nal cases is appalling and it is surely sapping the foundations of our civilization. Th people are rapidly losing confidence in the administration ot.justice in the court houses and the largest part of the fault must be laid upon the juries of Texas. What this wise old Kaufman county farmer says of the jury system in his county is doubtless true of every county in the State. Here is his letter to the Herald:
'If you teel at liberty to alow an old farmer and tax payer of Kaufman county to write his observations for pub-
lication in your columns they lication in your
are here penned.
"There has been a continuous grumbling in Kaufman county since I have been a citizen of the county, about so many criminals turned loose in the courts and right here I want to say that, from my ex perience, this county has used the weakest jury service o any locality that I ever saw. The main reason for so many verdicts of "not guilty" is that the juries don't do their duty in the jury box. 'They shield too many criminals from pun ishment. Many years of my life I was magistrate and th above is my candid opinon.
-The enforcement of the riminal laws of Texas is cost ing the taxpayers of this state more money by thousands than it would if the juries did not conjure up so many doubts, and the worse the crime the bigger, and more of the doubts hen the delay in courts add ng more cost. Bringing wit nesses from everywhere who
do noc know anything about he case is a source of grea wrong, and enough to cause rood, law abiding citizens rood, law abiding citizens to ose confidence in the courts.

The point made by Alder man Carroll at the recent meeting of the city council in a discussion wita the city marshal relative to the enorcement of the law was aptly illustrated when Mr. Carroll said that it there was a law to prohibit him from kissing his rife he would not kiss her But he would be found at Austin at the next meeting of the legislature trying to have that law repealed, and it he d!d not succeed in repealing the law he would pick up and nove away from a country which had laws which he could not obey. In other words,
Mr. Carroll made the point that people who live here hould either obey the laws or seek some country where the laws are satisfactory.-Beau ent Journal.
