people spoke in thunder tones too plainly to be mistaken and these open expressions of the officers indicate that the strong arm of the law will be used to carry out the expressed will of the people.—Garrison Signal.

Judge Hamblen insists that the absent treatment applied by him to the prohibitionists of Montgomery county is reinforced at every seam, and is warranted not to rip, wear, ravel, or run down at the heel; and that it bears the brand of legality; but the district clerk of Montgomery county seems to think he has something in stock which is just as good.—Houston Post.

The pathway of the injunction judges is getting so fearfully rocky and troublesome that it will not be long before district judges will begin viewing with alarm the appearance of a strange looking document concealed about his person. As previously noted in the Journal, citizens of Nacogdoches have contemptuously ignored a writ granted by an injunction judge in Galveston, and now the clerk of Montgomery county has punctured the injunction tire of a Harris county district judge by refusing to file an injunction writ in Montgomery county. Judge W. P. Hamblen is the Houston judge who is making the abortive attempt to govern the people of Montgomery county with injunctions from his court, and a Mr. Morris is the district clerk in Montgomery county who has brought the injunction reign of the Harris county judge to an end before it was inaugurated. Discussing the action of the district clerk the injunction judge says: "I granted the writ on a petition that was sufficient on its face to entitle the plaintiffs to an injunction. In Texas districts judges are not confined to their own district, but grant injunctions outside of that territory when they are determine that the facts warrant it. I never have objected to district judges of other districts granting injunctions returnable to me and will always see that they are obeyed until properly dissolved. Any other course would be the destruction of judicial authority. I regret that other people think otherwise, and I regret it especially in a case where I have granted an injunction." The judge could have saved his self-respect and the dignity of his court by diligently attending to such litigations as may be pending in the district over which he was selected to preside. Montgomery county is in the district in which Hon. L. B. Hightower is judge. Judge Hightower is always accessible and no one will question that he will at all times discharge his duty without fear or favor.—Beaumont Journal.

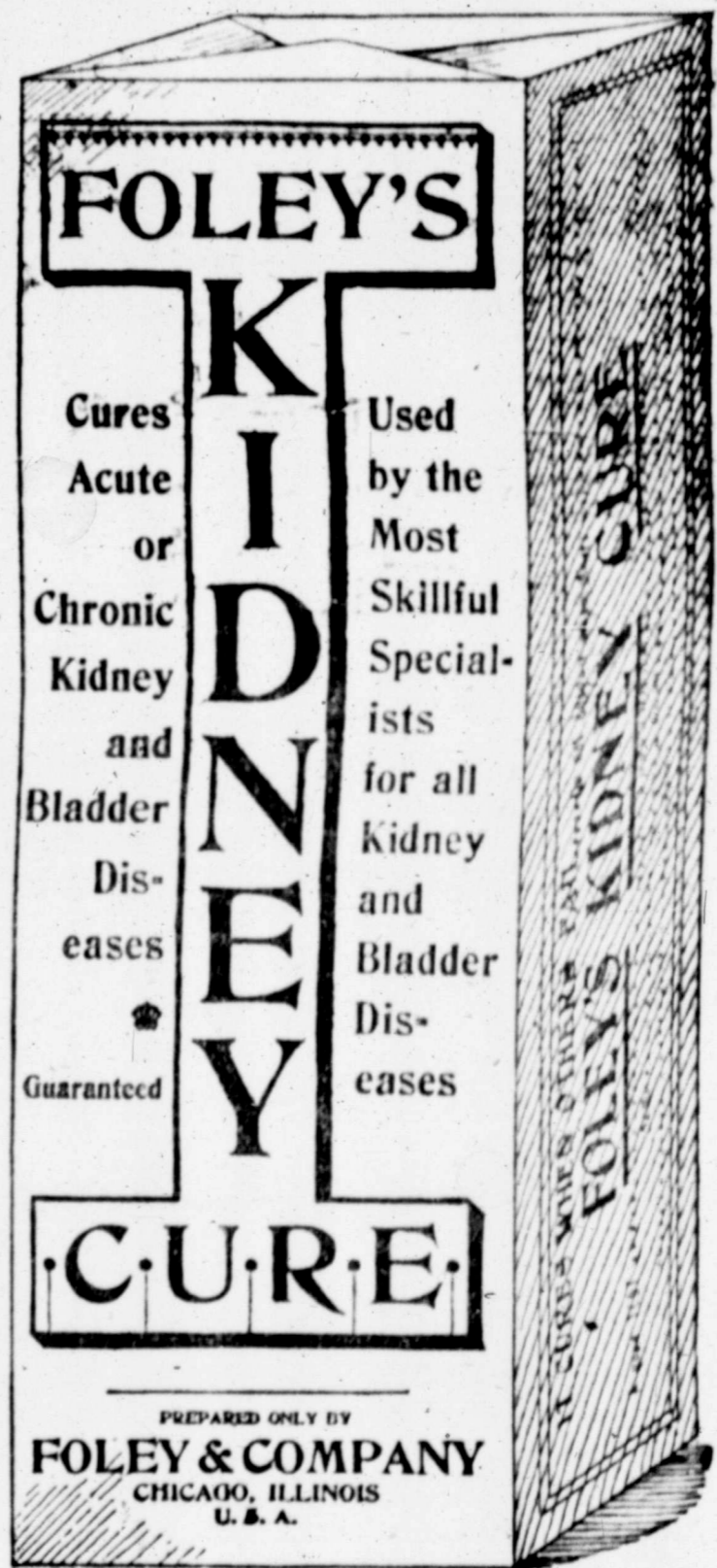

DON'T whine.

TAKE your medicine.

If you can't laugh, giggle.

CLOSE up and keep closed.

DON'T die hard; take it easy.

If you don't like it, just lump it.

THERE'S is nothing like it; is there?

THIS is no time for pouting. Just laugh.

THE 14th at midnight is the accepted hour.

EVERYBODY get in a good humor with everybody else.

KEEP a stiff upper lip and don't back-bite your neighbor.

WEDNESDAY the saloons must go. And may disorder go with them.

SOME people kick because it is their nature to do so. But let 'em kick.

If prohibition don't prohibit why do so many whiskey soakers object to it?

THE way to do is to take things as they come. It don't strain your nerves so much to do so.

THAT "the truth is mighty and will prevail" is one of the main reasons why that injunction fell so far short of "enjoining."

If Judge Hamblen's injunctions would but "enjoin" he might be what you'd politely call an "enjoiner." But they don't, 'cause they wont.

If it be true as we hear that The Sentinel under its present management has pleased some people and offended others, we are truly glad of it. Life is scarcely worth living without an enemy or two.

RATHER THAN ANNIHILATED LET THE LAW BE PERFECTED.

In 1875 the people of Texas adopted a new constitution. That constitution gave the people of any county, precinct or other political subdivision of the county the right to prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors within the limits of the given territory, and made it the duty of the Legislature to enact laws to put that provision of the constitution into effect. This constitution has been several times amended and many unsuccessful attempts have been made to amend it. The Local Option clause remains just the same that it was when the constitution was adopted. No attempt has been made to repeal, modify or amend it. Political parties have come and political parties have gone, each one with platforms full of suggestive remedies and cure-all promises. But never has any political party promulgated a declaration favorable to overthrowing the Local Option provision of our State constitution. The Legislature has from time to time in pursuance of that constitutional provision amended the law on that subject to the end that its enforcement would be more practicable. And not till the last Legislature did anyone so much as attempt to annihilate the provision of the constitution here referred to. Heretofore those who have opposed prohibition have been content to do their work in the direction of distorting the minds of the people by such specious pleas as that it is against the personal liberty of the citizen and such flimsy argument as that is does not prohibit and the fallacious clap-trap that it kills towns and communities in which it is adopted. Now, however, that these things are failing to work and the monstrousness of the saloon has struck deep in on the hearts of the public and the saloons are being voted out of most of the counties of the State the enemies of prohibition are preparing another and other schemes which no doubt are aimed at the efficiency and possibly the life of the prohibition law. They dare not attempt the repeal of the constitutional provision to which we refer, for to do that an appeal would have to be made to

the people at the ballot box and this they fear to do. But by intrigue and back-alley scheming they mean mischief to the law.

There are thirty-one members of the Texas Senate, all of whom were elected after the last apportionment, and under the constitution it was proper for them to draw for long and short terms, sixteen of them drawing long and fifteen drawing short terms. The drawing in the last Legislature was to say the least questionable and it has been hinted that the whiskey Senators got the best of the trick, as the whiskey people usual do when there is a trick. Be that as it may the Senator (Willacy) who tried so desperately during the last Legislature to emasculate the prohibition law and indirectly put the knife under the fifth rib of the provision of our State constitution on which the law is founded, is still a Senator, he having drawn a long term, and was only the other day at Dallas in conference with several more or less prominent whiskeycrats from different portions of the State. Hence we say their hope is they may do something in the way of legislating prohibition to death in Texas. The people are against the saloons and in about seven out of ten trials during the past year have voted to banish them. Now it clearly behooves all those who want the benefits of prohibition to continue alive to the situation. None but sober, true, loyal men should be sent to either branch of the next Legislature. None but men who can be depended upon to preserve the life of this law and if need be render it more efficient, should be elected to the Senate and to the House. Our Senator has already been elected (he drew a long term) and we believe he is all right on this all important matter, but it would not be amiss for the counties of his district to let him know how they stand on the question. Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty, and if our prohibition friends want prohibition they cannot afford to sit supinely by and allow the prohibition law stabbed in the back to its death. The whiskey people are plotting, scheming, contriving. Let us beat them by an open, honest contest on our part. We don't have to plot and scheme. Truth and justice are on our side. All we need do is to keep alive to the true situation, and strike when the iron is hot. They are heating the iron and when hot let us do the welding. With a few judicious changes our prohibition law will be practically perfect. Instead of allowing them to send men to the legislature to annihilate the law we should send men there to strengthen and perfect it.

THE Tyler Democrat-Reporter thinks "the legislature should establish an injunction court, with Judge Hamblen, of Houston, as Chief Justice." Being that none of the Judges injunctions have been made to work we second the motion. Judge Hamblen should be known as the Judge whose injunctions don't "enjoin."

SMALL FAVORS THANKFULLY RECEIVED.

The thing is up with the antis. No doubt about that. "Injunction dissolved," or "injunction perpetuated," the whiskey people are beaten, mercilessly so, at their own game and at their every turn. Their injunction enjoins nothing and enjoins nobody. It has been as ineffectual in the accomplishment of the purpose for which it was obtained as the squeak of the hawk would have been. It was from the very first as futile, as impotent, as powerless a scheme of judicial free-booting as was ever sought to be put in motion. In the effort of its authors to stay the day of prohibitive effectiveness it was as harmless as the soft tread of the cat. Candidly, it has not been worth the small piece of white paper it was written on. It did not even create a sufficient amount of confusion to reap a scant meed of commendation. It literally died a bornin'. It has slept the sleep of the dead since its first awakening. In fact its awakening was its death-knell. The fourth and last publication of the County Judge's proclamation was made by publishers who were never enjoined and against whom no injunction was ever issued. This completed the publication of that notice and put prohibition on its feet and made it ready to go into effect in and throughout Nacogdoches county at the appointed hour. No man versed in the

law will for one moment question the regularity and legality of this procedure. Hours before the writ of injunction was served upon the County Judge that official had in the regular and legal way entered of record the fact that his proclamation of the result of the election had been four times in as many consecutive weeks published in the Weekly Sentinel. And this was the straw that broke the anti heart; yes, 'twas the last spike in the coffin of the saloon. As to the regularity and legality and morality of all these proceedings there is and can be no doubt. They were unusual, unprecedented, unheard of, we admit, but in the eyes of the law they were regular, they were proper, they were timely, they were legal—perfectly so. Really, if our much esteemed Anti friends think they know of anything they can do better (or better do) than enjoining Nacogdoches county prohibition they ought now immediately get at it for at this enjoining business they are about the most signal and dismal failure that even the "foreign injunction habit" has tacked on-to-to-date. The only perceptible effect so far wrought by the injunction in question has been the enthusiasm of hearts, the strengthening of sentiment, the increasing of votes for prohibition. This it has most assuredly done. In this connection we cannot think it out of place to say that—"Small favors are thankfully received."

THE Houston Post kept our injunction situation before the public in first class style. Its Nacogdoches correspondent Capt. Jack Doughtie is a sure enough hustler. The enterprise of the Post is duly appreciated by all our people.

THE "foreign injunction habit," as we hear it called, is going to go. The people of Texas are not going to tolerate any system of government that makes it possible for one lone sole solitary creature to overthrow the will of the majority—and even the two-thirds majority. Not if they know it, and we think they are on to the job, good enough.

District Attorney Imboden, of Nacogdoches, is a man of nerve to say the least, and it is believed he will stay with his avowed purpose not to prosecute the violator of the injunction issued by Judge Hamblen of Houston against the proprietor of The Sentinel in the Nacogdoches prohibition cases, injoining the Sentinel from making the final publication of the order of the court.—Kountze News.

No danger whatever that anybody will be punished for defeating that blasted injunction. That thing was not violated it was simply defeated by means entirely legal. Don't be uneasy about anybody being punished because of it. The truth is the prohibitionists have kept the law on their side at every step. At no time and in no way have they violated it

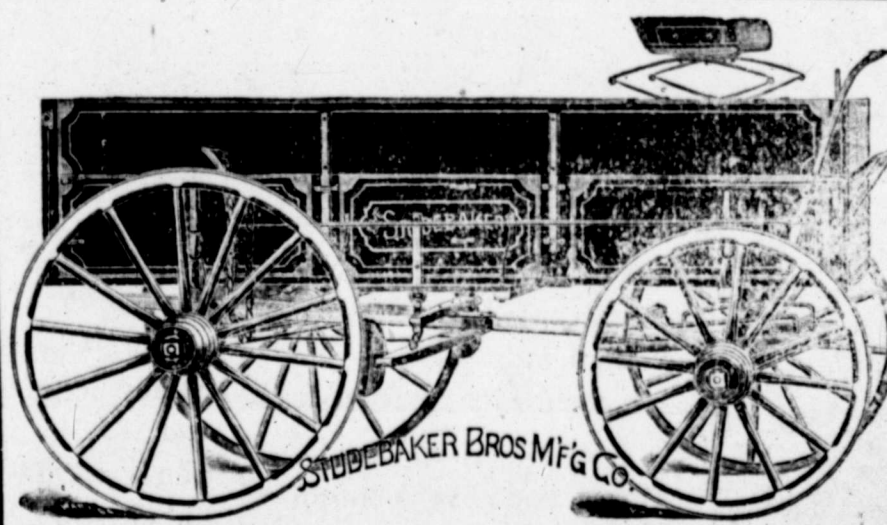

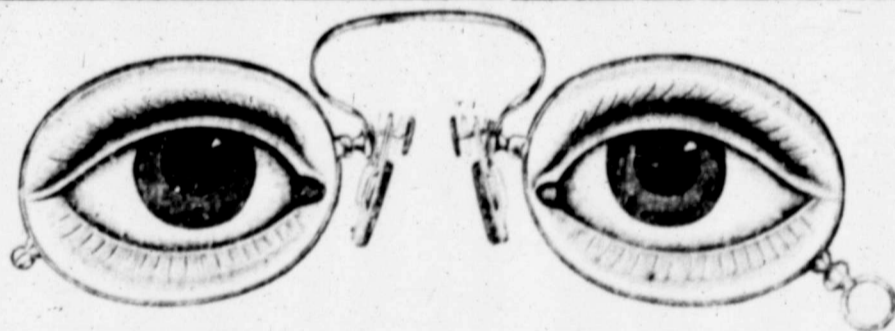
Died.

Glasses Properly Fitted.



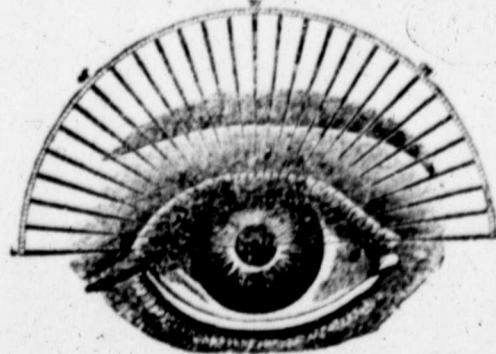
