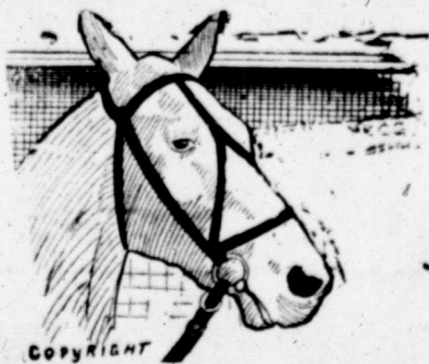

County Teachers Institute.

Pursuant to a call issued by County Superintendent Berger, eleven teachers assembled at the High School building in Nacogdoches at ten o'clock Saturday morning, Nov. 20th, and went into temporary organization with Prof. I. J. Hargis in the chair.

Several of those whose names were on the program were absent, which is perhaps attributable to the fact that the meeting had not been well advertised. However, some very lively, interesting and profitable discussions were had on the subjects, County Supervision, Attendance, and Drawing and Penmanship in the Public School.

After a brief discussion it was decided to go into permanent organization by enrolling a membership and electing officers for the ensuing year. The Secretary was instructed to enroll those present as members, and by unanimous vote the following officers were elected:

This meeting was full of spirit and enthusiasm. The interest manifested by those few teachers and the fact that a permanent organization was effected, suggests that some other and better institutes will be held during the present school year.

BIG TOBACCO DEAL.

Transfer of 20,000 Acres for \$125,873 Has Been Recorded.

A Post reporter learned yesterday from an authentic source that during the past few days a deal entailing the transfer of 20,000 acres of tobacco lands in Nacogdoches county has been consummated at Kansas City. A land firm in the city mentioned succeeded in closing with a company of Northern capitalists who are interested in Texas tobacco prospects and who have announced their determination to undertake the culture of the weed in East Texas field immediately.

The land is located on the line of the Houston East and West Texas in Nacogdoches county, north of the city of Nacogdoches. The 20,000 acres brought the neat sum of \$124,873. The transfer is recorded on page 591 book 51 of the records of Nacogdoches county.

Much of the 20,000 acres is in timber and the privilege for clearing the same has been let to W. J. Whitman of Gilman, who will erect a big saw mill on the land at once. The cleared land will be planted in tobacco at the opening of the coming season.—Houston Post.

TOBACCO GROWING IN EAST TEXAS.

BY PROF. A. H. PRINCE.

The growing and manufacturing of Cuban tobacco bids fair to become an important and profitable industry in East Texas. Experiments have demonstrated that the proper soils is found in certain places and that the climatic conditions are favorable.

Filler tobacco can be grown at a cost of eight or ten cents per pound, and in the raw state at which the farmer sells it, he will receive about fifteen cents per pound. Between 600 and 800 pounds per acre can be grown. If the farmer, growing a small crop does most of the work himself, the profits are, of course, greater.

The seed are planted in the beds in January, and the plants are transplanted to the open fields in March and April. Seventy-five days are required for the crop to grow, and cutting begins in June and July. From four to six weeks are required to cure the leaf, and the crop is ready for market in August and September. After cutting the tobacco, other crops can be planted, offering an opportunity for diversification.

The farmer who expects to plant even a small crop should have his land very carefully selected, and should secure the proper variety of seed from responsible men. Cuban seed imported from the island should be used in preference to any grown in the United States.

The fact that the skill and judgment are essential to the successful growing of tobacco makes the crop a profitable one. Anybody can grow cotton and corn, which two crops will stand a certain amount of neglect, but tobacco must have proper attention at the proper time. If worms are allowed to feed on the leaves a day or two too long, the injury is great; and if the leaf is allowed to remain in the field even a short time after it becomes ripe, its quality is injured. Therefore it is necessary, before attempting to grow a crop of tobacco, to secure detailed and reliable instructions. But as this can be easily done there is no reason why any farmer possessing the proper soil cannot make a few acres of tobacco profitable. Higher prices than those quoted above are obtained for filler tobacco, but the farmer will make the most profit by selling at this stage and avoiding the heavy expenses of handling the leaf after it comes from the shed.

In this brief article no reference is made to higher priced wrapper tobacco which can also be grown profitably. It requires more skill and expense than filler. —Jacksonville Truck Journal.

Some of the leading American publications are talking about forcibly annexing Canada to the United States. We should think the United States had had her fill of "forcible annexation" of late years.

The treaty has been signed providing for the construction of the Panama canal by the United States. Uncle Sam feels a little conscience stricken over the matter, and will

urge Panama to divide with Colombia ten million dollars paid for the canal route. The United States now has full control of a strip twenty miles wide across the Isthmus of Panama.

A new leaflet has been published by Messrs. L. A. Sheller and A. H. Prince upon the tobacco plant, discussing it from the seed to the cigar. It is interesting and instructive and will be of use to every farmer who will read it, and who can procure a copy.

The Mutual Life Insurance Company, of New York, is endeavoring to cancel two life insurance policies aggregating a quarter of a million dollars, carried by James L. Blair, of St. Louis, because Blair attempted to commit suicide recently. The case is in the U. S. court.

Everything may not have been just as we would all like during the past year, but we all have a great deal to be thankful for next Thursday. Let us be especially thankful that it is as well with us as it is, and that we have not fared worse. East Texas has been especially blessed by Providence.

The Cushing Enterprise will make its appearance at Cushing in a few days. The Timpson Star has been moved to Cushing and will be converted into The Enterprise under the same management. G. W. Carter, former editor of the Star, will edit The Enterprise.

The democrats don't like the administration's Panama policy, but they realize the importance of digging the Isthmian Canal and will not interfere. They do not feel that they would be justifiable in throwing obstacles in the way of the canal because of the mistakes of the administration.

The anti prohibitionists of Houston executed their threats by carrying the city against Pickney the democratic nominee, for congress. The chances are that they will be sorry for it. It is unfortunate that the prohibition question was drawn into this election and it is more unfortunate that it will be dragged into future elections.

The deficit in the State treasury has reached the enormous sum of \$400,000 and is still climbing up. There is nothing serious about this, however. It is only the falling off of revenue heretofore collected from liquor dealers and the refunding of license. The tax rate will be raised in time and the pros will cheerfully help the whiskey drinkers bear this heavy burden.

The federal grand jury at Omaha, Nebraska, has indicted U. S. Senator Dietrich, of that State for alleged acceptance of money for his influence in securing the appointment of Jacob Fisher as postmaster at Omaha. Senator Dietrich is indignant over the matter and will leave his seat in the United States Senate to go at once to Omaha and demand a trial.

TEXAS AND ITS INCOME.

Austin Statesman:

Mr. Paul Waples of Fort Worth, one of the most progressive men in Texas, secured recognition and took the floor a few days ago to defend Texas from the aspersions of poverty cast by a "down easter," who perhaps never saw the state and matured his judgment from exparte testimony.

Mr. Waples did not quote scripture nor preach a sermon, but took mathematics for his cudgel and fired a shower of figures at him for a reply and which it will take a long time to answer.

The estimated income of the state for 1903 as he gave it as follows:

Cotton, bales, 2,500,000; value, \$125,000,000.

Corn, bushels, 125,000,000; value, \$50,000,000.

Wheat, bushels, 25,000,000 value, \$25,000,000; value, \$20,000,000.

Oats, bushels, 25,000,000; value, \$10,000,000.

Rice, bags, 4,000,000, value, \$15,000,000.

Total \$220,000,000.

Mr. Waples started right, but stopped too quickly. To the foregoing he should have added a few more items in the state's income. For instance.

Cattle, head, 4,000,000; value, \$48,000,000.

Horses, head, 200,000; value, \$6,000,000.

Mules, head, 200,000; value, \$8,000,000.

Lumber, feet 2,000,000,000; value, \$40,000,000.

Truck, fruit and vegetables, \$5,000,000.

Petroleum, estimated value of output, \$10,000,000.

Minerals, gold, silver, coal and quicksilver, \$5,000,000.

Poultry, eggs and dairy products, \$2,000,000.

Native and cultivated hay, including alfalfa, \$5,000,000.

Brick, lime, cement and stone, \$10,000,000.

Miscellaneous items impossible to enumerate, \$10,000,000.

Grand total value of Texas' products for 1903, \$367,000,000.

The statement is repeated that Mr. Waples made a good start, but stopped while running a warm trail.

As a general proposition, Texas is a wealth producer, the boll weevil notwithstanding.

People in the distance who own property in this vicinity would find it economy to subscribe for a local paper. We receive several hundred letters a year from this class asking questions concerning the progress and development of this section. These letters are usually answered by mailing the enquirers copies of the paper. It would be much better for them to have every issue of the paper, thus keeping right up with the procession.

The commissioners court of Shelby county has created the office of county school superintendent and fixed the salary at \$1,200 a year. This only adds \$600 more to the expense of superintendent, the county judge being heretofore ex-officio superintendent, drawing

six hundred dollars for services which he probably could not or did not render, and it is probable that the action of the court will prove economy in the long run. However that may prove, the papers of Shelby county are indulging in a good deal of harsh criticism and charging the court with acting unwisely. Prof. A. E. Day has been appointed to the new office, and it will not take long to prove by a practical demonstration whether the move is a wise one or not. In the interest of the schools we believe it is wisdom, though we admit that it is none of our kettle of fish.

This weather will put an end to the yellow fever epidemic and drive the yellow fever mosquito into winter quarters.

Hanna's refusal to discuss the possibility of his accepting the presidential nomination is nailing Teddy with doubt and has a tendency to put him in cussing mood. There is an air of mystery in the maneuvers of the big "ring master," which the president cannot solve to his own peace and comfort.

The Austin Statesman is charging the republicans with "Gross purposes" in the plan of removing Senator Morgan from the committee on oceanic canals and putting Senator Hanna in his place. "Gross purposes" is nothing to charge the republicans with. They have been guilty of gross deeds and gross blunders by the gross, and the President has grossly ignored all efforts to check him in committing all manner of gross outrages upon this republican Government. The present administration is a gross affair.

The decision of the saloon men to abandon their injunction will be hailed with pleasure by "pros" and "antis" alike. The fight for supremacy between the factions was fierce, and bitter feelings were aroused which will require time to remove. The abandoning of the case is the first step to the end, and the tacit agreement on the part of the prohibitionists to defer until February 15 the putting into effect of local option is another. Let us all try to heal the old sores and to bring the entire people together in the effort to make our town one of the best, one of the most prosperous in the state. —Lufkin Herald.

The boll weevil has hit Houston, Henderson, Cherokee, and some other counties west and south of Nacogdoches this year just about like he will hit us next year, if something is not done. The weevil took so much toll in the counties named that he didn't leave much for the merchant and business is fearfully dull. Every instance, however, that has been reported, where early planting of early maturing cotton was practiced the disaster has been averted. It is conceded everywhere that this is the only solution to the boll weevil problem. The farmer who plants King's Earliest, plants as early as possible, pushes it to maturity as rapidly as possible, stands a show to get some cotton, while those who plant native seed and follow the beaten paths will stand no show at all.

AN INFERNAL OUTRAGE.

What Charley Edwards Calls the Panama Deal.

Washington, Nov. 16.—To the intense delight of the democratic leaders here, the republican administration has actually tied up in a nice package and handed to the democracy another and a corking good campaign issue in this dirty mess in Panama country. It is the belief here not only among democrats, but among many good republicans, that the recent revolution in the United States of Colombia in Central America, was hatched in this country and at the investigation of this republican administration in order to get control of Panama canal. In other words, the game put up in the Senate to get the usufruct out of those Panama canal bonds has got to go through at any cost. This republican administration plays into their hands and incites revolution down there and robs that little country of its territory in order to give the senatorial cabal its rakeoff. A BIG IRON FURNACE.

GOING TO NACOGDOCHES.

Chicago Capitalists En Route to Investigate Tobacco Raising.

New Orleans, La., Nov. 12.—T. J. Anderson, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific at Houston, reached here today from Chicago with a party of capitalists en route to Nacogdoches, to take up the tobacco raising enterprise. Mr. Taylor, of Taylor, Webb & Co., heads the party. On the strength of recent reports of Government experts that tobacco can be raised at Nacogdoches equaling the finest qualities of the Cuban plant the Chicagoans have decided to invest. Gilbert Shaw, retired president of the American Trust and Saving Bank of Chicago, will be at the head of a syndicate of some ten capitalists to take hold of the Nacogdoches proposition. Some of the land has already been purchased, and the process of purchasing still other tracts is about to be consummated.

TO GROW TOBACCO.

Seventy-five Thousand Acres of Land Will Be Purchased at Nacogdoches.

Houston Chronicle:
General Passenger Agent T. J. Anderson of the Southern Pacific returned this morning from Chicago and New Orleans, where he went a week ago to assist in closing up the deal for a possible 75,000 acres of fine tobacco land surrounding Nacogdoches.

Mr. Anderson carried with him to Chicago samples of Texas tobacco to lay before representatives of a Chicago syndicate who are looking toward Texas as a field for extensive investment and development along tobacco lines.

Taylor, Webb & Co. and Gilbert Shaw, former president of the American Savings and Trust Company bank, are main factors in this syndicate, which proposes to purchase a large area of land, and have already secured control of about 20,000 acres of land in the vicinity of Nacogdoches, but desire to secure about 75,000 acres. When Mr. Anderson reached Chicago he conferred with the above mentioned gentlemen and as a result four tobacco experts headed by Mr. Taylor himself are now at Nacogdoches. They will investigate the entire section which is adapted to tobacco cultivation of which Mr. Anderson says there is a strip about 75 miles long and 8 miles wide.

The syndicate proposes to invest \$3,000,000 in the erection of the best equipped warehouse over the lands secured, and will bring to Texas over 100 families of expert tobacco growers, together with a sufficient force of laborers, which will put the entire area under cultivation.

This is one of the largest tobacco cultivation schemes in the world, and Houston will be the market for the vast production of the territory to be thus cultivated.

Options are held on 20,000 acres of land around Nacogdoches, and it is proposed to acquire about 60,000 acres more, after which the cultivation will begin.

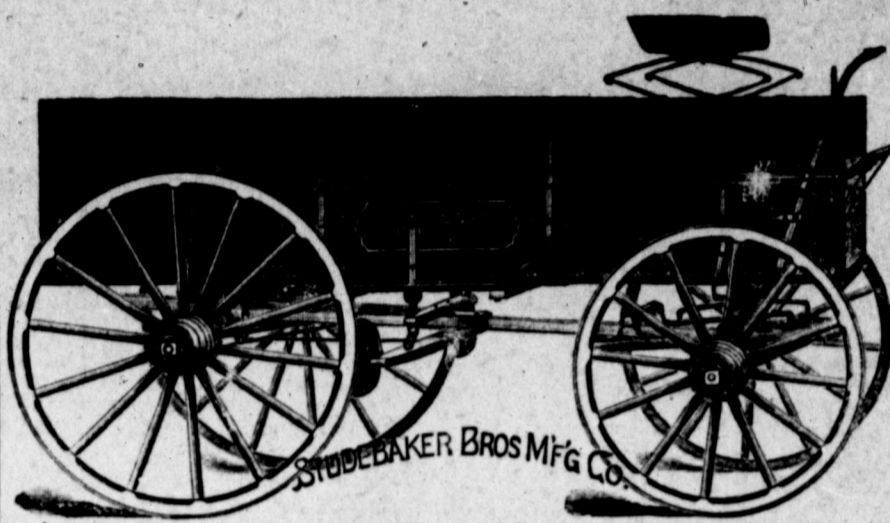
