gineer for the H, K. Porter Locomotive Works, of Pittsburg, Pa., arrived in the city yesterday. His mission here is to deliver to the Nacogdoches and Southeastern Railroad Co. engine No. 31. The engine is a 15x24 and has three drivers and weighs fifty tons. The engine is on the pattern of the new engines on the Houston East & West Texas and is a first-class machine. The contract with the Porter Company calls for the engine in running order the Nacogdoches Southeas ern's track by July 16th.

When asked if the new road had other contracts with his company, Mr. Philp stated he thought that an order had been placed for two more of the same model as No. 31, and also for a cog engine.

Six miles of the new road is covered with steel and the new engine will be given a trial run tomorrow afternoon.

Court Grants a Temporary Writ Against Experts.

Houston Chronicle:

At the instance of Attorneys C. R. Wharton and H. E. Masterson, Judge Hamblen of the Fifty-fifth civil district court this morning grant ed a temporary restraining order against Dr. S. A. The contest stirred up the sporting blood of the farmers and professors and caused a run on magnifying glasses at College Station drug stores. The defeat o the ant is excused by those who championed them on the ground that they were tired and were seasick as a result of their long ride across the tossing waters of the Atlantic. They looked gaunt and mild and did not show their usual hghting propensities. Seventy-two of the ants were pitted against an equal number of boll weevils. The weevils went after them hot and fast and literally pecked off their hides. The ants were put to rout with the exception of a few which turned about and made gallant but unsuccessful stands.
