The order reads that the case as to Alice Webb (now Mrs. Duke) shall be dismissed. Judgment was obtained against Taylor, Webb & Co. and Charles F. Taylor for the amount sued for, with interest and attorneys' fees and for a toreclosure of lien and personal judgment against J. W. Saunders. This suit grew out of the borrowing of \$5,000 from the Texas National bank some time ago by the parties named above. Taylor, Webb & Co. were the principals on the note, while it was indorsed by J. 
