### TWO CAROUSING COONS.

Jailed For Shooting Into White Man's House.

From Monday's Daily:

Dick Leak, Dave Taylor, and Bob Simpson, all colored, were jailed early yesterday morning on a charge of shooting into the residence of W. J. Blackman, a farmer-merchant, who lives four miles from town, near Fairview, on the Melrose road. Simpson was subsequently released, it appearing that he was not implicated in the shooting but happened to be near by when it happened. It is said that the belligerent darkeys were pretty well "tanked up" on fighting booze and had made it a business to "cuss out" every man they met as they went out from town, reaching the climax in a shooting bee with Mr. Blackman. They first shot into his house, it is alleged, and in turn were fired upon by Mr. Blackman with a pistol, which drove them off, but they returned and made a second attack, literally perforating the front door of his residence with bullet holes. Mr. Blackman and other members of his family narrowly escaped being shot.

The affair was reported at once to Sheriff Spradley and a posse went in search of the miscreants and they were soon found and landed behind the bars.

ANYHOW it was a bloodless election in Texas and that's one on the pistol toters.

ACOGDOCHES county is now democratic to stay for many years to come.

IN Burleson county a negro constable and negro commissioner were elected last Tuesday.

AND we didn't even save Maryland, nor yet Missouri. The South is no longer solid on the northern rim.

GOVERNOR LAMAR has issued his proclamation designating Thursday, November 24th as Thanksgiving day.

BUT no matter—we carried the county, anyway. The entire democratic county ticket went through with a rush.

THE Terrell election law has shown itself an admirable contrivance for giving Texas a fair and peaceful election.

ROOSEVELT has about ten thousand messages of congratulations to answer. Let Judge Parker think of that and be comforted.

AFTER all, oratory is not a safe thing to rely on. The fellow that mounts the greatest number of stumps doesn't always get elected.

IT is estimated that Roosevelt will have 325 votes in the electoral college and the republicans a majority of more than 90 in the lower house of Congress.

LET us hear no more talk about brutal majorities in Texas after the indecent and unblushing exposure of public sentiment in the northern states last Tuesday.

THE Japs and Russians can now resume business. Our little scrap in this country is over and we can now give our undivided attention to other people's troubles.

IT is now denied by persons who have visited the field that oil has been struck at Humble in paying quantities. The symptoms are good but the oil has not arrived.

NOW that the elections are out of the way we can get back into the ruts of business and devote our undivided attention to a whole lot of things of more profit to us than politics any day in the year.

WE didn't guess right on the presidential election, but Colonel Andrew Jackson Houston will sadly acknowledge that we called the turn in the Second Congressional District election.

"HE who does the best his circumstance allows does well, acts nobly—angels could no more." That is what Judge Parker did, and in this hour of his overwhelming defeat our respect and admiration for the distinguished jurist and stainless gentleman who led our forces in the unequal contest is in nowise diminished.

## WILL BE GOOD TO US.

Alter it was ascertained in New York city Tuesday night that Roosevelt had swept the country one of his close friends gave out an interview for the press, of special interest to the South and from which we take the following:

"The South is going to find that President Roosevelt is not the enemy of that section, nor has he any intention of stirring up the race question. The president is half a Georgian himself, and all opinions to the contrary, no section of the country has a warmer place in his heart than that of his mother's family. He recognizes the difficulties which the Southern people face and can understand the feeling against him, though he, of course, feels that it is unwarranted and unjust. He believes, however, that no real step forward in the settlement of the race problem can be made unless it is founded on right and justice, and it is this feeling which has made him so tenacious in standing by his actions in the Crum and Indianola cases. I am sure the records will show that no more negroes have been appointed to office by Mr. Roosevelt than by his predecessors. I firmly believe that he will set his face against any drastic action by congress against the South, and that if the Southern people will let him he will be a good and valuable friend."

THERE is less disappointment in the South over the presidential election than in any similar election for thirty years past for the reason that there was less hope of democratic success this time.

THE moral element in the wide open city of El Paso has declared that open gambling shall cease in that city. The first step has already been taken by ordering the gamblers to vacate the first floors of buildings and ply their vocations in the upper stories.

IN the far west Colorado alone indicates that the democratic party still lives. Alva Adams, the democratic candidate for governor in that state managed to pull through, and it was only his extraordinary personal popularity that saved him.

WE didn't win with Parker nor could we have won with Bryan nor any other man the democratic party could have nominated nor on any platform that party could have adopted. Democratic mistakes had nothing to do with the result. Our man and our platform were both right, but unfortunately there are more republicans than democrats in this country.

A FRIEND suggests to the Sentinel, in view of the beastly majority for Roosevelt last Tuesday and in order to make us all one happy family of States without any difference of opinions that some Texas democrat should magnanimously move to make it unanimous. Before proceeding to entertain motions to this effect the chair would ask if there is

any parliamentary law to kiver that kind of a case? If so, let 'er rip.

MR. HEARST is the first among the big editors to come out with the "reasons" why Judge Parker was defeated. He has a whole lot of them stated with much elaboration and plausibility, but his real opinion on the subject, which he is too modest to give, is that the democratic party was defeated because it failed to nominate William R. Hearst for president.

IT is said that the president's cabinet will re-organize by the appointment of Choate, now minister to England, to succeed Hay as Secretary of State, that Taft will go on the supreme bench to succeed Fuller as Chief Justice if the latter resigns, as expected, and that General Luke Wright, the southern democrat and ex-confederate, now governor general of the Philippines, will succeed Taft as Secretary of War.

THE great, fundamental fact that advertising pays is most impressively illustrated to the people of this country by the election of Douglas, the shoe man, as governor of Massachusetts. Douglas is a democrat and he is the only democrat who got elected to any office worth mentioning in any Northern state Tuesday. And that Massachusetts, of all States, should have elected a democratic governor can only be explained by the fact that Douglas had so thoroughly advertised himself into the hearts and heads of the people of that state and impressed that justly celebrated picture of his shrewd and genial mug so deeply upon the retina of the Massachusetts eye that it resulted in something like a bargain-counter rush on election day in behalf of the great advertiser. Douglas is a peach, a daisy, an oasis of most vivid green in the vast republican desert of the North; a lone peak towering on the Northern horizon; a beacon light in the stupendous gloom. Hail, all hail, the great name of Douglas, the shoe man! He got there—and he's the only one that did in his latitude.

OF more importance than any presidential election or economic reform to be brought about by a change in party administrations is that supreme issue which reaches into every Southern home and most vitally affects the interest of every Southern community, of the enforcement of the law. In its presence all other issues are dwarfed, and until we of the South have resolutely faced and solved this problem we cannot hope for a permanent and general prosperity, for such prosperity is based only on law abiding conditions. We need first of all to despise and reject the arguments which attempt to justify lynching, for that crime is playing more havoc with the law abiding spirit in the South than the crimes which it is invoked to punish. On this point an admirable Southern paper, the Richmond, (Va.) Times Dispatch says with a stern and simple logic which

no man can answer: "So far from stopping crime, lynching tends to make more crime, for it breeds the spirit of lawlessness, and lawlessness begets lawlessness. It is an absurd proposition, absurd, on the face of it, that crime is to be cured by crime, that law and order are to be established by unlawful methods. The law is the only protection which the weak man has against the strong man; which the good citizen has against the bad citizen; which society has against the criminal class. The stronger and more influential the law is made by the support of all good citizens, the surer and greater will be its protection. The converse of the proposition is equally true. Therefore, when we undermine the law we are as foolish as the man who wilfully destroys the foundation of his own house."

FROM the recent Conference of Baptist ministers in Richmond, Va., has come in concise form ten unanswerable reasons why the Southern people should suppress the crime of lynching and these reasons are put with such force that the dullest mind cannot fail to recognize their truth. This Baptist Conference denounces lynching (1) because it does not stop crime; (2) because it brutalizes a community; (3) because it tends to widen the scope of its jurisdiction; (4) because it sometimes confounds the innocent with the guilty; (5) because it hamstring the only power that can afford us protection under the anomalous conditions in which we of the South live; (6) because it prejudices the world against us; (7) because it frightens from our borders desirable immigration and investments; (8) because the lynching of negroes intensifies racial bitterness, and retards any helpful adjustment of the strained conditions in the South; (9) because it impeaches the spirit of fairness in the Anglo-Saxon; (10) because the continuance of lynching will tend to bring Federal interference.

A FARMER dreamed that he had raised a thousand bushels of wheat and he was happy over the fact. Then he dreamed he sold it for \$1 a bushel and his happiness was great. But he dreamed now that he had sold it to a thousand different people; a bushel to each one, and that nobody had paid him, and he was sad. When he awoke it was broad daylight, and leaping out of bed he exclaimed to his wife, "Rebecca, I have had solemn warning and I know the meaning of it. I am going right off to town and pay the printer that dollar I owe him on the paper.—Ex.

MR. BRYAN comes to the front and tells us that the result last Tuesday was due to the fact that the democratic party attempted to be conservative in the presence of conditions which demand radical remedies. It sounded a partial retreat when it should have ordered a charge all along the line. He says that if the party hopes to win success it must take the part of the plain, common people.

Planting Pecans.

Prof. F. W. Malley, who went to the World's Fair recently, attended a meeting of the National Nut Growers' Association in session in that city. While there he learned a great deal in regard to pecan growing which is recognized as an important industry in some parts of Texas. He learned that pecans do better on what we know as peach land than in bottom land. Especially is this true of cultivated varieties. He is now

making arrangements to plant pecan groves adjacent to the various orchards with which he is connected. In some of the older orchards the pecans will be planted among the peaches so that the trees will be in bearing about the time the peaches die out. It has heretofore been supposed that pecans would only grow in bottom lands, and now that investigation has proven other-

wise there is no reason why Nacogdoches people should not take up the matter of pecan growing for serious consideration. The next annual session of the National Nut Growers' Association will convene in Dallas.—Plain-dealer.



**PARKER TO DEMOCRACY.**

There is no more cheerful democrat in this country than Judge Alton B. Parker, the man who was snowed under Tuesday by the biggest majority ever recorded in the political annals of this country. After his defeat he issued the following address to the democratic party which should be read by every democrat in the country, for it is the clear, defiant note of a leader undismayed by defeat, true to his colors and full of hope for his party's future:

"Kingston, N. Y., Nov. 9. To the Democracy of the Nation: Our thanks are due to the members of the National Committee, to the executive committee in charge of the campaign, for most unselfish, capable and brilliant service. All that it was possible for men to do they did, but our difficulty was beyond the reach of party managers.

"I am most grateful to them and wish in this general way to extend my thanks to the workers as well as to the rank and file all over the country. I know how hard they struggled against overwhelming odds, and I only wish I could take each one by the hand and thank him.

"Deeply as I regretted leaving the bench at the time, in the presence of overwhelming defeat, I do not now lament. I thought it was my duty. In the light of my present information, I am now even more confident that I did right. I shall never seek a nomination for public office, but I shall, to the best of my ability, serve the party that has honored me and through the party serve my country.

"The party has in the near future a great mission. Be-

fore long the people will realize that the tariff-fed trusts and illegal combinations are absorbing the wealth of the nation.

"Then they will wish to throw off these leeches, but the republican party will not aid them to do it, for its leaders appreciate too well the uses to which the moneys of the trusts can be put in political campaigns.

"When that time comes, and come it will, the people will turn to the democratic party for relief, and the party should be ready, ready with an organization of patriotic citizens, covering every election district, who are willing to risk for the love of the cause an organization supported by as many towns, city, county, state officers as we are able to elect in the meantime. We entered this canvass with every Northern, Western and Eastern state save one, in republican control. This gave to that party a large army of officeholders reaching into every hamlet, many of whom gladly followed the example set for them by members of the president's cabinet in devoting their time and service to the party.

"To accomplish much in this direction, however, we must forget the difficulties of the past. If any one suspects his neighbor of treachery let him not hint of his suspicion. If he knows he has deserted us, let him not tell it. Our forces have been weakened by divisions. We have quarreled at times over nonessentials. If we would help the people, if we would furnish organization through which they may be relieved of a party that has grown so corrupt that it will gladly enter into partnership with the trusts to secure money for election purposes, we must forget the difficulties of the past and begin this day to build up wherever it may be needed a broad and

effective organization, and we must, by constant teaching, through the press and from the platform, apprise the people of the way the vicious tariff circle works.

"We must bring home to them at other than election time the fact that the moneys collected for the Republican party by the trusts is not only dishonest money, but it is given that the trusts may without hindrance take a much larger sum from the people. In the presence of a defeat that would take away all personal ambition, were it true that otherwise it possessed me, I do not hesitate to say that in my opinion the greatest moral question which now confronts us is: Shall the trusts and corporations be prevented from contributing money to control or to aid in controlling elections?

"Such service as I can render in any direction will be gladly rendered. And I beg the co-operation as a fellow worker of every Democrat in the country.


Going to Stop Whisky Drummers.

The case of the State against Jim Sims was concluded Friday at noon, and the jury returned a verdict of guilty, fixing his punishment at a fine of \$25 and 20 days in jail, after being out only a short time.

Sims contended that he had a right to come here and take orders for the Paris liquor concern for whom he worked, notwithstanding the fact that local option prevailed here, and on the trial, he did not deny the transaction, but depended for an acquittal on this construction of the law. Hence, in this case, the whole question of whether local option can be enforced was involved to a considerable extent. It was one of the most thorough discussions of legal questions ever heard in a local court. The attorneys for the prosecution also argued their construction of the law most ably, and it is indeed fortunate for those who want the local option law enforced that a conviction was secured in this case, for it will probably have the effect of putting a stop to the whiskey drummers.—Mt. Pleasant Times-Review.


