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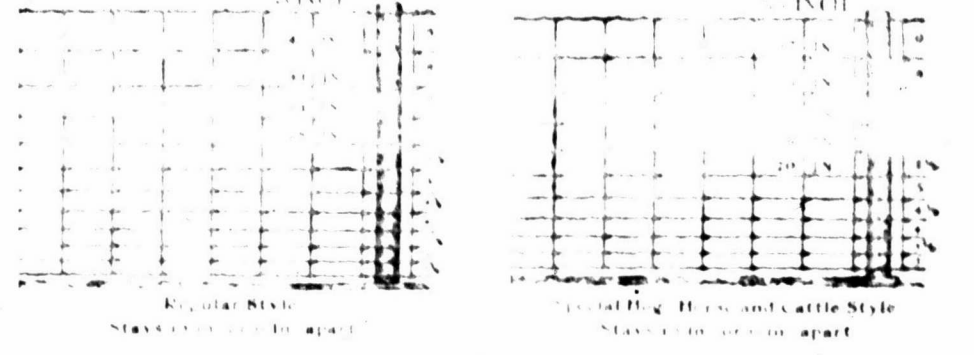

**RUSSIA** is not so indignant now as she was the first time at the proposal of France and England to mediate between her and Japan. Russia is beginning to have that tired feeling.

Nothing too good for a newspaper man when he's equal to the job. White-law Reid of the New York Tribune is slated for the job of Ambassador to England to succeed Joseph Choate.

EDITOR COOKE of the Tyler Democrat Reporter is not far wrong when he says that the next legislature should address itself to the work of bettering present laws rather than to the making of new statutes.

Like pretty nearly every other good old institution which still survives at all Christmas has been brutalized by modern commercialism until it is but a sorry reminder of its former self. The Christmas just passed hardly deserved the name.

At Clarksville, Red River county on Tuesday Judge Denton sentenced John Reeves to be hanged Friday, Feb. 17th for the murder of his wife last spring. After his conviction and the usual round of appeals he admitted his crime.

The C. O. D. whiskey now being shipped into local option towns is said by the Tyler Democrat Reporter to be made of Navy plug tobacco and wood alcohol flavored with "knock-out" drops and dog fennel. Now wouldn't that stagger you?

The telegraph pages of the big papers are laden every day with the details of shocking and highly sensational crimes committed at the North from which the Northern papers can draw no morals because the Northern editors are too busy writing editorials on the fearful prevalence of crime in the South.

The biggest suit of recent times in Texas was filed in the district court at Houston yesterday in which John H. Kirby, the lumber king brought suit against Patrick Calhoun of Atlanta, Georgia, for \$4,000,000, the value of shares in the Houston oil company which Kirby claims that Calhoun wrongfully converted to his own use.

The amiable Chauncey Depew whose carefully rehearsed jokes contribute so much to the gaiety of the nation, has fixed things so that he will succeed himself in the United States Senate. Chancey is not a heavyweight statesman but he is a highly genteel representative of the great Vanderbilt interest in the senate and an altogether agreeable gentleman.

STATISTICS compiled by Insurance Commissioner Clay show that during last year Texas paid for fire, life and other insurance \$18,673,615, of which amount only \$7,217,543 was returned in payment of losses. This shows that Texas is sending out of the state as a gift to eastern financiers the neat sum of \$11,456,072 annually.—Beaumont Journal.

A NEWSPAPER dispatch from Ft. Gaines, Ga., of Dec. 28th says: The farmers and merchants of Clay county met today at Fort Gaines and decided to burn their share of two million bales of surplus cotton. A starter was made today when a bonfire was made of cotton on the streets of Fort Gaines. It is not yet determined where it will stop. They have decided to set the pace and are moving determinedly. A large crowd paraded with much spectacular ceremony. The object is to show that the farmers are ready to sacrifice a few bales for the benefit of the masses. The fire is still burning and excitement is increasing.

OUR United States Senator Bailey does not confine himself exclusively to politics and its incidental spell-binding. Yesterday he filed in the Federal court at Houston an intervention against the Houston Oil Company, through his attorney, I. M. Standifer, praying for a judgment on a note for \$25,000 and ten percent attorney's fees, and foreclosure on certain lands owned by the Houston Oil Company in San Augustine county. The note sued on was originally executed by the Beaumont Lumber Company to Mrs. Margaret P. Thompson of Galveston and by her transferred to Senator Bailey. The complainant alleges that the Houston Oil Company bought the land, securing the note from the Beaumont Lumber Company and assumed the payment of this debt, which it has failed to do, wherefore judgment for the debt, attorney's fees, interest and costs and foreclosure of the lien against the land is prayed.

TEXAS leads all the States in railway mileage. Engineer Thompson, of the railroad commission, has compiled for the Railway Age, the number of miles of main line railway construction in Texas during the year. It shows that 285.5 miles were built, and are now in operation. The total mileage of main line track now in Texas is 11,611 miles, greater than any other state in the union. Construction during the year was made as follows: Beaumont, Sour Lake and Western, Beaumont to Sour Lake, 10 miles, Katy, Georgetown to Austin, 30 miles, Nacogdoches and Southeastern, 6.8 miles, San Antonio and Aransas Pass, Alice to Fulfuries, 35.6 miles, St. Louis and Brownsville, Robstown to Brownsville, 71.1 miles, St. Louis and Brownsville, Harlingen to Fordyce, 55.4 miles, St. Louis and Brownsville, Robstown to Bay City, 19 miles, Wichita Falls and Oklahoma, Wichita Falls to Byers, 22.5 miles.

THE Texas boll weevil is not so unpopular now as it was before the Department of Agriculture told us that we had a 13,000,000 bale crop. Without the boll weevil it would have been 15,000,000 bales and that would have meant 4 cent cotton. Looking at the proposition anyway we please the only way out of the trouble seems to be diversification on a vastly greater scale than we have yet attempted. By that means we will head off 6 cent cotton and minimize the ravages of the boll weevil.

THE greatest outrage against free government ever perpetrated in this country since reconstruction days is now going on in Colorado. Alva Adams, democrat, was elected governor, by more than 12000 majority over Peabody, the notorious republican despot who had working men driven out of the State in carload lots by his arbitrary edict during the Cripple Creek troubles. Adams was elected as a rebuke to this tyranny, but the republicans holding the machinery of the State government, including the Supreme court, are preparing to count him out and continue the reign of Peabody. The democrats may stand that sort of thing in Colorado but here in Texas we wouldn't by a large majority. The inherent right of revolution is always at hand as a last resort to remedy intolerable wrongs.

LET US quit saying mean things about Roosevelt, for it does really look as though he were holding out the friendly hand to the South and wanted to conciliate us. Here for instance is a press dispatch from Washington City which tells its own story too plainly to be mistaken: The President today appointed the son of Jeb Stuart, the famous Confederate General, as United States Marshal for one of the Virginia districts. The Marshal of the district, named Treat, was not satisfactory to the Department of Justice and his resignation was called for. Before the answer was received from him young Stuart was appointed. The local papers commenting on it say Stuart's nomination is to be in line with future appointments in the South. The President intends to improve the Federal office holding class there and will pick out the best men for office he can find. The fact that Mr. Stuart was a son of the famous Confederate cavalry leader appealed strongly to the President when he had decided that Mr. Treat would not be allowed to remain in office. This extract is from a Republican paper and gives an idea of what the Republicans here think about the President's policy in the South. It was only a short time ago that he appointed the grandson of Stonewall Jackson to West Point. The young man could not get the Congressman from his State to appoint him, he being without any political influence.

BEAUMONT is mourning the death of one of her foremost and most useful citizens, Dennis Call, prominent in banking and industrial circles, who died there after a protracted illness Friday morning.

## BLACKMAN'S ACCOUNT

Of the Shooting into His House by Negroes.

To whom it may concern:—As I have been asked (recently) several times about those negroes that shot into my house on the 12th day of Nov. I wish to state the facts. On the night of the 12th of Nov. a crowd of negroes (drunk) came by my house and shot five shots at me and in my house, putting one ball about two feet over the bed where my two little girls were asleep. I had nothing to protect myself with except a 32 S W pistol and four cartridges. I shot them and went in my house. The negroes went off and reloaded, came back and shot eight or ten shots more. I came to town that night and walked four miles after help. Mr. Purvis and Mr. Jim Derrick gladly came to my assistance. They arrested Dick Leak and Dave Taylor and landed them in jail. Dock Chapman and Bob Simpson testified to the above negroes doing the shooting and I myself heard Dave Taylor say during the shooting "G—d—you I will kill you." They were placed in jail and their bonds fixed at \$1,000 each.

In a few days a man came to me and said Dick Leak had plead guilty and had been fined five dollars. Dave Taylor, indicted for an assault and attempt to murder, remained in jail. His bond fixed at \$1,000. On last Wednesday his bond was fixed at \$100 and he was turned loose. Dr. Cox was sentenced to the penitentiary for four years for shooting in a white man's house. The negro was turned loose on a \$100 bond for shooting into my house among my wife and children.

The city of Nacogdoches will gladly furnish the site for the mill and with that as an inducement we think that a good sized cotton factory could be located. This movement was originated at a meeting of Nacogdoches county farmers and is a good one. It is a good investment for them inasmuch as it will furnish a far better market for their cotton than could be found otherwise. It would give employment to a great number of men and women who would reside in the county. It would be an attraction to our county and greatly increase the value of every acre of land for miles and miles around Nacogdoches. This move should be encouraged by all who feel an interest in the upbuilding of the county. Cushing Enterprise.

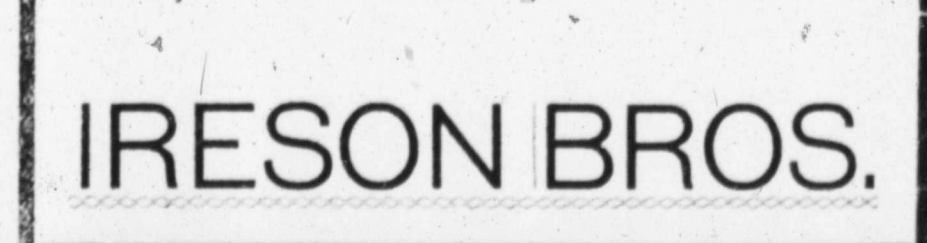

PORT ARTHUR has fallen at last. After eleven months of gallant resistance the worn out Russians yesterday struck their colors and surrendered to their indomitable foes. The terms of surrender are not yet known.

GEN. STOESEL, commander at Port Arthur, is one of the few generals who indulged in verbal heroics and made them good with his deeds. He didn't fully make all his brave words good but it was through no lack of stubborn valor on his part and he will go into history as a true military hero.

AFTER surveying the whole field and calculating the probabilities, Mr. Bryant in the last issue of his Commoner concludes that "there is no likelihood of legislation upon the race question at the present session or in the next congress. The south can therefore devote itself to the consideration of national reforms—reforms in which the whole country is interested—reforms for the proper solution of which the intelligence and patriotism of the south as well as of the north are required."

A NEGRO in peonage to another negro is a curious condition charged to exist in Athens, Ga. A dispatch from that town says: "One negro seeks release from a

condition of servitude from one of his own race. In Clark county Robert Christopher, colored, through his attorney, has sworn out a warrant before Commissioner Kinnebrew, charging his half brother, George Christopher, with compelling him to work for the latter without any legal right to do so, and he seeks the aid of the federal court in procuring his release. The trial of the accused negro is awaited with unusual interest.

As Hon F. W. Seabury of Starr county, is a candidate for the position and has no opposition he will be the next speaker of the house in the legislature at Austin. It is given out that Mr. Seabury will insist on some new rules of a somewhat radical character during the approaching session with a view of expediting legislation. One of the first things he will insist on will be a change in the rules so that the house will convene every day at noon instead of at 9:30 a. m., as has been the rule heretofore. He proposes to give the forenoon to the work of the committees, and meet at noon and remain in session until the calander is reasonably cleared. This rule is taken from the rules of the national congress. He also proposes to have a committee to pass on the bills that are introduced and reported, so that the author of some pet measure will not have the right to call it up at random, and insist on its passage when important business is ahead of it. Another change will be

required of committees when they report on a bill to give the substance of the measure. In other words, the committees will tell what the bill is about, when the report is filed. This idea will not only save time but will let the membership know exactly what the bill is when they begin to consider it, without going through a stack of bills to find out what is before the house.

THE legislature which convenes in Austin next week will have plenty of suggestions from the outside as to how to deal with the Texas pistol toter. A correspondent of the Houston Post in Monday's issue of that paper, handles the subject thus: "Change the present law by amendment and make the fine on conviction of the pistol-toter not less than fifty dollars and three months in the county jail, or both, and not exceeding one hundred dollars fine and six months in the county jail, making it incumbent on all sheriffs, constables, marshals and other civil officers to search, examine and take from every person whom he may suspect of having on or about his person any unlawful weapon. Take possession of the weapon and file complaint before the justice of the peace and try the case promptly, nonbailable."

#### Tobacco Expert Returns.

W. M. Hinson, the government tobacco expert in this county, returned yesterday from Washington City where he has been in consultation with the authorities there as to the result of the tobacco experiments in this county. He says that the government experiment with tobacco culture here is now complete and co-operation between the government and the farmers in the cultivation of the plant is the next step. It has been shown that a good quality of the filler can be grown here and the government desires to lend its assistance in putting the industry upon a stable and permanent basis. Plans will be issued in bulletin form within the next few days, and Mr. Hinson invites those farmers in Nacogdoches county who desire to go into the culture of tobacco to come in and discuss the matter with him at the government warehouse on Church street in this city. It is hoped that from 50 to 75 acres will be put in tobacco in this county and the government will furnish men free to supervise the work provided the farmers will be governed by their instructions. The government will assist in other ways indispensable at this stage to make a success of the industry. Come in and talk the matter over with Mr. Hinson and get full information as to the plans and purposes of the government in the matter. The only three counties included in this program to help the tobacco

growers are Nacogdoches, Houston and Anderson.

Sunday in the cemetery at Trawick a very beautiful marble monument erected by the Woodmen of the World to the memory of the late Frank J. Baucom, son of Rev S. F. Baucom, was unveiled with solemn and impressive ceremonies by the brethren of the Order. The local lodge at Trawick had charge of the ceremonies and a committee from the Nacogdoches lodge consisting of Hollis Mast, Edgar Thomason, Louis Muller and Eph Muckleroy was present to assist. The ceremonies took place in the presence of a large crowd and the band from Cushing furnished appropriate music for the occasion.

### THE COLLEGE QUESTION.

BY A. J. HOLT.

By the courtesy of the Editor of The Sentinel, I venture once more to place before the citizens of Nacogdoches some statements concerning the Baptist College:

1. East Texas proper, has no school of higher learning. Draw a line north and south through Jacksonville, and east of that line and south of Marshall and north of Beaumont, there is not one college. Yet this comprises the most marvelous section of our state. Twenty-five thousand square miles and 250,000 people, and fully 5000 young men and young women who should attend some school of higher education. Here we have the best of wood, the softest of water, the mildest climate, the most yielding soil of our state. East Texas is destined to lead the entire state in material prosperity. It is rapidly increasing in population, and is the only section of the state, if not of the South, which has so large a population without a college.

2. If our young people are to be educated at all, they must now go from home, and be educated away from us, and that means that they will leave East Texas after they are educated. That means too that tens of thousands of dollars will be sent out of East Texas that might be kept at home if we had a good college.

3. We just must educate our young men and young women or else see them serve other and better educated people. Ignorance always serves intelligence. The negroes are educating their people. I should have mentioned that there is one college in East Texas, Bishop college of Marshall, and that is for negroes.

4. Nacogdoches is the logical place for the location of a college. We have a high and hilly country, good earth, air and water, and we are situated in the very center of East Texas. We have railroads coming into Nacogdoches from five different directions. So it is accessible. We have prohibition, and the morals of our town are not surpassed by those of any other East Texas town. Our magnificent unsurpassed public school building indicates the educational tendency of our town.

5. A college would add greatly to our finances. Two hundred boarders would bring to our town and put in circulation at least \$60,000 a year. At least 100 families would move to Nacogdoches and spend annually \$90,000 more, making \$150,000 which would be spent in Nacogdoches every year after such a college was fairly launched. Nacogdoches is at this time sending 20 of her young people from home to be educated at a cost of at least \$300 a year each, making \$6,000 now being sent from home, which might as well be saved to us. The college would be ever increasingly valuable as a financial proposition alone.

6. It means something for a town to be known as an educational center. It means conventions, normals, summer schools, educational rallies, societies, annual reunions and many other gatherings of educated people. Think for one moment what an intellectual atmosphere this would create.

7. This would mean better morals, better churches, better Sunday schools, better people.

8. One word as to this being a Baptist College. It would not mean that Baptist doctrines would be taught, Baptist books used or any sort of bigotry encouraged. It only means that this denomination of people would be responsible for the support and

perpetuity of the institution. No college is permanently successful unless it is fostered by some denomination. Individuals die, corporations dissolve, communities change, but denominations do not die.

9. The curriculum will begin where the public High School ends, and ends where the University Junior course begins. It will be federated and correlated with all the first colleges of the state.

Now a few words as to how we are to secure this college. We must furnish a site and a reasonable bonus. I am led to believe that two other places at least, will bid for the location of this college. It is said that one of these places will offer \$20,000 and suitable grounds. I see from the papers that Shreveport is offering \$50,000 for the location of the Baptist College of Louisiana. The East Texas Baptist College will probably be a larger college than the one Shreveport is bidding for.

McKinney offered \$90,000 to the Presbyterians for the location of their college. Waco gave Baylor \$100,000 for the location of that great school. Sam Sanger, of Sanger Bros. of Waco, said, "We moved to Waco because of Baylor University, and gave liberally to its endowment, but we consider Baylor the best paying investment we have ever made."

What Nacogdoches may give to secure the college, she gives to herself. Not one cent will go from home. The grounds will stay here. What is given will go immediately into a building in Nacogdoches, and all that is put in the plant, will go towards the permanent improvement of our city.

This is the day of opportunity for Nacogdoches. It rests with the people of our city as to whether they will give the grounds and a bonus sufficient to secure the school.

Sherman was once asked by the M. K. & T. Ry., to give a bonus of \$50,000 for the location of the terminus of that great railroad. Sherman refused, saying she was the proper location, and they had to come to her. The railroad declined to come, located another town ten miles away and build Denison. Sherman has long ago been outstripped by her young rival, and all because she did not see and seize her opportunity. Let it not be so with Nacogdoches.

#### Must Pay the Doctor.

At a recent meeting of the physicians of Nacogdoches, the following resolutions were adopted by a unanimous vote:

1st. Every physician that signs this agreement shall furnish to every other physician that signs it, on the first of March 1905, and the first of January each year hereafter a complete list of all those, regardless of social or financial standing, that have failed to pay or secure him for his services since January 1st, 1904, and each physician shall keep a complete alphabetically arranged list of all such names made up from the reports furnished him by other physicians.

2nd. That no physician that signs this agreement will go to see or render in any way a professional service to any who is listed by himself or another physician who has signed this agreement, as not paying his doctors bills for any year since Jan. 1st, 1904, unless the applicant pays the cash in advance, gives good security or shows a clear receipt from the physician or physicians that have reported him as in arrears.

3rd. That it shall be the duty of each physician who signs this agreement to report immediately to every other physician that has signed it the name of every one that has been reported as in arrears and has paid his bill and put himself in good standing, and then each physician shall be at liberty to go to see such persons if he desires.

#### Back From Tyler.

Dr. A. J. Holt and J. H. Summers returned this morning from Tyler where they went to lay before the Educational Commission of the Baptist denomination of Texas the claims of Nacogdoches as the location of the East Texas Baptist College soon to be removed from Rusk.

Because of the absence of Dr. Gambrell there was not a quorum of the Commission present in Tyler yesterday and no decisive action was taken in the matter of locating the college, but the subject was fully discussed. Lufkin was there in force and made a gallant fight to secure the prize, putting up a very liberal bonus to that end, and Tyier also entered the list as a competitor not to be despised. Our representatives presented the claims of Nacogdoches in a carefully prepared written statement and left a sealed bid with the Commission. The whole matter is in abeyance for the present and two weeks from today Dr. J. M. Carroll, of Waco, the Secretary of the Educational Commission, will arrive in Nacogdoches and thoroughly investigate the situation here, for himself. His report to the Commission will very naturally have a strong influence in determining its decision in the matter. The prospect is not at all unfavorable for Nacogdoches but it goes without saying that our people must be alert in the matter and be prepared to deal in a liberal spirit with the Commission. We have some strong advantages in the competition to get the College, but these advantages will not avail unless supplemented by a generous subscription.

### CENTRAL SCHOOL BUILDING.

Beautiful Structure Complete—Some Description of It.

The splendid Central High School building in Nacogdoches of which the friends of education in this city so long dreamed in the years ago, and for the building of which our people so cheerfully taxed themselves, stands at last a completed and a noble pile upon the spacious college grounds at the head of College street—an enduring monument to the zeal of our people in the cause of free education and an imposing addition to the architectural beauty of the city. This morning it was occupied for the first time, and hundreds of bright eyed youngsters trooped through its broad halls and into their class rooms, full of pride and delight in the beautiful and stately building in which they are to get their education. Our people have all seen the exterior of the structure, and its classic Grecian beauty, its noble pillared porticos, its richly embellished facade, its graceful domes finished in buff and gold and the perfect grace and symmetry of its proportions need no description here. But comparatively few have been through the building, and some description of it will not be out of place here on this day when it first goes into commission as the central feature of our educational system.

Saturday afternoon Prof. R. F. Davis, superintendent of the city schools, courteously showed the reporter through the building, calling attention to every detail, and it was a delightful inspection, of which we can only give a much abridged description:

The building, which faces south, is 160 feet long, 54 feet wide and is two stories high, not including the basement, but this does not give an adequate idea of its height as the steep roof and the three domes on them add more than the height of another story. It is constructed of Garrison brick faced with the beautiful dark red pressed Corsicana brick and trimmed with buff colored Elgin brick. The roof is of metal shingles painted red and the massive cornice is tinted green. The building has two entrances in front, perhaps the most beautiful and impressive of the exterior feature of the structure, and these lead into hallways 14 feet wide going through to the rear entrances and intersected midway by a long hallway running east and west transomed all the way. Spacious stairways lead from the first mentioned halls to the second story. There are twelve class rooms, each 20 by 30 feet and 14 feet high and each class room provided with 3 cloak rooms. These class rooms are wainscoted, trimmed in native pine, hard oil finish, the walls plastered and tinted green, except below the wainscoting which is a special hard plaster tinted red. The large blackboards let into the walls are genuine slate and not the interior artificial surface generally used for such purposes. There are eight windows in each class room, furnishing a perfect light, and the rooms are de-

signed to accommodate 50 pupils each. Four hundred new patent ball-bearing desks have been purchased for the class rooms in addition to those previously in use and 300 of the new ones are single desks. In the second story, in addition the class rooms, are four office rooms and libraries for the use of the superintendent and principals, and the crowning beauty of this part of the building is the magnificent auditorium, said to be one of the finest in Texas, and which with its beautiful stage finished in white and gold, arouses the beholder to enthusiasm. It is 64 by 54 feet in dimensions, the ceiling is lofty, light is admitted through 24 windows, 12 on each side, and it will comfortably hold an audience of 800 people. It is equipped with the latest style opera chairs. The building is warmed by the latest system of hot air heating. In the basement are two furnaces, one for the east and the other for the west end. By means of air ducts at the base of the building air is admitted into compartments above the furnaces where it is heated and then transmitted to the various rooms by a system of large metal pipes. In the walls of each class room about midway between the floor and the ceiling are two registers of open iron work through which the hot air is introduced into the rooms from the pipes. It of course seeks the ceiling and descends as it cools and passes out through a ventilator near the floor. A continuous current of this hot air, thus managed, keeps the room at a pleasant and healthful temperature on a cold day. The registers can be regulated at will by any one in the room. Many more details might be given of this admirable school building but space will not permit. All the rooms are so accessible and exits so convenient and ample that in case of fire the building could be emptied of people in a few minutes.
