The first bale of new cotton for the season of 1904-5 was received in Nacogdoches late yesterday afternoon. It was raised and brought in by Thos. E. Rightmer and weighed 415 pounds. The bale was sold at auction by Capt J. S. Doughtie this morning and was bid in by Mr S. L. Miller for the Nacogdoches Mercantile Co., at 1134 cents a pound, the bale netting \$48.75. There was also a premium of \$47.50 made up by popular subscripthion, that went to the producer, making the total amount received by Mr. Rightmer for the bale \$96.25.

MUCH IN CULTIVATION.

A stalk of cotton was brought in from the experimental crop on the farm of T. J. Lloyd on North street this this morning that contained fitty hve well developed grown bolls. This crop has been cultivated under the direction of the government. earliest variety of cotton seed were used and the manner of growing it has been by heavy fertilizing and rapid cultivation for early maturity as a preventive against the boll weevil. The stalk brought in is said to be an average of the crop, and it is believed that the probale yield be at least a bale to the acre, Another stalk was also brought in from the crop of Josh Henson just South of town which was selected as the worst in the field. It is covered with boll weevils, but yet has a number of grown boils. The most of the crop on the Henson farm will average fairly. Last year the weevils literally eat the crop up on the same ground, but by the use of Paris green Mr. Henson has kept the weevils in check and he will probably get a half bale to the acre The experiment on these two farms demonstrates the possibility of of getting a fair crop in spite of the boll weevils, by careful cultivation and the use of
