



TEXAS TOBACCO OFFICIALLY.

Bulletin Setting Forth Its High Quality Soon To Issue.

Washington, Oct. 18 -The cigars manufactured from leaf tobacco grown from Havana tobacco seed planted in Ange lina and Nacogdoches counties, Texas, under the auspices of the Agricultural Department, are said to be of excellent quality and entirely satisfactory. No opinion will be expressed officialy by the department, however, until reports have been received from the cigar experts to whom these cigars have been sent for distribution. About 7,000 pounds of the leaf tobacco was raised by the department, and a much larger quantity is expected to be produced this year. 
