### KILLING IN SAN AUGUSTINE.

Principals in Affair From Nacogdoches County.  
From Saturday's Daily:

The report came this morning by telephone that Taylor Brantley had killed Jim Still at Zack Mast's mill over in San Augustine county. The killing took place late yesterday afternoon. Particulars have not been obtained, and the immediate cause of the killing is not known, although it is understood that the two men had not been on friendly terms for some time past.

The mill at which this unfortunate affair took place is the property of the father-in-law of Brantley, Mr. Zack Mast, and Brantley was at work at the mill. Still went to the mill and was killed, as stated, but as to how and under what circumstances it has not yet been learned here.

### Memorial.

Whereas, it has pleased God in His infinite wisdom to remove from our midst our beloved Brother and Pastor, Elder G. W. Layton.

He was born in Nacogdoches county, Texas, August 14th, 1863, and died at his home near Shady Grove, surrounded by his grief stricken family and friends, November 23th, 1903. He was married to Miss Gealey Morton May the 18th 1884. Of this union there were born eight children, seven girls and one boy, all of whom survive him. He was converted to the Christian religion at the age of 16 and was ordained to the Ministry January 3rd, 1897. He served Shady Grove church as Pastor four years and was called for the fifth year. Brother Layton was a model Christian and a noble citizen, a faithful preacher, a kind husband, and affectionate father. He enjoyed the Christian religion and had no fears of death. His work on the mission was crowned with success. He baptized 97 during this Associational year and others were waiting. His gentle manner, kind words and pleasant smiles were a true ideal to his heart, and won the confidence of all that knew him.

Therefore be it Resolved, by Shady Grove church, That by his death the church suffers the loss of an esteemed member and Pastor. It saddens our hearts to know that we will see his face no more on earth but again we hope to greet him where no farewell words are spoken.

Resolved further, That we, by tender sympathy and loving kindness, help to bear the burden of grief from the hearts of the surviving wife and children, remembering that father has only gone home a little before, that soon we will find him watching and waiting for us to welcome us to that beautiful home where parting is no more.

doctors Harrison and Smith are entitled to our heartfelt thanks for medical aid and close attention. Doctor Harrison giving so much of his time as a nurse and all of it free.

Resolved further, in conference that a copy of this memorial be spread on the church book and a copy be furnished the family.

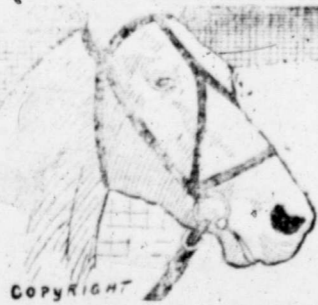

MUGWUMP Low has been laid quite low in New York.

If Mark Hanna gets a presidential bee in his bonnet Teddy had better look out.

THE oil field in Southeast Texas is constantly widening out. Batson Prairie is the latest addition, where a gusher has just been brought in.

It's a "dirty Irish trick" in the Timpson Times to be quoting The Sentinel and giving credit to the Plaindealer. But still that is not as bad as it had been vice versa.

HOUSTON is preparing to give King Nottoc a gorgeous reception on the 23rd to 28th instant. The No-Tsu-Oh Carnival is to be better than ever.

THE Huntington and Lufkin papers are tossing handsome bouquets at each other. But alas—if things take their usual course, what will it be six months hence?

GORMAN'S victory in Maryland pairs with that of Hanna in Ohio. These two political Goliaths may be leading their respective parties in the presidential campaign next year.

THERE are several hundred claimants for the \$50,000 offered by the State for a boll weevil exterminator. They are all infallible, provided you catch the weevil and hold him until you kill him.

THREE men were killed in an election row at Fairview, in Scott county, Va. The trouble was between republicans, who fell out over the question of who should be their presiding officer of the election.

THE negroes of Harris county are paying their poll tax better than the whites, according to reports, and if the present ratio is kept up the colored voter will be in the ascendancy at the next election in that county.

KING NOTTOC V is to be in Houston the 23rd to 28th of this month. The usual festivities will be carried out during his visit and there will be a great time for those who visit Houston during Carnival week.

THE oil strike at Batson Prairie has added a new impetus to the projected electric railway from Houston through Liberty to Sour Lake. It is probable that the new line will be pushed to completion and put in operation without delay.

IT is estimated that the cotton consumption of the ensuing year will require nearly 11,000,000 bales. The crop of this season is estimated at less than 10,000,000 bales, leaving a shortage of about a million bales. The publication of these estimates from an authoritative source has caused the price to spring up a little during the past few days.

### THIS IS THE IDEA.

Fanpin wants a clearcut good roads platform from her legislative aspirants, and the boys who want to go to Austin had better prepare that plank and make it strong.—Bonham Democrat.

Don't limit yourselves to the simple demand for good roads. Put it in the platform that the people demand good roads, and that they shall be built in this or that way. Demand that the convicts of the State shall be taken out of competition with free labor on farms and in workshops and placed on the roads. Put it in the platform that, if there is a deficit by reason of this change of policy, the people are prepared to meet it. Put it in the platform that the State shall not manufacture or farm as long as such manufacturing or farming comes in competition with any class of free labor. Put it in the platform that the life-term convicts shall be put in the iron-making business, which will not compete with honest labor in Texas. Elect your man on it, and then see that he sticks to the platform. You will have good roads then. Dallas County has been working convicts for years, and has hundreds of miles of good roads as a result.—Galveston News.

THE Sentinel office has just received two handsome new Chandler & Price job presses. There are now four job presses running in the job room, and the Sentinel is ready for anybody's work. The snake editor who greatly facilitated the work of getting the new presses in, by not trying to help has named them Dan Patch and Major Delmar, as he says they are record breakers for speed, are fine stock, and have to be fed. The press men are very proud of their new pets.

THE railroad commission has received complaints from North Texas that the separate coach law is being violated and that negroes are permitted to ride in the coaches with white people. The separate coach law is one of the best laws ever enacted by the Texas legislature and it should be rigidly enforced. When negroes and whites used to occupy the same coaches it was a common thing for rows to occur, especially on excursions, between the rough elements of black and white, but such a thing seldom occurs now, and ladies are never disturbed by impudent negroes.

SEVERAL killings have occurred among the negroes around Shreveport the past few days. Last Sunday morning one negro killed three other negroes with an axe, "just for fun" he said. In the afternoon he was swung into eternity by a mob of his own color. Not a great way from the scene of the triple killing and subsequent lynching, another negro was killed, and in the same neighborhood a negro woman was shot, all by negro toughs. The cotton picking season is bringing in unsavory characters from every where, and craps, bad women and bad whiskey are stirring up the devil among them.

THE negroes of Houston have boycotted the street car company, and because they can't ride on the cars the negro washer women have refused to "strike" any more with their battling sticks until the boycott is ended.

THE Alexandria, La., Advertiser is strongly advocating Hon. Ino. H. Kirby for Vice President. If a business man is all that is wanted Kirby will fill the bill very nicely, and it wouldn't make any difference which ticket he runs on.

THE democratic nominee and Tammany's candidate, Geo. B. McClellan, was elected mayor of New York by nearly 65,000 majority. The entire Tammany ticket was elected in New York City, but the State elected a republican legislature.

THE government inspector, under specific orders from Washington, is making a "strenuous" investigation of the affairs of the New York postoffice. The work will go on for a week or two, it is announced, and the probing is to be deep and merciless.

UP to date there have been over two thousand five hundred patterns more cotton bagging sold in Nacogdoches than were sold last year. This would indicate that there has not been a falling off of the cotton crop in this section. There was a large demand for bagging yesterday and all the merchants were out, having already sold more than they had contemplated.

ROOSEVELT thinks the result in Ohio "means triumphant vindication of Senator Hanna as the proper man for chairman of the republican national executive committee." He may think more than that but he doesn't think it out loud. The Hanna republicans think it a "jolt for Teddy."

MR. BRYAN is receiving an undue amount of harsh criticism on account of his connection with the Bennet will case. We believe him innocent of any improper motives, but it is an unfortunate thing that he wrote the will himself, since he was to be the chief beneficiary.

BRO. VEATCH has had such gratifying success with his first book of poems and sketches that he has decided to publish another, which is now in press. He is now editing the Warwickian at Warwick, Lincoln county, O. T., where he asks all to address him who would like to have his new book.

TOM JOHNSON received a "solar plexus" as a presidential possibility in the Ohio election. He was overwhelmingly defeated by the republican candidate for governor. Senator Hanna's victory is complete in that Ohio elected a republican legislature that will reelect him by a majority of 53 votes on joint ballot. He had only one majority six years ago, and as he was the issue in this campaign it is considered more as a Hanna victory than anything else.

LUFKIN is going to make a bid for the Knights of Pythias widows and orphan's home. We admire Lufkins pluck, but her efforts will be fruitless. If there was a ghost of a show for East Texas, Nacogdoches would have already been in the field as a candidate. There is no town in East Texas that can talk about covering the offers already received from either Brenham or Weatherford.

THERE is a good deal of talk about Hogg and Bailey these days. For our part we would rejoice to see them lock horns, and we have no doubt in the world about Hogg's wiping up the face of the earth with Baily when ever the "scrap" comes off. There never was a more grievous mistake made than when Texas chose Joe Bailey over Horace Chilton for the U. S. Senate, and everybody will confess it sooner or later.

HON. W. M. LACEY, of Palestine, has just received a fine suit of clothes as a token of gratitude from a man whom he treated kindly while an officer of the Rusk penitentiary. The man is a Hebrew and was serving a term for alleged forgery. Mr. Lacy was convinced the man was innocent of the crime and helped to secure his release. The convict, being a tailor, he writes Mr. Lacy that he is prospering and asked him to accept the suit of clothes. The moral to this is that no one can lose anything for an act of kindness.

It seems about as hard for the men who are trying to get the reward offered for the conviction of the assassin or assassins of Governor Goebel as it is to secure the reward offered in Texas for some means of ridding the State of the boll weevil. In the first case, it would seem that the prosecution suspects too many people to properly concentrate its efforts to convict one while in the other case so many remedies are offered that the authorities cannot select from them.—Galveston News.

COTTON closed at 11 cents in New York Saturday.

TOBACCO DOCHES is bound to be the metropolis of East Texas.

COTTON has been selling at 10 3/4 cents a pound in Nacogdoches this week. The boll weevil has kept the crop down a little, but he has also helped the price to go up.

NACOGDOCHES will receive as much cotton by wagon this season as she did last. The compress receipt will be cut off a little, but that has nothing to do with local trade.

The first session of the 58th Congress of the United States is now in session at Washington. Hon. Joseph G. Cannon, of Illinois, was formally elected and inducted into the office of speaker.

We are not a farmer, but we are the son of a farmer and feel like we have the right to remit the farmers a few hundred more times that it is imperative for them to do something to head off the pesky boll weevil. Do it now.

SAN AUGUSTINE has fallen into the prohibition column by an overwhelming majority, almost, or quite equal to that given by Nacogdoches. Long distance injunctions are helping the pros to roll up big majorities.

The remains of the late Col. Thomas P. Ochiltree have been removed from the temporary resting place in the New York City cemetery, to the Confederate Veterans buying ground, Mount Hope. The burial at Mount Hope took place yesterday, the religious ceremonies being observed by the Paulist Fathers.

We are delighted to see towns "killed" like prohibition is "killing" Nacogdoches. There has scarcely been a day during the past week that one could drive through the streets and public square without carefully winding their way through an account of it being so thickly crowded with farm wagons. The old town is doing an increased business at the old stand.

ANOTHER petition for a school bond election in Nacogdoches independent district is being circulated. Every body ought to sign it and every voter in the district ought to vote for it. We can't have the kind of schools the present and growing population of Nacogdoches demands without adequate school buildings, and there is no way for us to have the buildings without voting a tax for that purpose. If there are a lot of "knockers" who can't stand the tax, let them move out. Every time a tax is voted for public improvement local property is enhanced in value and a tax of this kind can be no burden to even the biggest tax payer in the district. In fact, all the biggest tax payers are for it.



**WAREHOUSE BURNED.**

Building and Entire Contents Destroyed.  
From Thursday's Daily:

The big brick warehouse of P. M. Sanders, situated opposite the Banita Hotel on Pillar street, was burned this morning with its entire contents. The origin of the fire is not known, but the building was evidently set on fire, either intentionally or by accident, as no one was known to have entered it at any time after noon yesterday. There was stored in the building a small amount of liquor left from the bankrupt stock of Hardy Dial and there is a theory that some thief might have gone in after the liquor and accidentally set the house on fire.

In addition to the building, Mr. Sanders lost five bales of cotton, 200 bushels of corn, three or four tons of hay, 50 barrels of lime and a lot of cotton tags etc. His is a total loss, as he had no insurance.

H. T. Burk lost a car of furniture.

J. H. Thomas had one car of oats stored in the building, which was a total loss.

W. W. Perry lost several hundred dollars worth of gin and mill machinery, insured.

Slay Bros., T. J. Smith, and Dick Coats each lost a complete bar and fixtures, which had been stored there after they closed their saloons.

Henry Spradley lost two bales of cotton, and there were five other bales burned that had been levied upon by different parties and placed there pending litigation.

The building was too far gone when the fire was first discovered for it to be possible to save it or any of its contents and it was allowed to burn without any effort to check the fire, save to keep it from spreading to other buildings. There was very little wind and there being no buildings very near it, no other damage was done. The greatest danger was to the bridge immediately in front of the warehouse, but a close watch was kept with plenty of water at hand, and the bridge escaped without damage.

**The Railroad is at Center.**

The question, "when will the train run into Center," was answered Monday evening at a little before 6 o'clock when the steel crew and work train completed the G. B. & G. N. road into town.

The event marked an epoch in the history of Center that has long been looked for. About five or six hundred people, including the Center High School were present and watched the crew lay the last half mile of steel.
