Area Consultants Warned To Watch For Mixed Complex Of Worm Pests

Austin--As cotton transitions into the late season, Callahan County growers and crop consultants are encouraged to monitor moth flights and prepare to halt pyrethroid use in favor of chemistry that controls multiple worm species and is not cross-resistant with traditional products.

Late-season, many worm-pests invade cotton, such as cotton bollworm, tobacco budworm, beet armyworm, fall armyworm and loopers. During this time, worm feeding can cause boll shedding and result in severe yield and economic loss, making control a top priority.

However, because pyrethroid resistance has been documented in budworm and bollworm, use of chemicals with different modes of action is essential to successful control.

"Since pyrethroid resistance has become a concern throughout much of the Cotton Belt, it is important to rotate to chemistries with different modes of action, such as Tracer* Naturalyte* insect control," says Chris Sansone, Extension entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Tracer possesses a unique mode of action

resistant with existing products, making it an effective solution for the levels of resistant budworm bollworm frequently experience from late July into August. It is also an effective product for beet armyworm, fall armyworm and looper

control." Researchers recommend that growers scout twice a week to properly time insecticide treatments and apply insecticides on eggs to three-day-old

worms. In states where py rethroid-resistance has been a problem for a number of years, growers have quickly adapted to the rotation strategy for managing resistant pests. "Because of the problems we've had budworm with resistance Mississippi and the bad failures we've seen, our

growers have become very aware of the need to rotate different classes of insecticide chemistry against different generations of pests," states Blake Layton, Extension cotton entomology specialist Mississippi State

University. He adds that it is also important to choose a produce that preserves beneficial insect populations because they help control resistant pests as well as cut down on flaring of secondary pests such aphids

Beneficial insects

such as big-eyed bug, spiders, minute pirate bug, lacewing larva and parasitic wasps are important regulators of major cotton pests. Trials conducted in 1998 by Richard Sprenkel, University of

armyworms.

Florida, and Lance Peterson, Dow AgroSciences field biologist, demonstrated value maintaining beneficial insects. These natural predators kept aphids from flaring and helped reduce Heliothine egg and larvae numbers, as well as secondary pests like fall armyworm, soybean looper and aphid. cotton Beneficials were also responsible reducing the sharp that is not crosspeaks of pest populations observed in the plots where beneficial insects were eliminated. As a result, cotton yields and were increased by 26 percent and chemical costs were reduced by \$6.63 per acre in the plots that preserved

in keeping up with increased living costs. Since women's incomes are lower than men's, they must stretch fewer financial resources over longer lives. Seven out of 10 Medicare beneficiaries living below poverty are women. At the same time, women on Medicare spend 22 percent of their income on health care, compared to 17 percent for men.

Prescription drugs present a special problem for seniors, since they are not covered by Medicare. Total prescription spending averages \$1200 per Medicare woman and Medigap plans which include prescriptions range from \$3600-\$4800/year.

If we're seeing such challenges now, imagine what we will face as the number of all Medicare beneficiaries doubles over the next 30 years. Demographic demands such as these are largely responsible for the predictions that the Medicare program will exhaust its resources in about 15 years. That means that even a woman who retires with Medicare today faces the likelihood in her lifetime that Medicare will become insolvent.

That is, unless Congress acts soon to shore up this vital program.
