## Third Week of the War.

While Russia has been making preparations for the real and rapid warfare she expects in the spring, when the troops now hastening across frozen Siberia on the railroad are to punish the enemy, Port Arthur has been attacked again by the Japanese. This time four stone laden steamers were sent into the harbor to be sunk, thus bottling up the Russian fleet. The Retzivan, disabled in the first battle, fired upon the Japanese vessels, and with the assistance of other ships and the forts, sank them. At Tokio it is asserted that the object of Togo sought had been gained in part. At St. Petersburg this is denied. The coup was undertaken Wednesday morning.

The next day another attack on Port Arthur was made by the Japanese under Admiral Togo and they are said to have been repulsed. One vessel is reported lost on each side. The first dispatches on the attack were to the effect that four Japanese battleships and two cruisers had been de-

stroyed, but this was disproved.

The important army movements this week are the reported landing of a Japanese force south of Vladivostok to march overland to Kirin, and the flight of Russians from Dalny.

Diplomatically there has been the very important development that Japan has made a treaty with Korea guaranteeing the independence and integrity of that empire after the close of the war, and assuming a protectorate over the country, in return for which the Koreans will fight for Japan.

Meantime Russia has addressed a protest to the nations because Japan's fleet attacked the Variag and Koriet in a neutral port (Chemulpo) after, it is said, having cut the wires and prevented news of the outbreak of hostilities from reaching the Russian commanders.—Galveston News.

A SURE enough boom is going to hit Nacogdoches this summer. You may look out for it.

At planting time farmers ought to bear in mind that short cotton crops make long prices.

THERE will be a hundred thousand dollars spent in improvements in Nacogdoches this year.

It is whispered that there will be something doing in the burnt district in Nacogdoches this summer.

THE Plaindealer's suggestion to build a cotton mill is timely. Yet it is not a new subject in Nacogdoches.

THE cotton crop didn't fall so far short of ten million bales last year. It is sure not to do it this year.

It is announced from Washington that work will actually begin on the Panama Canal in a very short while.

LOCAL politics are absorbing the Houston papers until they are scarcely fit to read outside of that city.

THERE is no way of getting around it. Nacogdoches county has got to raise eleven hundred dollars for the Texas Exhibition at St. Louis.

FORTUNE seems to have turned against the Japs the past few days. They have lost in two engagements with the Russian Bear and have lost heavily.

THE Hallettsville Herald is thirty-three years old and like good wine, only improves with age. The Herald is classed at the head of the weekly press of Texas.

HON. J. H. KIRBY, chairman of the republican executive committee of Angelina county has published a call for a meeting of the republicans of Angelina county at Lufkin on March 12th next.

THE immense deposits in the Nacogdoches banks cannot afford to be idle. It will be spent in improvements and local enterprises, if it does not find other profitable investments, which is not likely.

JOHN H. KIRBY brands the resort to the courts to effect settlement between factions within the Kirby Lumber Co. and the Houston Oil Co. as an insane proceeding, and says that the postponement of a permanent receiver for each of the companies means a speedy settlement and a complete adjustment of all differences.

NACOGDOCHES county was assessed eleven hundred dollars as her share in the expense of getting up the Texas exhibit at the St. Louis Exposition. Angelina and Shelby were assessed in the same manner and have paid up. Nacogdoches certainly can do as well as her neighbors. We must raise the money within the next ten days.

## BLANCHETTE'S DEMOCRACY.

Hon. Lee Blanchette, of Beaumont, candidate for the democratic nomination for Comptroller of the State of Texas, has addressed the following open letter to the editor of the Sulphur Springs Democrat in answer to a recent editorial which appeared in that paper. To those who are not already acquainted with Mr. Blanchette and who do not know of their own personal knowledge that his politics is strictly of the "sound corn" variety, this open letter from that gentleman will suffice as an introduction and put the public at rest as to his policy:

Beaumont, Tex. 28-04.  
To the Editor of the Hopkins County Democrat, Sulphur Springs, Texas.

My Dear Sir:—  
I find in the issue of your paper of Jan 29th, 1904, an article headed "An Open Letter or Inquiry," addressed to me requesting a frank answer to the following five pointed questions:

1. How old are you?  
2. Are you a democrat, and if a voter in 1896 and 1900 did you vote for the nominees of the Chicago and Kansas City democratic conventions, or did you bolt, sulk in your tent, or give secret or open aid to the republicans in those years?

3. How many brothers, sisters, sons, daughters, sons-in-law, uncles, cousins, and aunts have you in this state, and in case of your nomination and election how many of them do you expect to appoint to positions in your office for the next two or four years?

4. How much money and property are you possessed of, and if elected, will you pay your necessary campaign expenses out of your own pocket, or will you levy a "voluntary contribution" from each employe of your office to reimburse you for said money paid out, as has been done heretofore by one or more occupants of that office.

5. And after your first term, or during it, and should you be a candidate for re-election, do you propose to have a relay or detail of your employes to make distant electioneering pilgrimages into their home and other counties in Texas fixing your slate for another term and all at the expense of the state, office stationary, postage, railroad passes, etc.

And beg herewith to hand you my answers to same.

1.—I will be 36 years old on the 24th day of November, 1904.

2.—I am a democrat, was a voter in 1896 and 1900 and voted for the nominees of the democratic party of the Chicago and Kansas City democratic convention, also from constable to presidential electors; never scratched the democratic ticket in my life, but was always found present and voting for democracy.

3.—I have a large number of relatives within the degree mentioned by you in said paragraph, residing in the state of Texas and elsewhere. I have strong convictions for the observing of platform demands and will not appoint any of them to positions in the office to which I aspire, if elected.

4.—I am not a man of wealth but will pay my campaign expenses out of my own resources and will not levy a "voluntary contribution" of any kind upon any one in my

employ or permit it to be done.

5.—I will not.  
I believe that the foregoing answers your inquiries and I shall live up to them if successful in the race. I am,

THEODORE PRICE is making a desperate effort to convince the world that the cotton crop of 1903 is nearly a million bales in excess of the government report and that prices cannot be held up on account of short crop. If Price is correct farmers had better go slow on the increased acreage this year.

THERE is complaint that the State has made a mistake as well as a great failure in buying sugar farms and putting State convicts at farm labor. The convict problem will never be solved better than by putting convicts on the public roads and making macadamized thoroughfares. In this way the convict labor cannot be lost and the tax payers would get something for the expense of providing employment for convicts that are sent outside of the walls of the penitentiary to work.

WE have heard from Rusk county. Solid up there, too. The Rusk county News says: The Nacogdoches Sentinel is one of the brightest papers that comes to this office. We are delighted to know that Bro. Haltom is out for legislation. All in this office is for him. The proprietor thinks there will not be a vote against him in Rusk county. "It will be elected, this state will never lack for laws." The State isn't lacking for laws, now, friend Harris. Don't figure on us adding too many more to the Statutes, should we ever break in to the lawmaking body.

THE new schedule on the T. & N. O. Ry. goes in effect March 6th, with through trains and sleeping car service between Dallas and Beaumont. The new train will leave Dallas at 6 p. m. and arrive at Beaumont at 8:40, a. m. leaves Beaumont at 9:30 p. m. and arrives at Dallas at 12:10 noon. Both trains will pass through Nacogdoches after midnight, but it is believed that this service will not materially effect the present schedule and that it will simply be added to it. Indications are that day trains will run as local.

BRO. MILNER, of the Henderson Times, has called The Sentinel to account for placing him in an embarrassing position by crediting an article advocating him for Lieutenant Governor. The article referred to should have been credited to the Athens Review instead of the Henderson Times. We fully appreciate Bro. Milner's embarrassment, and hasten to make all amends possible, though we were utterly unconscious of the blunder until he called our attention to it. The Sentinel, however, reiterates that there is no better material in the State of Texas for Lieutenant Governor than Hon. R. T. Milner, editor of the Henderson Times.

### LEE BLANCHETTE.

Bro. Henning, of the Nacogdoches Plaindealer, seems to "have it in" for Lee Blanchette and it is because he does not know the man. Henning will do right about anything when he knows how. We wish he would go to Beaumont and call on Mr. Blanchette, go through his office, observe his methods of work and get acquainted with him, as we did and then we believe he would sing a different song.

The Plaindealer is in error in placing Mr. Blanchette in the category with the political grafters and soft snap gang. We learned from his neighbors and friends in Beaumont that he used to drive a milk wagon for \$20 per month, and that he was always on time with the milk, until he was promoted to a job in a lumber yard, where he received a dollar a day, working along side of a negro stacking lumber. We learned that Mr. Blanchette dug out what education he possesses mostly at night, by himself and we think that a man like that is entitled to some recognition at the hands of the common people.—especially when prosperity does not make him "stuck up."

AN article entitled "A Bottle House," from the Scientific American has been going the rounds of the press. It describes a house in Nevada built of bottles by a miner in the absence of any other building material and is an object of much interest. But it's not the only "Bottle House" that interests people in this section since prohibition went into effect. There are others; located in Kansas City, St. Louis, Chicago, Shreveport, Dallas, Athens and Lufkin.

THE Timpson Times is warning farmers against buying fake recipes for making fertilizers. It says: "Farmers are warned against the purchase of recipes for making fertilizers, particularly if they are claimed to be 'secret' or 'wonderful discoveries.'" Numbers of these recipes have been sold in different parts of the country at from \$2 to \$5 and more. As a rule, they are of no value. The Experiment Station, at College Station, will furnish free of charge correct formulas for the mixing of fertilizers for cotton, corn, potatoes or any other crop, to any farmer in the State. Do not purchase recipes, when correct formulas can be had for nothing, particularly when the recipes that you buy will proba-

bly cause waste of time and money in the preparation of mixtures which are of little value, and disappointment in the crop produced."

THE Sabine News says ducks are still numerous at Sabine Pass and in the marshes of that vicinity.

THE cotton crop of 1903 only fell short of that of 1902 about three hundred bales in spite of the capers of the boll weevil. If the new cotton culture idea is carried out this year the boll weevil will not ruin the country.

AMONG the published list of the liabilities of the Houston Oil Company, one of the concerns involved in the Kirby Lumber Company muddle, are two notes due Senator J. W. Bailey aggregating \$278,896.88.

ANOTHER crank was arrested for trying to gain entrance at the White House in Washington. He was from Illinois and wanted an interview with the president with the purpose in view of having people to change their names, so that a wood dealer should be named Wood, a carpenter should be named Carpenter, and so on. He had a loaded revolver and a box of cartridges, just as all cranks have.

THE Austin Journal, a paper published in the interest of organized labor at Austin, is making a strong defense of Gov. Lanham's policy and incidentally pouring hot shot into State Topics, Jeff McLemore's paper. The Journal thinks that McLemore is the chief mud-slinger in Texas. In speaking of Governor Lanham and the machine politics, the Journal says: "Governor Lanham may not be pleasing the machine politicians, but the mass of the people are eminently satisfied with his administration. The machine politician strenuously opposed his nomination.—Tyler Courier.

THE better attacks upon Gov. Lanham by State topics are unwarranted. McLemore is simply venting his spleen on a personal grudge.

Judge Jas. I. Perkins, of Rusk, is in the city today. He confirms the report that he will be a candidate for district judge and informed The Sentinel that he had formally announced his candidacy. He has the strong backing of the Cherokee county bar and the press of that county. Judge Perkins has a fine record as an able and impartial jurist in the eight year's service he rendered the district. It is believed that Judge Davis will not be a candidate for re-election with Judge Perkins and in all probability the race will be left between Judge Perkins and Hon. H. B. Short.

### Important Suit Decided.

Galveston, Tex., Feb. 20.—The case of the Merchants and Farmer's Oil Company vs. Lufkin National Bank, on appeal from the district court of Nacogdoches county, was affirmed by the court of civil appeals of the First district at Galveston last Thursday. The opinion in the case, however, was not filed until yesterday. It is of interest for two reasons: It is an unusual case and one growing out of the Wettermark bank failure at Nacogdoches some time ago. The Lufkin National bank brought suit against the Merchants and Farmer's Cotton Oil Company to recover \$5,000, evidenced by a promissory note purporting to have been executed in behalf of the oil company by its general manager and attested by the secretary under the corporate seal. It was shown on the trial that B. S. Wettermark, the treasurer of the oil company, had signed the name of the general manager, W. B. Pearson, to the note without his authority, and had secured the signature and seal of the secretary, concealing from the secretary that the signature of the manager was not genuine. Pearson's power to execute the note was shown. Wettermark sold this note to the Lufkin National Bank for value and appropriated the proceeds to his own use.

The bank bought the note without notice of the forgery. The oil company pleaded non est factum. Judgment in the court below was in favor of plaintiff. The court of civil appeals held that the act of secretary in attesting the note and affixing the seal of the company was a representation that the paper was a genuine act of the company and that as his act in thus attesting the note was within the apparent scope of his power as agent of the company, the latter was stopped to question the genuineness of the paper to the detriment of an innocent holder.

It is believed that this doctrine has not heretofore been distinctly announced in Texas. In the opinion delivered by Associate Justice Gill no Texas cases directly in point are cited.

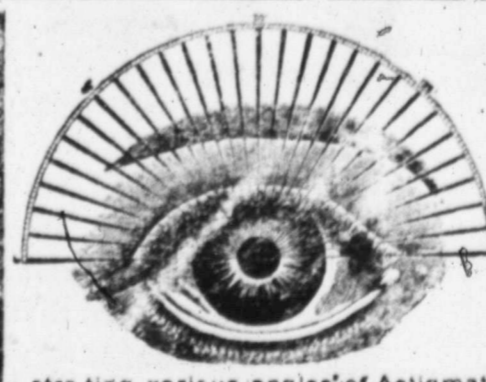
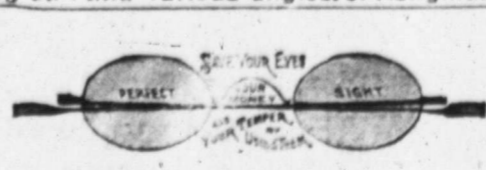


Illustration various angles of Astigmatism

BISHOP DURIER, of Natchitoches, La., is dead. He died Feb. 28th of paralysis, aged 72 years.

THIS is the week for raising the eleven hundred dollars for the Texas World's Fair exhibit. What are we going to do about it?

THE Hearst boomlet is becoming a full grown boom. There is enough in it to arouse the Cleveland-Palmer-Buckner-McKinley democrats to vigorous action.

THE Russians have 200 guns mounted at Port Arthur, making it theoretically one of the strongest in the world, while in fact it is exceedingly weak because the fortifications are small and cramped.

THE death of Senator Hanna seems to have removed all obstacles from the path of President Roosevelt to the republican nomination for president. His nomination is now conceded on all sides.

THERE are no party lines to be drawn this year, and there should be no division on account of prohibition sentiment. It is to be hoped that for the sake of harmony no factional feeling will be injected into the present campaign.

THE sentiment seems almost unanimous in favor of opening the doors wide and holding two primaries. This rule is being adopted by all our neighboring counties and appears as fair as any plan or test that might be adopted.

THE Southern good roads convention will meet at New Orleans on April 6th and 7th. Gov. Lanham has been asked to appoint delegates at large from the State of Texas. All mayors of cities and heads of commercial bodies are to be invited.

NACOGDOCHES has just got to dig up eleven hundred dollars for the World's Fair and we had just as well get at it. Louis Wortham and Sam Dixon will be here Monday to start the work and they are going to stay with us until they get the money.

THE candidate who puts himself up either on the anti or pro ticket should be summarily sat upon. If lines are drawn on this issue the bitterness that will follow will be worse than the populist discord ever was. Now that harmony is restored between political factions lets not renew discord with the prohibition issue.

DEPUTY City Marshal, W. N. Belk declares that there is not a gambling joint in Nacogdoches; that every place where gambling has ever been carried on has been closed and locked tight and the keys turned over to City Marshal Spradley. If there is any violation of either gambling law or the local option law here at present it is so well smuggled that no evidences are to be seen.

THERE is a greater demand for residences in Nacogdoches than ever before. Somebody is bound to go to building rent houses pretty soon or Nacogdoches will miss a heavy increase in population during the present year.

THE Lodge Goat is a new paper published at Beaumont in the interest of fraternal orders, by Funchess & Montgomery. The New publication is in the shape of a magazine and the cover page is graced with the picture of Hon. Lee Blanchette. The Goat is the organ of no particular society, but of all fraternal orders.

THE President has addressed a communication to Post Master General Payne, congratulating him upon exposing so much rottenness and corruption in the post office department, and admonishing him to persevere in the prosecution of all that "sin against the fundamental laws of civic and social well being," that they may be punished with unsparring vigor.

HON. A. LEFEVRE is submitting his past record as proper ground for his re-election to the office of State Superintendent of public instruction. If all men were continued in office as long as they could show a good record for past service there would be few changes during a life time. No man should be elected who is not capable of making a good record, and unless an officer has made a good record he has failed to do his duty.

IT is almost an assured fact that the executive committee will adopt no test except the obligation to support the nominees and will adopt the plan of holding a double primary. If this is done the door is open wide and the second primary which will be held on the 9th of July under the provisions of the Terrell election law will amount to the same thing as a general election. The proposition cannot be objectionable to any candidate who is willing for the majority to say whether or not he shall hold the office he seeks. It would be undemocratic for him to oppose such a step.

FROM assistant traffic manager of the Southern Pacific with a salary of \$6,000 a year to a Wall Street millionaire all within twelve months, is the record made by Samuel F. B. Morse. Cards have just been issued announcing the membership of Mr. Morse in the house of Daniel J. Sully & Co., and in this connection Chicago friends of the former railway man declare that while Sully has been booking from ten to twenty millions, Morse was climbing up in the vicinity of two millions, and many railroad men profited through his advice. He became acquainted with Sully in Texas and the latter took him to New York as brokerage manager at \$10,000 a year and gave him opportunities to get into the millionaire class.

THE machinery is arriving at Navasota for a big knitting mill.

Gov. VARDEMAN, who was only a few weeks ago inaugurated governor of Mississippi after being elected on the most rabid anti-negro platform ever launched in the South, has just saved a negro from lynching in a most heroic manner and at a heavy expense to the state. It is said that since Gov. Vardeman's election hundreds of negroes have left the state, and thousands of blacks confidently believe that his ascension to the governor's chair meant their return to slavery. When a few days ago the first threatened negro lynching since his inauguration was sprung in Panola county, Miss., at Batesville on the Mississippi Valley railroad, Gov. Vardeman nearly burned up the wires from Jackson, ordering Sheriff Johnson of that county to protect the negro, Albert Baldwin, charged with the murder of Engineer Fogety, at Tutwiler. He displayed an aggressiveness to save the black's life never known in the history of Mississippi governors. Towards night he called out the militia, ordered the Greenwood and Brookhaven companies to the scene instantly. Special trains were hired. Later Gov. Vardeman summoned his staff, employed a special train from the Illinois Central, left for the scene with lightning speed to assume personal command of the State militia and save Baldwin from being burned. That night the special train returned to Jackson, the capital, bearing Gov. Vardeman, the militia and the negro, Baldwin, having been rescued from the mob. He was safely locked up in the Jackson jail.

THE Louisiana boll weevil commission have raised a "rumpus" with the farmers in Sabine Parish by ordering that no cotton be planted on a thousand acres of land near the Texas line. About thirty farmers are affected by the order, and they declare they cannot subsist on \$2 per acre for upland and \$3.50 per acre for bottom land, the amount of rent allowed by the commission for the cotton land. It is reported that many of the planters appear to believe that the cotton boll leaders have sent men throughout that district of the state, sowing boll weevils in order to restrict the cotton crop and keep down the output, thereby bulling the market. Some actually believe these reports. Others claim that Texans have been known to come through the parish from over the state line with weevils to distribute in the Louisiana cotton fields. This argument of the situation in Sabine sounds wholly unwarranted to thinking people, but the sufferers believe many of these stories given them. They are willing to believe that Texas has had something to do with the infection, because she had it, but of course such thoughts are far from the commissioners and Gov. Heard.

ONE hundred dwelling houses could be rented in Nacogdoches within the next three months if they were here.

## EXPERT PRINTER CALLED IN.

Outside Firm Offers to Do \$250 Job for \$1,200.

Austin, Tex., Feb. 27.—The Travis County Commissioners called in an expert printer when considering the bids to print the election blanks prescribed by the Terrell bill. The bids from two or three St. Louis houses were similar at about \$1,200, while the local expert said \$250 or \$300 would be ample, with a profit for the printer.

There is complaint from a number of counties over the State that the outside printers appear to be bidding about the same, and at high figures, intimating that they possess a copyright on the blanks. Of course any claim to copyright is all nonsense. A representative of one of the St. Louis houses assisted the Secretary of State in preparing the prescribed form, and the mistaken idea of copyright might have grown out of that. The local printers in numerous counties are complaining.

## Accidentally Killed.

One of the saddest accidents that has occurred in many years was the accidental killing of Dora Henry, the ten year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Henry of this city, Wednesday afternoon.

Several young ladies and gentlemen were out shooting with a 22 calibre rifle and were shooting at a bottle placed on a stump and the little girl was at home, playing in the yard, about two hundred yards distance from them and one of the stray bullets went wild of its mark, hitting the unfortunate girl in the right breast, killing her almost instantly.—Bronson Bulletin.

## For County Treasurer.

The announcement of Mr. Jno. N. Gilbert appears today for the office of county treasurer of Nacogdoches county, subject to the action of the democratic primaries. Mr. Gilbert is well known and well qualified for the office and if elected will guard well the county's finances. ## THE PANAMA CANAL.

Scratching Dirt Will Begin at An Early Date.

Washington, Feb. 23.—Everything is ready for the speedy codsummation of the Panama treaty and both the war and state departments have made preparations for the next step, the former by the dispatch of troops to the isthmus and the latter by the completion of arrangements for the exchange of ratifications of the treaty, which must take place in Washington. There is no reason why this ceremony should not occur within the next forty-eight hours. M. Buneau Varilla, the minister from Panama, was at the state department today in relation to this matter and very soon after he has made the exchange of treaties will lay down his mission, according to notice he has already given. His successor as minister here will be Pablo Arosemena, the present head of the constitutional convention and father of the secretary of the Panama legation here. Mr. Arosemena is described as a lawyer of ability and a man of means.

The administration intends to press the canal project by all proper methods. As a cabinet officer expressed it, the next step after the appointment of the commission will be "to scratch dirt" and already such members of the commission as are assured of their places, like Admiral Walker and Major General Davis, have been giving some attention to the provision of a clerical force and the engagement of an engineering staff to conduct the actual work of canal digging.

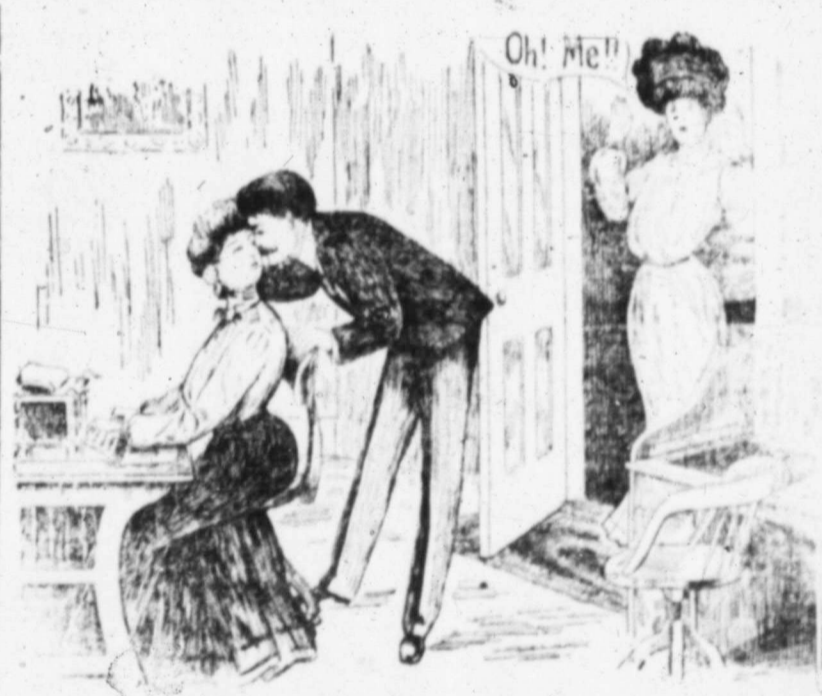
