This is the action forecasted Sunday by Mr. Ross Clark, ai whose instance the action was taken. The text of the petition follows:
Mr. Clark alleges that he has invested $\$ 100,000$ in his Placido farm near Port Lavaca, Victoria county, and that among other things he is grow ing cotton on the farm. He
then sets up the fact that Dr . S A. Knapp, a special agen of the United States govern ment, had been conducting boll weevil extermination periment station about miles from the farm of the pe miles from the farm of the pe
titioner. He relates the vari titioner. He relates the vari
ous experiments that have been made, and states that an ant has been discovered in
Gautemala, South America by a government expert. and that a great number of them has been procured and will within a few days be left at some Texas port and then re leased at the Victoria experi ment ststion to prey upon the cotton boll weevil.
The petitioner sets up the
claim that the ants would soon become so numerous as to become an intolerable pest. That it would be impossible to pick cotton because of their pres-
ence in the fields and their stinging of the laborers, and stinging of the laborers, and
that they would destroy the plant itself, and also all other vegeration. He speaks of the pests that have been imported into this country to ald in terminating other evils and
cites the English sparrow and horn fly as specimens of mis takes that have been made in the past.
