LABOR DAY CELEBRATED.

Various Labor Organizations Celebrate the Day in Great Style.

From Monday's Daily:

This is the day when all labor organizations throughout the United States takes a day off from their labor and join together in making each other happy and a spirit of good fellowship reigns supreme.

Nacogdoches is not behind in these matters and today the various organizations of the city are celebrating the day in a manner that would do credit to some of the larger cities. The meeting was held in Labor Hall this morning.

At eleven o'clock the meeting was called to order by Hon. W. L. Rawlinson and in a pretty speech introduced the speaker of the day, Mr. H. F. Marr. Mr. Marr arose and thanked the speaker for the many nice things said about him, and then said in substance:

"Fellow Citizens and Brothers.

"I am not a public speaker, and I have been feeling quite badly for the past few days trying to take on a case of chills and fever, but I am happy to state that I have about worked the bad spell off.


"I am proud to be with you this morning and I think it the duty of every American citizen to speak when he is called upon by the American people. He should also feel proud of the honor

"In the wisdom of the people and of congress this day has been set aside for the purpose of the laboring people celebrating the day in an appropriate manner. All should set aside the business cares of life and join in with their fellowman and celebrate that day—Labor Day. Out of 365 days in the year daily avocations can be set aside for one day.

"Ever since the day that Adam and Eve were placed in the garden of Eden man has been compelled to earn what he eats by the sweat of his face. All should be required to work eight hours every day and six days every week.

"I will read you a few passages of scripture not that I am a preacher, for I am not, neither am I a religious man, but to show you that that man of Galilee was a working man and a carpenter at that. The sermon on the mount is one of the prettiest pieces of literature, and no other than a working man would have said what was said there on that occasion.

"The press of the country is trying to place the labor organizations of this fair land on the same plane as that of the trusts and combines. Labor organizations do not resemble a trust by any means. Unions take in all those who have to

SUPPORT home industries above all others.

WHOOOP up the factory reservation and get a cotton factory for the valley.

BUY a little farm in this part of the state and learn what it is to be independent and happy.

VALLEY OF SMOKESTACKS.

The Banita valley at this time has quite a number of smoke stacks of factories, but there is room for more. Nacogdoches is an ideal location for factories of all kinds and especially would a cotton mill do well at this point. Nacogdoches is situated in the center of a section of the state that is a great deal larger than some states in the Union and is in the center of the cotton growing section of Eastern Texas. This section produces the raw material and Nacogdoches has the water and the fuel near her doors for all manufacturing purposes. Some time ago it was suggested that the farmers take stock in the erection of a mill here and that they pay for their stock in cotton, but for the lack of some one to push the matter, it was for the time dropped. At the christening of the Nacogdoches Show Case and Manufacturing Plant during one of the speeches on that occasion the matter was mentioned that the next enterprise to be located here would be a cotton mill. The Sentinel hopes that the matter will now be taken up by the business league and pushed so that the mill will be located and work begun on the same so that it will be finished next summer. Now is the time to start. In this connection it would not be a bad idea for the farmers of this county to discuss the matter at their meetings, and The Sentinel would like to have their views upon the question of a cotton mill.

VULGAR AND DISGUSTING.

The Rusk Journal has the following to say about the boys and girls of the present age, and there is a truth in every word of the article. The Sentinel heartily endorses every word of it, and would like for every mother in the county to read it over and over. The Journal says: "In some places we notice a familiarity existing between girls and boys in conversation and in conduct that is painful. LETTER FROM THE WEST.

Valuable Information Concerning The School Lands in West Texas.

To The Sentinel:

Fort Davis, Tex., Aug. 29. —I have had numerous letters from friends asking information concerning the school lands of this immediate section. To answer each individually is a tedious undertaking, and as there may be others still who are interested I will endeavor to tell all I know about these lands through The Sentinel, confining myself to the cluster of counties surrounding and including Jeff Davis, these embracing that section of West Texas that is destined to become famous as a health resort for persons affected with tuberculosis or lung trouble.

In Jeff Davis county there are approximately 275 sections of public school lands that will be on the market on and after Sept. 1st, 1905. These lands are nearly all classed as dry grazing, there being comparatively few watered sections listed, and are priced at from one to three dollars per acre and will be sold to the person bidding the highest price above the listed price, provided said person will become an actual settler on the land.

In Brewster county, which joins Jeff Davis on the southeast, there are 1365 sections, classed and priced about the same as in Jeff Davis county. In this county there are 2240 acres classed as "mineral and dry grazing," ranging in price from \$1.50 to \$10.00 per acre.

El Paso county joins Jeff Davis on the north and has 1950 sections, classed nearly entirely as dry grazing and priced at from \$1.00 to \$3.00 per acre.

Pecos county joins Jeff Davis on the east and has 1150 sections classed and priced about the same as in El Paso.

Presidio joins Jeff Davis on the south and has 600 sections, classed and priced as in other counties. There are mineral lands in Presidio county, but none listed among the school lands.

Reeves county joins Jeff Davis on the northeast and has 396 sections. In this county a few sections are classed as "watered agricultural" and priced from \$2.50 to \$3.00 per acre. Other lands are classed and priced as in other counties mentioned.

In Brewster, El Paso, Jeff Davis, Pecos and Presidio counties one may buy as much as eight sections, but in Reeves county one cannot purchase more than four sections. In order to buy any of this land one must file written application with the Commissioner of the General Land office at Austin. A separate application must be used for each tract. Blank applications may be obtained from any County Clerk.

I would advise any who desire to follow agricultural pursuits to be very careful in buying land in this country. A visit to this country now would be apt to woefully mislead any one. It has rained throughout this entire section all this

year and every foot of ground that will produce farm products at all is now blooming like a rose. After this year it may not rain enough to wet a pocket handkerchief for two or three years. The mountains, vales and prairies are now green and cattle are as fat as butter, but within two years from now they may be starving on the ranches. This has been a year of clover for the ranchmen. This is essentially a cattle country and the little farming that is done is only along the running streams, which are exceedingly few and far between. The sub-irrigated lands are the surest.

Water may be obtained in any of the counties mentioned here by digging or boring to a depth of forty to two hundred feet, and with wells enough and machinery to pump the water most any of the level lands might be irrigated.

With irrigation the finest of fruit, especially apples, are grown in Jeff Davis county, and I presume the same can be done in other counties. All farm and garden products are very late here because the rainy season does not begin until May or June. Usually June to September, inclusive are the rainy months, but it is not always sure that rain will fall during these months.

Hog Law Election Proclamation.

Whereas, a petition signed by more than twenty freeholders and resident qualified voters of the hereinafter described territory asking the commissioners court of Nacogdoches county to grant an election to determine whether or not hogs, sheep and goats should be permitted to run at large in the following described territory, the same being a subdivision of Nacogdoches county, and whereas, said court granted said petition and ordered that an election be held on the 14th day of October, 1905, for the purposes herein stated, therefore I, Robert Berger, county judge of Nacogdoches county, do hereby order that an election be held at the town of Caro, in said county, on the said 14th day of October, 1905, to determine whether or not hogs, sheep and goats shall be permitted to run at large in the following described territory, to-wit: Beginning at or about the nine mile post on the Nacogdoches and Tyler road where the North Church and Lone Star hog law corners on said road; thence north with said road to Sanchez creek; thence with the meanders of the said creek in a northeasterly direction to where the Linn Flat and Briley Town road crosses said creek; thence east with said road to Boggs Church where it will intersect the Boggs Church hog law line; thence south with the Concord and Nacogdoches road to the Tranquill school house; thence with the North Church hog law line west to the place of beginning.

I hereby appoint W. T. Whitman, J. W. Seelbach and J. H. Stuckey as managers of said election at Caro, and they shall appoint two clerks to assist them in holding said election.

It is said that their mode of operation was to loaf around town and do the soliciting and that they would take the money and then send the customer to the house and there a woman would deliver the goods. Sometimes their customers would not have the price and in that instance they would let him have a good drink out of the bottle for a dime.

One of the witnesses stated this morning that most any kind of a price was accepted for the whiskey.

When the officers entered the house last night the men said that they were innocent of the charge and that they did not have any whiskey on the place, but after making an investigation Sheriff Buckner found a suit case with ten bottles wrapped in separate packages ready for delivery.

It is the opinion of the officers that the men have a barrel of the stuff stored away here in the city and that they would go and fill up the pint bottles and pack them in the grip and then come into the city and deliver the goods.

The witnesses were examined before Justice Jones this morning and the violators bound over to the county court.
