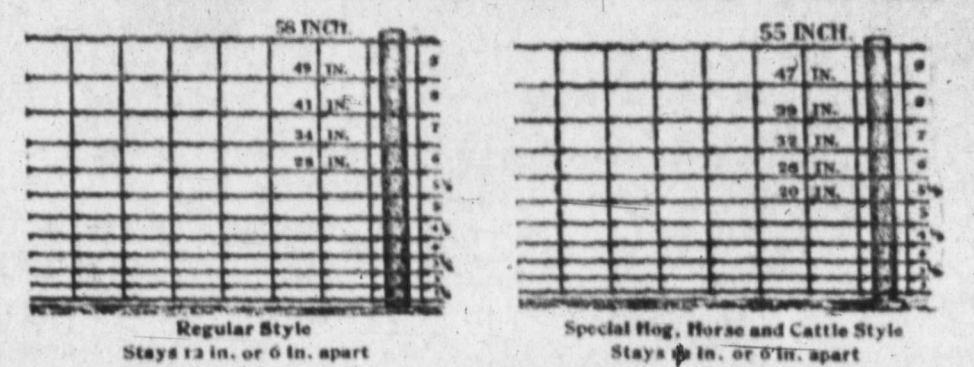

### A WISE OLD FARMER.

We reproduce the following letter from a Kaufman county farmer to the Kaufman Herald as one of the most sensible productions we have read in many a day. The people of Texas need such literature and they need it badly. The gross dereliction of juries in this State in the trial of criminal cases is appalling and it is surely sapping the foundations of our civilization. The people are rapidly losing confidence in the administration of justice in the court houses and the largest part of the fault must be laid upon the juries of Texas. What this wise old Kaufman county farmer says of the jury system in his county is doubtless true of every county in the State. Here is his letter to the Herald:

"If you feel at liberty to allow an old farmer and tax payer of Kaufman county to write his observations for publication in your columns they are here penned.

"There has been a continuous grumbling in Kaufman county since I have been a citizen of the county, about so many criminals turned loose in the courts and right here I want to say that, from my experience, this county has used the weakest jury service of any locality that I ever saw. The main reason for so many verdicts of "not guilty" is that the juries don't do their duty in the jury box. They shield too many criminals from punishment. Many years of my life I was magistrate and the above is my candid opinion.

"The enforcement of the criminal laws of Texas is costing the taxpayers of this state more money by thousands than it would if the juries did not conjure up so many doubts, and the worse the crime the bigger, and more of the doubts; then the delay in courts adding more cost. Bringing witnesses from everywhere who do not know anything about the case is a source of great wrong, and enough to cause good, law abiding citizens to lose confidence in the courts. I observe, also, that a large portion of good men do questionable things to get off of jury duty, which leaves all the men known to sympathize with the criminals to sit in judgment in the cases of their friends on trial. All this ought to be stopped, and men who who are in favor of stopping so much murder in Kaufman county, and other crimes, ought to be willing to serve their county and enforce the law and stop by their verdicts so many killings in this county. When the juries of Kaufman enforce the laws, Kauf-

azine will be entirely under his control and he will write for it exclusively. Tom is a bright and caustic writer and he may make his venture stick, but we doubt it. Tom is too savage and gloomy to make a continuously popular writer. The reading world doesn't care long for deadly serious people unable to light up their work with wit and humor.

THE point made by Alderman Carroll at the recent meeting of the city council in a discussion with the city marshal relative to the enforcement of the law was aptly illustrated when Mr. Carroll said that if there was a law to prohibit him from kissing his wife he would not kiss her. But he would be found at Austin at the next meeting of the legislature trying to have that law repealed, and if he did not succeed in repealing the law he would pick up and move away from a country which had laws which he could not obey. In other words, Mr. Carroll made the point that people who live here should either obey the laws or seek some country where the laws are satisfactory.—Beaumont Journal.

BUT a very few years ago Roger Q. Mills was the foremost of Texans in the public eye both at home and abroad. More than any other man in the democratic party North or South he was identified with the cause of tariff reform in the lower house of congress and we of Texas were proud of him as a genuine statesman who measured up to the standard, and made Texas honored in the councils of the nation. But who hears of Roger Q. Mills now? Many Texans think him dead so complete is his retirement. When Culberson defeated him for the senate his disappointment was so great that he grew misanthropic, quit politics forever and his voice has not been heard since in the councils of his party. 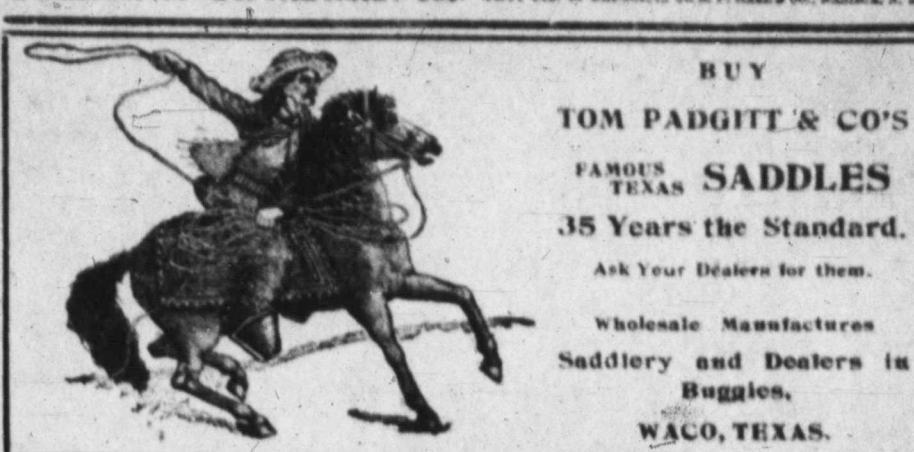

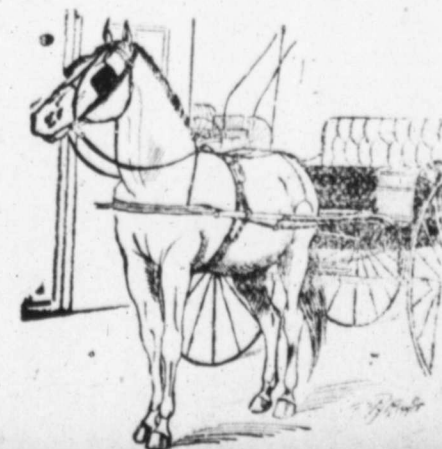

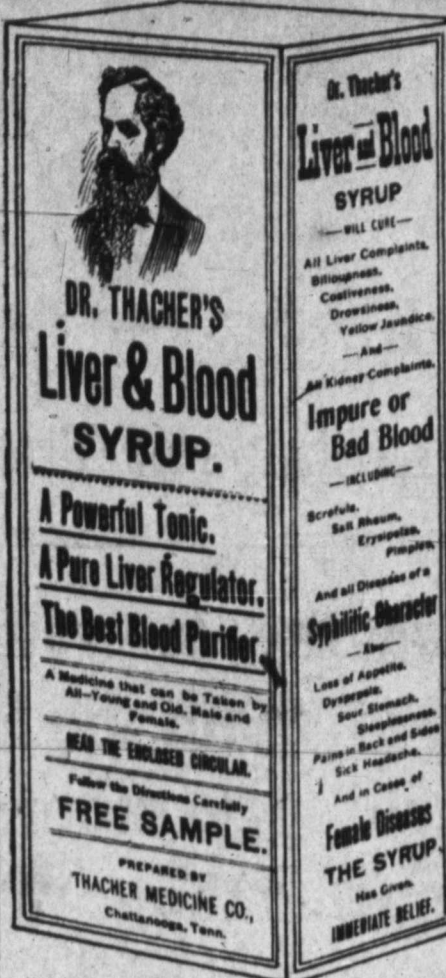
