5-Day Break Begins Today For Students

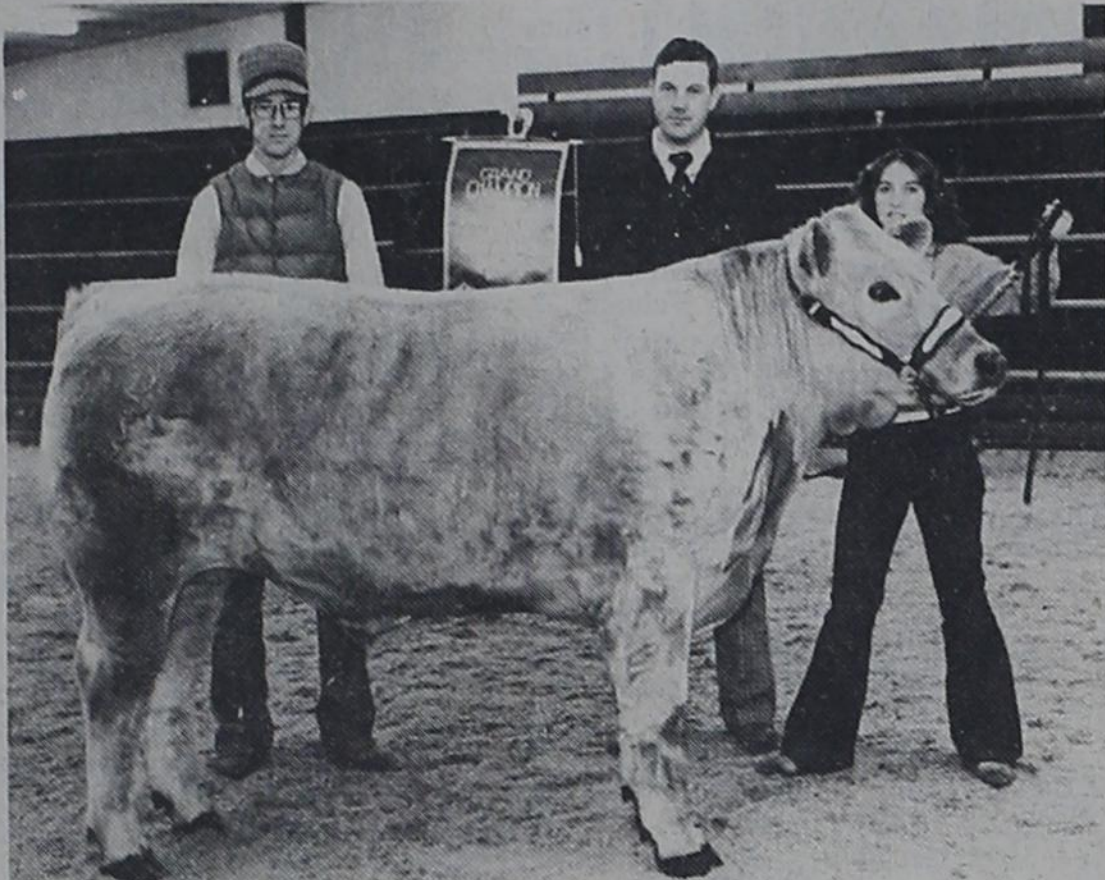
Students at Bovina Schools will enjoy a five-day spring break beginning at 2:45 today (Wednesday), according to Superintendent L.F. Jacobs.

Joan Carson Shows Grand Champion

1st Bovina Winner In 29 Years

Joan Carson, a Senior 4-H Club member, broke a 29-year drought for Bovina exhibitors by showing the grand champion steer, a heavy-weight Charolais-cross, at the 29th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show this past Thursday, Friday and Saturday at the county showbarn in Friona.

In the Saturday sale, Bovina Wheat Growers, Inc. and Agri-Sprayers, Inc., of Bovina bid \$1.05 per pound for the 1,220-pound steer.

At the same time, Lazbuddie showmen retained a firm grip on their long-established domination of the barrow show. Mike Windham showed his heavyweight cross-breed to grand champion honors with brother, Russell Windham, showing the reserve champion barrow, also a heavyweight crossbreed. It was the 16th consecutive year for a Lazbuddie exhibitor to show the grand champion.

In the five divisions of the barrow show, only a Friona boy, a Farwell girl and a Bovina girl managed to defeat the Lazbuddie entries. Kathy Williams of Bovina showed the breed champion in the Poland division, Lori Norton showed the first place lightweight Hampshire and Alan Monroe of Friona showed the first place lightweight cross-breed. In all, Lazbuddie took 44 of the 86 ribbons in the barrow show.

In the steer show Friday night, Gary Schueler of the Friona FFA showed his jumbo Charolais-cross to reserve champion honors. Farwell had claimed the grand champion banner five consecutive years and seven out of the past eight years.

Bovina showmen took first places in three of the six lamb divisions with an entry from each of the other three towns in the county winning a first place ribbon.

Lezli Williams won first place in the other breeds. Mark Clayton of Bovina won first in the medium wool light class with Miss Williams taking first in the medium wool heavy class. Miss Williams then won breed champion in that division with Doyle Garner of Bovina, second place in the medium wool heavy class, showing his lamb to reserve champion honors.

Showmanship trophies, presented by the Friona Star, went to John Jarecki of Friona, in the lamb division; Russell Windham of Lazbuddie in the barrow division; and Ram Randolph of Friona in the steer division.

Something special was reflected in the bright lights of Kansas City late last year when the annual Future Farmers of America convention was held. Reflected almost blindingly was the change in attitudes about agriculture. FFA conventions used to be almost mediocre affairs with dwindling attendance and speakers not in demand elsewhere. Old attendance records fell like rain in a hurricane when more than 20,000 of the Future Farmers checked in for the November convention. They came from all fifty states with visiting students from Europe and South America. Speaking before the sea of blue-jacketed farmers were Vice-President Nelson Rockefeller, former Texas Governor and Secretary of the Treasury, John Connally and former Georgia Governor and FFA member, Jimmy Carter. One of the highlights was the planning for this year's national convention. Early indications point to another record setter.

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Farmers Receive Allotment Notices

Notices of allotments and yields under the 1976 farm programs were mailed to Parmer County farmers this past Friday, February 13. It is to be pointed out that allotments do not restrict the acreages of any crop (except-peanuts, rice, ELS cotton and tobacco) that farmers can plant. The allotments are used to determine the amount of any deficiency or disaster payment due a farm in 1976. Parmer County's allotments includes 30,447 acres of cotton, 197,326 acres of feed grains and 121,228 acres of wheat. The cotton and feed grain acreages are about the same as in 1975. The wheat acreage is approximately 15 per cent larger than last years. For allotment protection, farmers may plant-for harvest or grazing-any crop they wish. By reporting by August 1 the acreage of crops they have planted farmer can protect the farm's acreage and yield history.

Farmers having a cotton allotment which differs from the acreage they intend to plant, should get in touch with someone at the ASCS office. If a farmer has allotted cotton acreage that he does not intend to plant, he should release the excess allotment to the ASCS County Committee so that the acreage can be assigned to a farm where it is needed and will be planted. If a farmer intends to plant an acreage in excess of his cotton allotment, he should file a request with the ASCS office for additional acreage. This additional acreage would be eligible for deficiency and-or disaster payments in most cases.

Mrs. Beauchamp To Head CF Drive

Mrs. Garry Beauchamp of Bovina has been named chairman of the Cystic Fibrosis Spring Breath of Life Campaign to fight children's lung diseases, according to Chuck Laurent, president of the Lone Star Chapter, Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

Mrs. Beauchamp this spring will lead local volunteers to support research and care programs for children affected by lung-damaging diseases like cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, and a condition called "childhood emphysema."

Cystic Fibrosis, an incurable genetic disease, is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene for C-F. It is believed that one in 20 persons or 10 million Americans may carry the C-F gene, usually without knowing it. Current research funded by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is seeking a practical test to identify these carriers.

Because of improved therapy and constant research, many C-F patients are living longer and hoping for the future. This kind of therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from other respiratory afflications whose symptoms resemble those of C-F. Through campaigns all over Texas the goals of education, research and patient care are reached.

The Breath of Life Campaign supports not only research but over 100 C-F Centers for diagnosis and treatment across the country, five of which are located within Texas.

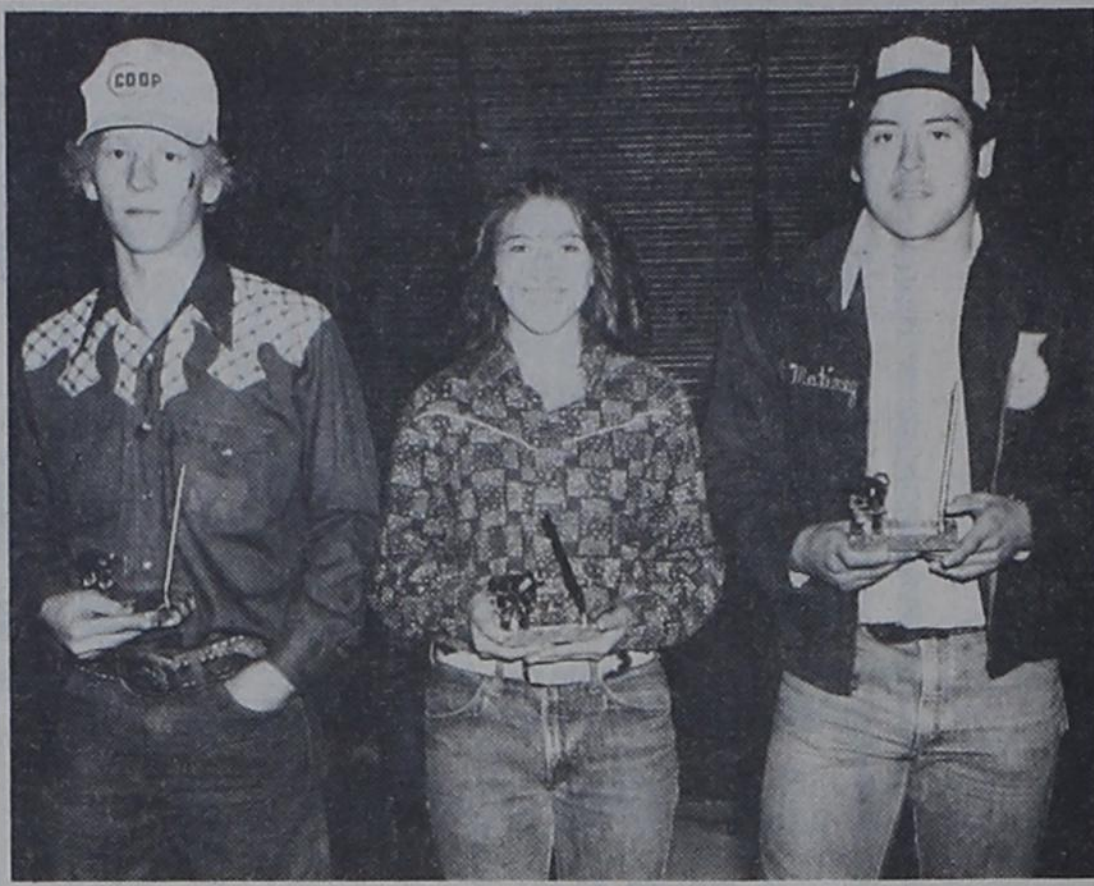

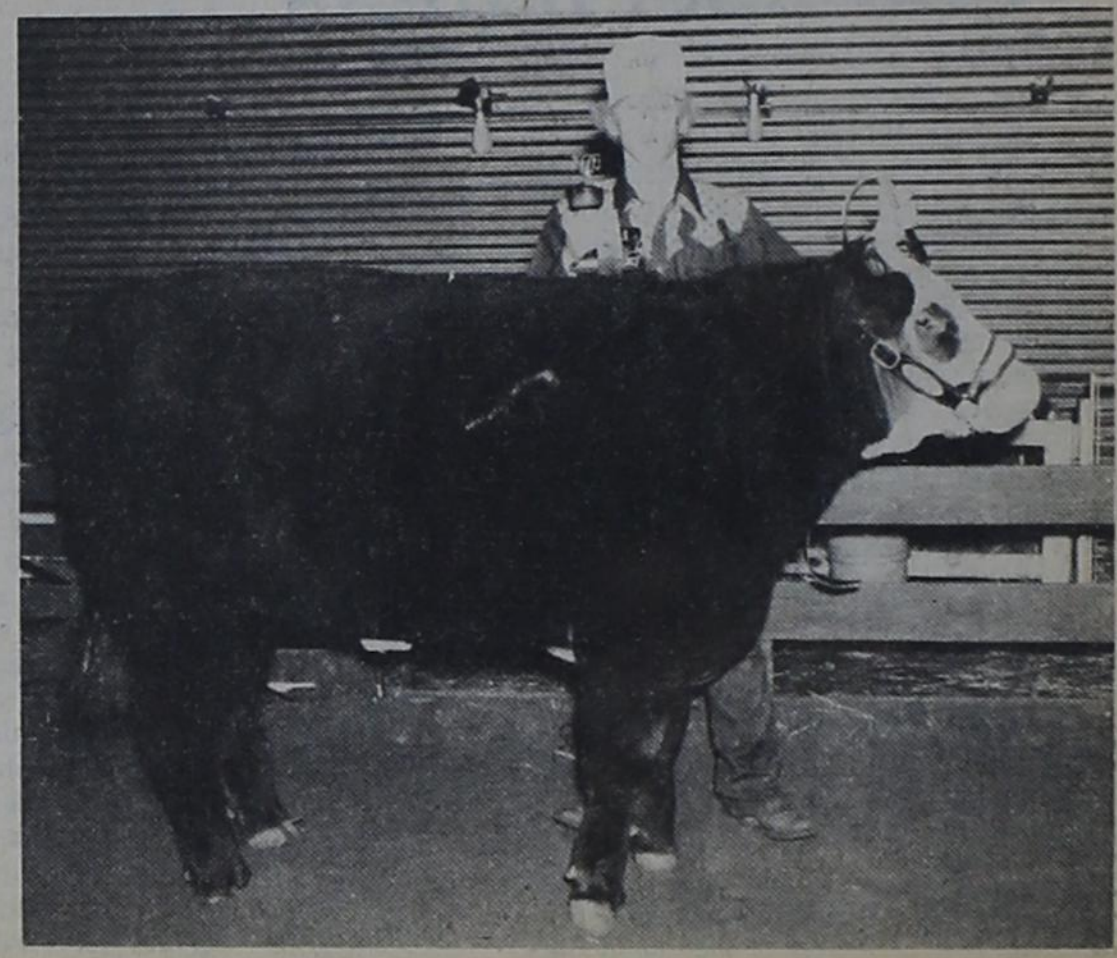
